and in the Diocese of London, and also all that contiguous portion of the District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Kilburn, in the same county and diocese, which said portions of such cures are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new Parish of Saint John the Evangelist Kilburn in the said county and diocese from the District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Kilburn aforesaid, at the point where Canterbury-road is joined by the street called or known as Canterbury-terrace and extending thence that is from the said boundary north-westward for a distance of one hundred and twenty-three yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to its junction on the southern side of the line of the London and North Western Railway with Albert-road and continuing thence still north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of forty-three yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the said line of railway and extending thence south-westward for a distance of six hundred and thirty-five yards or thereabouts along the middle of the same line of railway (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Kilburn, from the new Parish of Saint John, Kensal-green aforesaid) to a point opposite to the mile-post situate on the northern side of the said line of railway and indicating a distance of one hundred and eight and a-half miles from Birmingham, and extending thence that is from the last described point in the middle of the said line of railway southward and in a direct line for a distance of seventy-five yards or thereabouts to the junction of Kilburn-lane with Lancefield-street, and continuing thence still southward for a distance of two hundred and eighty yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to the point where it is intersected by a certain new street which it is proposed to call "Dart-street" and extending thence eastward for a distance of nearly forty yards along the middle of the lastmentioned street to the point where it now ends on the boundary which divides that detached portion of the original Parish of Chelsea which now forms part of the new Parish of Saint John Kensalgreen aforesaid from that portion of the original Parish of Paddington which also now forms part of the same new Parish and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned point north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of two hundred and ten yards or thereabouts to the south-western angle of the wall or fence surrounding the building and premises called or known as 'Saint Luke's Schools,' and extending thence still north-eastward but in a more easterly direction for a distance of fifty-three yards or thereabouts along the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the last-named building and premises to the point where the same wall or fence abuts upon the western side of Neeldroad and continuing thence still in exactly the last-mentioned direction and in a straight line for a distance of eighty-five yards or thereabouts thereby crossing the said Neeld-road to the boundary which divides the said new Parish of Saint John Kensal-green from the New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist Kilburn aforesaid and extending thence north-westward. for a distance of sixty-three yards or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction in the middle of Canterbury-road with the boundary which divides the said new Parish of Saint John the Evangelist Kilburn from the District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Kilburn aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of three hundred and thirty-six yards or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following the middle of the said Canterbury-road to the first-described point at the junction of the last-named road with the street called or known as Canterbury-terrace as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, in the words and figures, following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirtyseven have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the parish of Easington in the county of

Durham now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of an indenture bearing date the twelfth day of May one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four made or expressed to be made between Margaret Thompson therein described of the first part Robert Ingham therein described of the second part George Thompson and John Dote therein described of the third part Eleanor Thompson and Cuthbert Thompson therein described of the fourth part and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fifth part certain lands and hereditaments described in the schedule hereto annexed became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the lands and hereditaments aforesaid are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in possession but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by

which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of
