

time sending a very fine Train of Artillery towards the Rhine. The King of Denmark has given Orders for the publishing the Imperial *Avocatoria* in *Holftein*.

Hamburg, April 2. They write from Zell, That the Troops of *Brunswick* and *Lunenbourg* will begin their march towards the *Rhine* about the middle of this Month, under the Command of Lieutenant General *Chauvet*.

Hague, April 8. Prince *Waldeck* parted from hence the 5th Instant, to go and Conquer with the Governor of *Flanders*. The same day the Envoys Extraordinary from *Sueden*, *Brandenburg*, and *Lunenbourg* left this place, in order to Embark for *England*. We hear from *Liege*, that the Count de *Flodorp* was come before that City with 5000 Men of the Garrison of *Mosfricht*, and four Pieces of Cannon, and two Mortars, to demand satisfaction for their having protected a French Convoy of Ammunition and Provisions, which must otherwise have fallen into the hands of the Dutch Troops that were in pursuit of it; and that he had possessed himself of the *Carthusians*, being on a Hill that commands the Town as much as the Citadel did that was lately demolished. Upon which the Magistrates desired a Parley, and several Messages had passed between them and the Count de *Flodorp* about accommodating this matter. We are likewise told, that the Emperor has written to the States of *Legs*, requiring them absolutely to declare either for the Empire or for *France*; for that he will not suffer a Neutrality.

Brussels, April 12. We have an account from *Liege*, that the States of that Country had on the 7th Instant resolved to quit their Neutrality with *France*, and to conform themselves to the late Declaration of the *Dyer* at *Rastbonne*: That the next day a Guard was set upon the French Resident, whom they intend to keep as a Hostage for their Minister in *France*; and divers French Officers were seized with their Arms and Equipages. The said States had likewise given Orders for the repairing the Citadel, and for receiving a Dutch Garrison into *they*. The *Brandenburg* Troops march towards *Cleves*, where they will form an Army of 20000 men. Prince *Waldeck* does likewise assemble a Body of Dutch Troops on the Frontiers of *Brabant*. They write from *Frankfort* that the French had surprized 400 Saxons who were posted near *Oppenheim* on the *Rhine*, of whom several were killed, and the rest taken Prisoners. The Cardinal of *Furstemberg* parted from *Bonn* the sixth instant for *Metz*, under the Convoy of 8 Troops of Horse.

Paris, April 13. The Letters from *Germany*, which arrived here yesterday, brought the news, that the City of *Liege* had declared against this Crown. The Cardinal of *Furstemberg* is now at *Metz*. The French Ambassador, the Count de *Rabena*, is coming home from *Spain*. They write from *Italy*, that the Governor of *Milan* had sent in the Name of the King of *Spain* to the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, to desire the Recure of the Princess his Daughter.

Edinburgh, March 30. The Committee for setting the Government have unanimously agreed, That the Throne of *Scotland* is vacant, the late King *James VII.* having Forfeit, which is an old Scotch word, or forfeited the Crown by the Violations of the Fundamental Laws and Constitution of the Kingdom; whereof they have appointed a Sub-Committee to draw up the particular Instances. There has been some Debate upon a Motion for Uniting the two Kingdoms; some would have the Union precede the Settlement; but the Major part are for proceeding to the Settlement immediately, and for following the Example of *England*. The Convention have pass'd an Act, declaring the Viscount *Dumrie* Fugitive, Outlaw, and Rebel, which was published at the Market Cross of this City, and is to be published likewise at the Headings of the Shire where he lives. The Lord *Levingston* is summoned to appear before the States the 9th of the next Month. The Militia are to Rendezvous the 15th with 20 days Provision, and are to march upon Major General *Mackay's* Order. The Duke of *Guards* Men in the Castle; and those that have blockt out upon one another, and several are killed and wounded on both sides.

Windsor, April 5. This day his Grace the Duke of *Ormonde* was installed in *St. George's* Chapel, Knight and Companion of the most Noble Order of the Garter, by the Duke of *Graville* and the Earl of *Rochester*, two of the Knights Companions of the said most Noble Order, (who were thereto Constituted by the Sovereign) with

the usual Ceremony; which done, his Grace Entertained the said Commissioners, together with divers Persons of Quality, and the Officers of the Order; viz. with a Noble Dinner at the Dean Lodgings; at the middle whereof *George* King of Arms (accompanied with the Officers of Arms) proclaimed his Grace's Style in the accustomed manner.
