## ROYAL COMMISSION APPOINTING AN ADDITIONAL COMMISSIONER FOR THE PARIS EXHIBITION OF 1878.

THE Lords of the Committee of Council on Education have received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department a Royal Commission, of which the following is a copy, which Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to issue, appointing an additional Commissioner to represent British and Colonial Exhibitors at the International Exhibition to be held at Paris, in 1878.

## VICTORIA, R.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, to Our Trusty and Well-Beloved William Calder Marshall, Esquire, Royal Academician; Greeting!

Whereas We did, by Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual, bearing date the twenty-second day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the fortieth year of Our reign, authorize and appoint Our Most Dear Son, Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter, Field-Marshal in Our Army, together with the several Noblemen and Gentlemen therein named, or any three or more of them, to be Our Commissioners to advise Us upon the best mode by which the products of Industry, Agriculture, and the Fine Arts of the United Kingdom, Our Colonies, and Dependencies, may be procured and sent to the Universal Exhibition of the Works of Industry and Agriculture, as well as of the Fine Arts, to be held at Paris, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your zeal, discretion, and ability; have authorized and appointed, and do by these presents authorize and appoint you, the said William Calder Marshall to be a Commissioner

for the purposes aforesaid, in addition to and together with the Commissioners whom We have already appointed by the above-mentioned Royal Warrant.

Given at Our Court at *Saint James's*, the eleventh day of *June*, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the fortieth year of Our Reign.
