A PROCLAMATION.

Requiring the Discovery and Bringing in of Arms lately Imbezzled.

WILLIAM R.

WHENCE by the late Disbanding of the Army, and the Disorders that have lately happened amongst Soldiers deserting their Companys; great quantities of Arms, Ammunition, Stores, and Utensils of War belonging to Us, have been by the Soldiers softeeing, Pawned, Sold, or otherwise Imbezzled; And notwithstanding Our late Proclamation to that purpose, are not as yet Discovered or brought in for Our Use, as they ought: We do hereby Require and Command all and every Person and Persons having any such Arms, Ammunition, Stores, or Utensils of War in their Custody, to bring the same unto the Mayor, Chief Officer of the Town, or to the next Justice of the Peace of the County where they shall be found: And for the Encouraging and Rewarding such as shall do their Duty herein; We do hereby Order and Appoint the sume of Six Shillings for every Snaphance Musket, for every Matchlock Musket Two Shillings; six pence, for every Carbine Four Shillings, for every pair of Pistols Five Shillings; and for all other Ammunition, Stores, or Utensils, the fourth part of the said Value. And he that any Person or Persons in whose Custody they shall be found, shall neglect the bringing them in, then the said Reward to be given and paid to such Person as shall Discover, and cause the same to be Seized, to Our Use; The said Values to be paid by the Mayor, Officer, or Justice of the Peace respectively to whom the same shall be so brought: And that the Mayor, Officer, or Justice of the Peace receiving the same, upon the Receipt thereof, do give Notice to the Principal Officers of Our Ordinance at Our Tower of London, of such their Receipt and Payment, who upon such Notice are hereby Required to pay the Moneys Disbursed, and Receive the same for Our Use. And We do hereby further Require Our respective Lords Lieutenants, Deputy Lieutenants, and their Under Officers of Our Militia, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, Mayors and Chief Officers of, and in the respective Counties, Cities and Towns where any such Arms shall be, diligently to Enquire, and by all Lawful Ways and Means to Discover and Seize the same for Our Use, and Arrest and Secure, or otherwise according to Law Proceed against the Persons in whose Hands any such Arms shall be found, or against Persons Imbezzling Our Stores or Arms, so that they may be Tried and Punished for the said Offence, at the next Sessions or Assizes to be holden for the County, or Place where such Offence shall be Committed.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court the first day of April, 1689. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Vienna, March 27. The Velt Marechal Caprara has since our last acquainted the Turkish Envoy, That the Emperor does not think fit to permit the sending an Express to Constantinople; but expects their final Answer, without further delay, to the last Proposals of the Imperial Commissioners; or that otherwise they must return Home; which they seem concordant at, but still say they cannot yield any thing more than what has been taken since the War, without

new Orders from their Sultan. Yesterday arrived here an Envoy from Mezow, who assures us, that the Czars are leading a great Army against the Tatars. The Emperors Forces are thus Ordered for the next Campagne; In the Empire there will be 7000 Horse, 2000 Dragoons, and 24000 Foot, besides 8000 Hungarians; in all 41000: And in Hungary, Transilvania, &c. as well in Garrison as in the Field, 8000 Horse, 9000 Dragoons, and 42000 Foot; together 59000. The first will be commanded by the Duke of Lorraine, and the latter by General Caprara. Yesterday morning the Empress was brought to Bed of a Prince, who was Christened this day, and Named Maria Magdalena, Josepha, Antonia, Gabriela. The Count de Wallenstein is appointed by the Emperor to go in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to Madrid, to make the Complement of Condoleance upon the Death of the Queen of Spain; And, it's said, he is to propose a Marriage between his Catholick Majesty and a Princess of Neubourg, Daughter of the Elector Palatine. The Elector of Bavaria is perfectly recovered.

Cologne, April 1. Yesterday the Baggage of the Cardinal of Funfemberg was sent from Bon under a strong Convoy to Metz, whither, it's believed, he himself followed this day. Some of his Adherents, as the Counts of Melskirken, Hohenzollern, and Reckheim, retired from thence two days ago towards Strasbourg; the French at the same time are working to undermine the Fortifications of that place, and have placed Barrels of Powder in a great many Houses, to blow up the whole Town when they quit it, which in all appearance they will be quickly forced to. The Count de Becke, who commands this Garrison, has written to the Magistrates of Lure, to require them in the Emperors Name to seize the Ammunition and Provisions belonging to the French within that City. The Confederates continue before Keyserstadt.

