A PROCLAMATION,

By and with the Advice of Their Majesties Privy Council, for preventing of False Masters and Injuries which may be done, either to the Soldiery or Subjects.

WILLIAM R.

WHENCE We have received Information, That notwithstanding the great Care that hath been taken by Us, from time to time, since Our accession to the Crown, to furnish Money constantly for the Subsistence of Our Forces, (and so far as the Necessity of Our Affairs would admit,) for the Clearing of their Pay, & for some of the Officers of Our Army, respecting more their own Profit than Our Service, or the Ease or Safety of Our Subjects, have presumed by false Masters to Defraud Us, and by detaining part of the Monies which should have been paid unto the Soldier, have given occasion of Disorders amongst them, and to Abuses and Injuries which have been put upon Our Subjects where the Soldiers have been Quartered: We having resolved to use all Meanes to have all Our Troops and Companies compleat, and that the Soldiers who Serve Us shall be justly and duly Paid from time to time without any Injury to be done them by their Officers, and to prevent all Oppressions in the Countries which might be committed by the Soldiery, by Non-payment of their Quarters, or otherwise, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to give Commission under Our Great Seal to several of the Nobility and Gentry, and thereby Authorizing and Empowering them, or any Three of them, to make diligent Examination and Enquiry in all Places where any of Our Troops or Companies have been, are, or shall be Quartered, whether the same Troops or Companies respectively, have been or shall be compleat in their Numbers, and what Deficiencies are, or may be in them, or any of them, and whether the Subsistence Money and Clearings have been, or shall be duly paid as they ought, and what Injuries or Abuses have been, or shall be committed in the Countries in the Soldiers Quarters, or otherwise, and to redress the same, and from time to time to make such Representations unto Us, as Our Service, and the Good of Our Subjects, shall require, in those Cases, or any of them; And therefore We have thought fit to make publick these Presents, to the end any of Our Subjects or Soldiers, who shall receive any Wrong or Injury in the Premisses, may know where and how to seek Redress.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court the 13th Day of May, 1689. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Their Lordships likewise intending to proceed from Berwick, by Carlisle and Chester, will take Care that timely Information be given in the Gazette of their further Route, and of the Quarters of the Forces that will be visited by their Lordships, in their Return that way.

Their Lordships are also empowered by His Majesty to remove any Regiments, Troops or Companies, from any Quarters to others, and to give such other Directions concerning them, as they shall see cause for His Majesties Service, and the Parties aforesaid.

A PROCLAMATION,

For Prohibiting the Importation, or Retailing of any Commodities or the Growth or Manufacture of France.

WILLIAM R.

WITNESS the King and Queen's most Excellent Majesties, considering the great Prejudice and Damage to the English Artificers and Handicrafts, and the general Impoverishment of this Kingdom, by the Extraordinary Importation and Use of the Commodities and Manufactures of France: And Regarding, with the help of Almighty GOD, by a Just and necessary War, to deliver this Kingdom, and other Their Dominions, from the Insurrections, Aggressions, and Dangers done, made, and occasioned by the French King, did Issue Their Proclamation bearing Date the 25th day of April last, Intituled, (A Proclamation Prohibiting the Importation of all sorts of Manufactures and Commodities of France,) which War Their Majesties have lately declared. Now Their Majesties finding it expedient to alter the said Proclamation, and to the intent to render Their Royal Purposes more duly and effectually, Practicable, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Their Privy Council, to Discharge the said Proclamation; And by the same Advice, do hereby publish and Declare, and straitly Charge and Command, That no Goods, Merchandizes, or Commodities whatsoever, of the Growth, Product, or Manufacture of France, or of the Dominions of the French King, shall at any time after the Tenth and Twentieth day of this instant May, be brought or imported into any of Their Majesties Realms or Dominions, or any Port or Creek of the same: Or if so brought or imported, shall not be Retained, Recovered or Sold by any Person or Persons whatsoever, upon pain of Confiscation and Forfeiture thereof to Their Majesties Use; Of which Confiscation and Forfeiture, Their Majesties are pleased the Informer shall have one Moety; And hereof Their Majesties Pleasure is, That all Persons whom it may concern, do take Notice at their peril, And to that end, do straitly Charge and Command, as well all and every the Officers of the Admiralty, as also all and singular Customars, Comptrollers, Searchers, Writers, and other Officers, and all other Their Loyal Subjects, that they and every of them respectively take special Care, that this Their Royal Pleasure and Command be put in due Execution.

