PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve*

o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

An Act for amending the Supreme Court of Judicature Acts, 1873 and 1875.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better payment of the Army and their quarters.

An Act for the regulation of Her Majesty's Royal Marine Forces while on shore.

An Act for confirming, so far as the same may be necessary, certain awards made with reference to the provisions of the Mersey Dock (Liverpool Dock Extension) Act, 1873, and an agreement made between the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, the Birkenhead Improvement Commissioners, and the Great Western Railway Company; and for other purposes.

An Act for amending the law relating to the Vicar's Rate in Halifax, in Yorkshire.

An Act for empowering the Highland Railway Company to provide and use steam and other vessels; and for other purposes.

THE FAIRS ACT, 1871.

BRENTWOOD PLEASURE FAIRS.

IN pursuance of the above-mentioned Act, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby notify as follows:

1. By Memorial, dated the 16th day of February, 1877, a representation has been duly made to me

by Christopher J. H. Tower, Esq., as owner, that Pleasure Fairs have been annually held on the 18th and 19th days of July, and on the 15th and 16th days of October, respectively, in the High-street of the town of Brentwood, in the parish of Brentwood, in the county of Essex, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that such Fairs should be abolished.

2. On the 23rd day of May, 1877, I shall take the aforesaid representation into consideration, and all persons are to intimate, before that day, any objection they may desire to offer to the abolition of the said Fairs.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 39th and 40th years of Her present Majesty, Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act for the preservation of Wild Fowl," it was by the 2nd section provided that any person who shall kill, wound, or take, or attempt to kill, wound, or take, any wild fowl as defined by the said Act, or use any boat, gun, net, or other engine or instrument for the purpose of killing, wounding, or taking any wild fowl, or shall have in his control or possession any wild fowl recently killed, wounded, or taken, between the 15th day of February and the 10th day of July, in any year shall be liable to the penalty therein mentioned, and by the 2nd section, power was given to the Home Office as to Great Britain, upon application of the Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled of any county, to extend or vary the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl was prohibited by the said Act, such extension or variation to be made by Order under the hand of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State:

And whereas the Justices of the county of Southampton, in Quarter Sessions assembled, have applied to me to the effect that an Order should be made directing that the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited shall be varied in the county of Southampton, so as to be from the 1st day of March up to and inclusive of the 1st day of August in each year.

Now therefore, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the said Act, and on such application as aforesaid, hereby order as follows:—

The time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited, shall be varied in the county of Southampton so as to be from the 1st day of March up to and inclusive of the 1st day of August in each year.

EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875 (38 Vic., c. 17).

WHEREAS by Section 68 of the above-named Act, it is provided as follows:—

"The Council of any Borough which is assessed to the county rate of any county by the Justices of such county, and the Commissioners of any Improvement District, may, by order of a Secretary of State made upon the application of such Council

or Commissioners, and published in the London Gazette, be declared to be a Local Authority for the purposes of this Act, and thereupon shall become a Local Authority accordingly for such part of their borough or district as is not included in any harbour, to the exclusion of the Justices in Petty Sessions:—"

And whereas an application has been made to me by the Town Council of the borough of Kingston-upon-Thames to be declared a Local Authority for the purposes of the said Act, in accordance with the provision aforesaid.

Now I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby, in virtue of the powers contained in the said section, declare the Town Council of the borough of Kingston-upon-Thames to be a Local Authority for the purposes of the said Act.

Tramway Bye-laws.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said borough of Sheffield, acting by the Council of such borough, being the local authority for the said borough, under and for the purposes of "The Tramways Act, 1870," and being also the Promoters of the tramways authorized to be made by "The Sheffield Tramways Act, 1872," at a meeting of the said Council, duly convened and held on Wednesday, the 11th day of April instant, did, in pursuance of the powers to them for that purpose given in and by the 46th section of the said "Tramways Act, 1872," and of every other power enabling them in that behalf make, order, and ordain the following Bye-laws and Regulations for preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage belonging to the Sheffield Tramways Company, and for regulating

the travelling in or upon any such carriage, viz.:—

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company, and to all places with respect to which the Corporation of Sheffield, as the Promoters of the Tramways, and the Sheffield Tramways Company, as their lessees, have power to make Bye-laws and Regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while riding in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed notice, or advertisement or writing on the panels, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do, by the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Company, shall not use or attempt to use any carriage intended for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of the carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps, or front or driver's platform of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof

of any carriage, and shall cease so to do immediately on request by the conductor.

14. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage, when warned by the conductor not to do so.

15. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position in the carriage.

16. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter, or mount, or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

17. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

18. No dog or other animal shall, in any case, be allowed or taken inside any carriage, or on the outside of any carriage (except by permission of the conductor), nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive, or an annoyance to any passenger. Any dog or other animal taken inside or outside of any carriage, in breach of this Regulation, shall be removed by the person in charge thereof from the carriage immediately upon request for the purpose by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

19. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded firearms, or with any combustible or explosive materials.

20. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in

the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

21. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability, and if any such conductor knowingly and wilfully fails to enforce the same as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

22. Any person wilfully offending against, or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

23. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Company, and having charge of a carriage for the time being.

24. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

25. These Bye-laws shall be deemed to be the Rules and Regulations which the Corporation as the Promoters, and the Company, as the Lessees, are entitled to make under and by virtue of "The Tramways Act, 1870," section 46, and shall come into force on the 1st day of July, 1877.