Hamburg, March 29. The King of Denmark offers, as we are told, by his Ministers at the Conference of Altona, to restore to the Duke of Holstein the Dutchy of Sleswick, upon condition that he shall not fortifie any place there without the consent of Denmark; and that during the War in the Empire the King may keep his Troops in the said Duchy. Which the Duke of Holstein refuses no consent. They write from Berlin of the 23. instant, that the Elector of Brandenburg intends to be himself in the Field about the middle of the next Month; and that he was in the mean time

time sending a very fine Train of Artillery towards the Rhine. The King of Denmark has given Orders for the publishing the Imperial *Avocatoria* in Holstein.

Hamburg, April 4. They write from Zell, That the Troops of Brunswick and Lunenburg will begin their march towards the Rhine about the middle of this Month, under the Command of Lieutenant General Chauvet.

Hague, April 8. Prince Waldeck parted from hence the 7th instant, to go and Confer with the Governor of Flanders. The same day the Envoy Extraordinary from Sweden, Brandenburg, and Lunenburg left this place, in order to Embark for England. We hear from Liège, that the Count de Flodorp was come before that City with 5000 Men of the Garrison of Maestricht, and four Pieces of Cannon, and two Mortars, to demand satisfaction for their having profeſſed a French Convoy of Ammunition and Provisions, which must otherwise have fallen into the hands of the Dutch Troops that were in pursuit of it; and that he had poſſeſſed himſelf of the *Carthulians*, being on a Hill that commands the Town as much as the Citadel did that was lately demolished; Upon which the Magistrates delièred a Parley, and ſeveral Messages had paſſed between them and the Count de Flodorp about accommođating this matter. We are likewiſe told, that the Emperor has written to the States of Liège, requiring them abſoluteſly to declare either for the Empire or for France; for that he will not ſuffer a Neutrality.

Brussels, April 12. We have an account from Liège, that the States of that Country had on the 7th instant reſolved to quit their Neutrality with France, and to conſern themſelves to the late Declaration of the Dver at Rastadt; That the next day a Guard was ſet upon the French Reſident, whom they intend to keep as a Hoſtage for their Minister in France; and divers French Officers were ſearched with their Arms and Equipages. The ſaid States had likewiſe given Orders for the repairing the Citadel, and for receiving a Dutch Garrison into it. The Brandenburg Troops march towards Cleves, where they will form an Army of 25000 men. Prince Waldeck does likewiſe assemble a Body of Dutch Troops on the Frontiers of Brabant. They write from Frankfurt that the French had ſurprized 400 Saxons who were poſteſd near Oppenheim on the Rhine, of whom ſeveral were killed, and the reſt taken Prisoners. The Cardinal of Berflenberg parted from Bon the ſixth instant for Metz under the Convoy of 8 Troops of Horſe.

Paris, April 13. The Letters from Germany, which arri‐ved here yesterdaу, brought the news, that the City of Liège had declared againſt this Crown. The Cardinal of Berflenberg is now at Metz. The French Ambaſſador, the Count de Rabenau, is coming home from Spain. They write from Italy, that the Governor of Alcira had ſett in the Name of the King of Spain to the Great Duke of Tuscany, to deſire the Picture of the Princefs his Daughter.

Edinburgh, March 30. The Committee for ſelling the Government have unanimously agreed, That the Throne of Scotland is vacant, the late King James VII. having forſit, which is an old Scotch word) or forſitid the Crown by the Violations of the Fundamental Laws and Conſtitution of the Kingdom; whereof they have appointed a Sub-Committee to draw up the particular Infractions. There has been ſome Debate upon a Motion for Uniting the two Kingdoms; ſome would have the Union preceede the Settlement; but the Major part are for proceeding to the Settlement immediately, and for following the Example of England. The Convention have paſſ'd an Act, declarinig the Viscount Dundee fugitive, Outlaw, and Rebel, which was published at the Market Cross of this City, and is to be published likewiſe at the Head-Burg of the Shire where he lieth. The Lord Lethington is commanded to appear before the States the 9th of the next Month. The Militia are to Rendezvous the 15th with 20 regiments Proviſion, and are to march upon Major General Mackay's Order. The Duke of Gordon's Men in the Castle; and thofe that have block'd up continue to fire upon the other, and ſeveral are killed and wouſh'd on both ſides.

Windsor, April 5. This day his Grace the Duke of Ormonde was Initiated in St. George's Chapel, Knight and Companies of the moft Noble Order of the Garter, by the Duke of Grafton and the Earl of Rochester, two of the Knights Companions of the ſaid moft Noble Order, (who were the moft Commissioned by the Sovereign) with

the uſual Ceremony; which done, his Grace Entertained the ſaid Commissioners, together with divers Peopls of Quality, and the Officers of the Order, &c. with a Noble Dinner at the Dean Lodgings; at the middle of which Garter King of Arms (accompanied with the Officers of Arms) proclaimed his Grace's Title in the accustomed manner.
