to the point where it is crossed by the footpath leading from Park House into Merrydale-road and extending thence generally north-eastward for a distance of fifteen and a-half chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last described footpath (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said Parochial Chapelry of Wibsey from the new Parish of Bierly aforesaid) to the point where the same footpath joins the south-western end of Mcrrydale-road aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Rockhill-lane and continuing thence still north-eastward for distance of two chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction on the northern side of the house called or known as Tan House with the cross road leading into Back-lane and extending thence that is from the said Rockhill-lane south-eastward for a distance of six chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said cross road to its junction at Brogden House with Back-lane aforesaid and extending thence northward for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction on the northern side of the house called or known as Hardy's Farm House with the footpath leading over Tom Royd Bridge into Cliff Hollin's-lane and extending thence for a distance of forty-four chains or thereabouts first south-eastward then north-eastward and then again south-eastward along the middle of the last described footpath (thereby crossing at Tom Royd Bridge aforesaid the boundary which divides the said new Parish of Bierley from the new Parish of Birkenshaw-cum-Hunsworth aforesaid) to the point where the same footpath joins Cliff Hollin's-lane aforesaid and extending thence generally south-westward for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with the footpath leading through the wood called or known as Cockleshaw Range into Hunsworth-lane and extending thence south-eastward for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-described footpath to the centre of the foot bridge in Cockleshaw Range aforesaid which carries the same footpath over Cockleshaw Beck and extending thence generally south-westward for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named Beck to a point at the junction of the same Beck with Hunsworth Beck aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said new Parish of Birkenshaw-cum-Hunsworth the new Parish of Whitechapel aforesaid and extending thence generally southward for a distance of three-quarters of a mile or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following the course of the said Hunsworth Beck to the first-described point a little to the south of Hunsworth mill aforesaid where the said Hunsworth Beck is joined by Stubs Beck as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the several cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been leighth day of December, one thousand eight No. 24532.

approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Ripon.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled. "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burialground or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued, subject to any exception or qualification, it shalk be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the adviceof Her Privy Council, to order that, from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before such representation is so considered; provided always, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of

And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk of the parishhereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the undermentioned parish with the modifications hereinafter specified:
