PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady, by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will

observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE LEVEE AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no

presentation shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

#### ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having Petitions or Addresses to present to the Queen at Her Majesty's Levee, are to deliver a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* two clear days previous to the Levee; and that two other cards, having on them, precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee: one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen; and on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

**T**HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after this sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and words in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1875.

2. Notwithstanding anything in the Cattle-Plague Order of 1877, or in any other Order of Council, the holding of markets, fairs, exhibitions, or sales of cattle within the Parts of Holland, the Parts of Kesteven, and the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, and within the Boroughs of Boston, Grantham, Grimsby, Lincoln, Louth, and Stamford, is hereby prohibited, except as follows:

a. Cattle belonging to the owner or occupier of premises not in an infected place, may be sold on those premises if the cattle are not affected with cattle-plague and have been on those premises in possession of the owner or occupier thereof not less than 28 days immediately before the sale.

b. Cattle within a defined part of a port, which have been delivered to the owner or his agent, may be sold within such defined part.

c. Markets, exhibitions, and sales of cattle may be held under licence of the Privy Council.

If any cattle are sold, or exposed or put up for sale, or exhibited in contravention of this Article, the seller thereof, and the auctioneer putting the same up for sale, or the person exposing the same for sale or exhibiting the same, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order; and if any person holds a market, exhibition, or sale in contravention of this Article, or fails to comply with any of the conditions, provisions, or regulations of any licence for the holding of a market, exhibition, or sale, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

3. Cattle exposed for sale in a market, the holding whereof for the sale of cattle for immediate slaughter is licensed by the Privy Council, may be kept alive for a period of 10 days after such exposure, and no longer.

If any person keeps any cattle alive in contravention of this Article, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

4. The owner, consignee, or other person exposing any cattle in a market, the holding whereof for the sale of cattle for immediate slaughter is licensed by the Privy Council, shall, at his own expense, mark them as follows:

By clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and by clipping a broad arrow, about 5 inches long, on the left quarter.

If any person fails to comply with the provisions of this Article, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs copy of a Notice issued by the Russian Consul-General at Constantinople to the effect that submarine torpedoes are being placed in the eastern part of the Black Sea, on the coast of Circassia, comprised between the town of Soukoum Kalé and the Fort St. Nicholas (Nicolayefski).

Ships leaving Constantinople bound for Poti or Soukoum Kalé must steer towards the guard ships, one of which will be stationed at the entrance of the roadstead of Poti, and the other at the entrance of the roadstead of Soukoum Kalé; these guard ships will indicate to the master the course to be followed for entering the roadsteads.

Ships bound for Balaklava must not enter that bay until a boat be sent to indicate the place where they are to anchor.

#### THE FAIRS ACT, 1871.

##### NEWMARKET FAIR.

IN pursuance of the above-mentioned Act, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby notify as follows:

1. By Memorial, dated the 6th day of February, 1877; a representation has been duly made to me by the Justices acting in the Newmarket Petty Sessional Division of the county of Suffolk, that a Fair has been annually held on the 8th day of November, and continued from that day to the second following Tuesday, in the parish of Newmarket St. Mary, in the said division of the said county, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that such Fair should be abolished:
