

chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said line of railway to a point in the centre of South-road and extending thence south-westward for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named road to the south-western boundary of the said particular district of Christ Church Litherland on the shore of the estuary of the River Mersey aforesaid.

“And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Sefton above referred to which comprises a part of the township and ancient chapelry of Great Crosby and which comprises also a part of the township of Litherland all which said portion of such parish is bounded on the east by the district chapelry of Saint Philip Litherland within the original limits of the said parish of Sefton or in other words by the Leeds and Liverpool Canal on the south-east by the new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth also within the original limits of the same parish of Sefton on the west by the particular district of Christ Church Litherland aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say on the north partly by the said district chapelry of Saint Luke Great Crosby and partly by the township of Orrell and Ford, in the parish of Sefton aforesaid.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Prittlewell in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Prittlewell which is hereinafter mentioned and described

should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds four pounds per centum debenture stock of the Great Western Railway Company has been transferred into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

“And whereas the said sum of debenture stock has been so provided as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners should out of our common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district so recommended to be constituted when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Prittlewell which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of All Saints Prittlewell.’

“And we further recommend and propose that the right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised for one turn and that the first turn only jointly by the Reverend Thomas Edmund Heygate Clerk in Holy Orders now vicar of the parish of Sheen in the county of Stafford by the Reverend William Edward Heygate Clerk in Holy Orders now rector of the parish of Brighstone otherwise Brixton in the Isle of Wight and by the Reverend Spencer Robert Wigram Clerk in Holy Orders
