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Vicenna, March 17.

On the 12th instant another Conference was held with the Turkish Envoys; At which the Imperial Commissioners delivered the Emperor's Answer to their last Proposals; The Substance whereof was, That the Turks should yield to his Imperial Majesty all the Countries and Places which his Arms have Conquered, during this War, together with the Towns and Fortresses they are still possessed of in *Hungary*, with all their Dependencies; That *Transilvania* and *Valachia*, which have put themselves under the Emperors Protection, should be freed from the Annual Tribute they formerly paid to the *Port*: And that *Teckelej* be delivered up; Which last Article the said Envoys declared they had no Power to treat about. The Republick of *Venice* pretends to all the *Moræa*; And that their Confines on the side of *Lepanto* shall extend to *Achæa*; And on the side of *Albania* as far as *Epirus*. On the 14th the Baron *Raxinski* returned from *Poland*, with the News, that an Ambassador is coming hither from that Crown, with full Power to conclude a Peace. We have Advice, That the Turks having drawn together their Forces in *Bosnia*, and divided them into two Bodies, each commanded by two Bassa's, they advanced with several pieces of Cannon towards the Rivers *Save* and *Unna*; And that the Viceroy of *Croatia*, upon Notice of it, had assembled his Militia to oppose them: And that General *Piacomini* had likewise drawn together the Imperial Garisons in *Sclavonia* and on the *Save*, with a resolution to fight the Enemy, who had shewn themselves near *Dubitzæ*; So that we are expecting to hear of some Action. The Regiment of *Palfi* pass'd by this place two days ago, in their march towards the Empire; Whither the Regiment of *Belke*, now in Garison at *Buda*, is likewise ordered. We are preparing here two great Trains of Artillery; One for the Army that's to act on the *Rhine*; and the other for that in *Hungary*.

Strasbourg, March 15. The French Troops are marching from *Burgundy*, *Lorraine* and *Luxembourg*, towards the *Rhine*; And the Marechal de *Duras*, who is to command them, is arriv'd at *Metz*.

Cologne, March 25. The *Brandenburgh* Troops that were advanced to *Nuis*, under the Command of General *Schening*, decamped the 23th instant, but we do not yet hear, whether they are gone to attack *Keyserwart*, or whether they have taken their march towards *Kempen*; Where they have their Head-Quarter. The French that were at *Monjoux* and *Diren* have abandoned those places, and are retired to *Bonne*. One of their Parties made lately an attempt upon the Town of *Boppert*, belonging to the Elector of *Trier*, which they designed to plunder and burn, but were repuls'd, and several of them kill'd. They have had another Misfortune at *Lintz*, four Miles from *Bonne*, where some Troops of the Landgrave of *Hesse* surprized

the Garison, and cut off most of them. Since the publishing of the Imperial *Auctorita*, the Germans, that were in the Cardinal of *Furstemberg's* Troops, have quitted that Service. They write from *Francfort*, that the Imperial and *Bavarian* Troops had defeated 4000 French in the Marquissate of *Baden*, and taken 8 pieces of Cannon, and two Mortars.

Hague, March 29. The States of *Holland* are again assembled. The Prince of *Birkenfeldt*, Lieutenant-General of the Foot, is gone to join the Troops of this State on the Frontiers. The Envoys Extraordinary from *Sweden*, *Brandenburgh*, *Brunswick* and *Lutichburgh*, and other Princes of *Germany*, are expecting a fair Wind to pass over to *England*, being sent to congratulate Their Majesties upon Their happy Accession to the Crown.

Brussels, March 29. The French Troops have these 2 or 3 days been moving on our Frontiers; 15 or 16 Battalions are marching between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse* with several Squadrons of Horse and Dragoons, but upon what Design is not known; Our Governor-General has thereupon sent the Spanish Regiment, that was in Garison here, to *Charleroy*; And a Regiment of Horse is likewise commanded thither from *Malines*. And the Marquis de *Bedmar*, General of the Artillery, is in *Flanders* with 2500 Horse, to observe the French on that side; Who have lately seized the Officers of several Burghs and Villages within the Precincts of *Bruges*, by way of Reprizal, for the Damage they pretend to have sustained by the letting out the Waters about *Newport*, which have over-flow'd part of the Territory of *Furnembach*; And threaten, in case they have not speedy Satisfaction, to burn the Villages within the Free of *Bruges*. We hear, that more Troops are coming from *Holland* to re-inforce our Garisons; And that two Regiments are already arriv'd at *Antwerp*, which are to be put into Garison here. They write from *Francfort*, that 4000 French, having a Design to bombard *Biden*, marched thither with 12 pieces of Cannon, and 4 Mortars; But that the *Bavarian* Troops, upon advice thereof, joined with some Imperialists, that were quartered towards the Borders of *Stufferland*, and fell upon the French, whom they routed, killing 400 upon the place, and taking all their Cannon and Baggage: But there being come no Express with this News, we believe it may need a Confirmation.

