When I engaged in this Undertaking, I had particu-The Reg rd and Confideration for Scotland, and therefore I didumit a Declaration in relation to that, as well as to this Kirgdom, which I intend to make good and effectual to them: I take it very kinndy that Scotland bath expressed for much Confidence in, and Affection to Me. They shall find Me willing to Affet them in every thang that concerns the Well and Interest of that Kingdom, by making what Laws shall be necessary for the Security of their Religion, Property and Liberty,

After which the Coronation Oath was tendered to Their Majesties, which the Earl of Argile spoke Word by Word diffinctly, and the King and Queen repeated it after him, holding. Their Right Hands up after the manner of taking Oaths in Scotland.

The Meeting of the Ettates of Scaeland did Authorife their Commissioners, to represent to His Majesty, That that Claufe in the Oath, in relation to the rooting out of Hercticks, did not import the destroying of Hereticks; and that by the Law of Scotland no Man was to be perfecuted for his private Oppinion; And even obstinate and convicted Heleticks were only to be deitornced Rebels or Quitlaned, whereby their Movable Estates are Conflicated. His Majelty at the repeating that Clause in the Oath, did declare, Thus he did not mean by the Words, that he was under any Ob-Commission to become a Personary: To which the Commissioners made Answer, That neither the Paganing of the Qath, or the Law of Scotland, did import it.