Brussels, April 1. We hear from *Cologne*, that the Garison of that City, being joined with some other of the Confederate Forces, were marching to bombard *Keyserwart*; For which purpose 2 Mortars were sent from *Cologne* to *Duseldorp*. The Cardinal of *Furstemberg* was still at *Bonne*; The French not suffering him to depart. The News of the defeat of the French in the Marquissate of *Baden* is not confirmed. The Ships from *Cadix* are arriv'd at *Ostend*; Which have brought 50000 Crowns in Bars of Silver, for the Service of these Countries. We have advice from *Holland* of the Arrival of some English Troops in the *Maeße*.

Marsetilles, March 21. This week arriv'd an extraordinary Courier from *Paris*, with

fitting out 25 Men of War and 6 Fireships at *Thoulon*; And 25 or 30 Gallies from hence.

Paris, March 30. The Guards du Corps, Gen'darms, and the Light Horse, parted from hence the last Week, taking their march directly towards *Bonne*; But we hear since, that a Courier has been sent after them to stop their march till farther Order. They write from *Nancy*, that Orders were given to the Neighboring Bourgs and Villages to bring all their Corn thither, as to a place of Security. We have advice from *Constantinople*, that the Sieur *Girardin*, Ambassador of this Crown, dyed there on the 17th of *January* last; And the Sieur *de Blanc* is named to succeed him in that Station. The Letters from *Rome*, of the 8th instant, give an Account of the Recovery of *Queen Christina* of *Sweden*. It's said, that Orders are sent to *Brest* for the fitting out 40 Men of War, including the Squadron commanded by the Sieur *Gabaret*.

Edinburgh, March 19. The Convention have since our last ordered a Proclamation to be published, requiring all Persons, from the Age of 16 to 60, to be in a readiness to take Arms, when the House shall think fit to give farther Directions for that purpose. They have changed a great many Officers of the Militia all over the Kingdom; And Sir *Patrick Humes*, who came over with the King of *England* from *Holland*, and whose Attainder for the Business of the Earl of *Argyle* is not yet taken off, is appointed to command the Militia Horse of his Country. They ordered 800 Men to be levied under the Command of the Earl of *Leven*, who likewise came over with His Majesty, which were raised and armed in two hours time, and appointed to guard the Town. They have approved of what the Nobility and Gentry of this Kingdom, who were at *London*, had done in praying His Majesty to take upon him the Administration of the Government. Letters were read from several Noblemen and Gentlemen in *Ireland*, craving Assistance; Whereupon they ordered 2000 Musquets, and 20 Barrels of Powder, to be immediately sent them; And that a farther Provision should be made of Arms and Ammunition. News being brought to the Convention, that the Viscount of *Dumdee* had had a private Conference with the Duke of *Gordon*, at the Postern Gate of the Castle, contrary to the Orders of the House, who had forbid all Correspondence with him, they ordered the said Viscount to appear before them; But he retired with 30 or 40 Horse to *Linlithgo*; Upon which a Party of Horse was sent after him. The House finding some of their Members did absent themselves, sent their Maces to require them to attend the Convention. This day the Duke of *Gordon* beat a Parly, and desired to Capitulate; Upon which some Persons were appointed to speak with him.

Edinburgh, March 21. The Convention have been busy in putting the Country into a posture of Defence. And have ordered two small Frigates to cruise between *Scotland* and *Ireland*, to bring them Intelligence. The Treaty with the Duke of *Gordon*, for surrendering the Castle, is almost concluded. The Viscount of *Dumdee* is gone farther Westward; It's believed with design to go over to *Beard*, most of those that went with him having left him. The Convention have secured the Castle of *Stirling*. The Person that brought the Letter from the late King *James II.* of which no farther Notice has been taken, has, upon his Request,

obtained a Pass to depart. Several Ships do appear in the *Firth*, in which, it's believed, is Major-General *Mackay*, with the Three Scotch Regiments under his Command.

Deal, March 24. This day Sir *John Berry* failed out of the *Downs*, with His Majesty's Ships under his Command, to the Westward.

Whitehall, March 27. The Right Honorable the Lord *Conce* was this day Sworn and admitted into the Place of Treasurer and Receiver General to Her Majesty.