Venice, May 19. We hear from the Levant, that the Ships of this state were cruising in the Channel of Negropont, to hinder the Turks from sending any Succors thither by Sea. That part of the Galley and Galatais were gone towards Abydos; and the rest towards Lepante, to meet the Convoy that have been sent from hence and Dalmatia. That the Doge (whole Health is perfectly re-established) had ordered the Troops to encamp towards Corinthe, and that so soon as those he expected, had joined them, he would open the Campagne, as 'twas believed, with the Siege of Negropont, which the Turks in the mean time continue to fortify with an extraordinary diligence. By a Turkane arrived from Egista, we have Advice, that the Gallics of Malta were arrived there, and that after having taken in the necessary Provisions, they would part from thence for the Levant; wher-

the Prince of Brunswick, the Duke de Guadagni, General of the Land-Forces, and several other Persons of Quality, who are now here, will return with the first Convoy.

W^m Jaw, April 29. The Senate have since the breaking up of the Dyet been several times Assembled, to consider how to raise Money to pay the Army, and to make the necessary preparations for the Campagne; but all the Methods proposed, are found to fall of Difficulty, that no Resolution has been yet taken thereupon; and the King has in the mean time advanced out of his own Coffers, the 4th part of what is due to the Troops, which is to be repaid him by the Republick at the next Meeting of the Dyet. The Court will remove the next week to Yllenaus, and from thence it's said, the King and Queen will take a Journey towards Prussia. They write from Lemberg, that a great Body of Tartars was marching through Moldavia, to conduct a Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition to Capiniec; and to make at the same time, an Incursion on the Frontiers of Russia and Polonia. The last news we had of the Moscovites, was, that they were marched from their Camp on the River Samara, towards the Country of the Krim Tartars.

Ratisbonne, May 13. The Elector of Bavaria arrived at Munich the 10th instant from Vienna, and will part from thence in few days for Donawort, to put himself at the Head of his Army on the Upper Rhine. The Duke of Lorraine is now on his way towards Eslingen and Francfort, having appointed the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Forces between the last of these Places and Coblenz.

Hamburg, May 16. The Conferences are still continued for the adjusting the Differences about the Restitution of the Dutchy of Sleswick. The Sieur Fuchs, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg arrived here this week. And the Heer Van Heemkerke is daily expected in the same Quality from Holland. The Letters from Stockholm give an Account of the King of Sweden's departure towards Schonen: And that 2000 Seamen had been sent from thence to Carefscron, to serve on the Swedish Men of War that are fitting out there. They write from Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenburg will begin his Journey the 24th instant towards Cleves.

Paris, May 28. The Prince de Conti and the Duke de Maine parted from hence the 21 instant for Flanders; and the Duke de Vendome for Alsace; and we are told, the Dauphin will shortly follow. The French Fleet Commanded by the Count de Chastellain is return'd to Brest. It's said they have taken Seven Dutch Merchant Ships, bound home from Curacao.

Edinburgh, May 16. Several new Batteries have been lately raised against the Castle of Edinburgh; upon which will be planted the Cannon and Mortar-pieces that have been brought by Sea from England: and three of the English Regiments that were quartered on the Borders of this Kingdom are expected here to Morrow. Several Parties are sent in pursuit of the Viscount Dundee, who came some days ago with 50 or 60 Horse to St. John's where he in the night seized the Laird of Blair, (a Member of the Convention) and two other Gentlemen, and carried them away prisoners. He had a design upon Inverness, having sent to the Magistrates to demand Money and Provisions of them, but the neighbouring Gentry, who drew together 7 or 800 Men, prevented it. He likewise attempted to have entered into Dundee, but hearing they were there in a posture of Defence, durst not venture thither. Major-General Mackay is now at Inverness, and has given Orders for the Fortifying of that Place. The Committee have appointed some Persons to receive the Duke of Gordon's rents for the use of the Publick, forgiving a Year's Rent to the Tenants, upon condition they live peaceably. And have done the like as to the Viscount Dundee's Estate. The Governor of

the Bass having sent a Message, offering to deliver Capt. Wallace, a prisoner there, to such persons as the Committee should appoint; They have given Orders accordingly. We have an account from Ireland that the Garrison of Londonderry has made another great and successful Sally, killing many of the Enemy, among which were several Persons of Note, and gaining a great Booty.

Holylead, May 13. Yesterday came in here a Vessel from Ireland, with several Passengers, who report that the Protestants at Londonderry had on the 5 instant made another Sally upon the Enemy, of whom they killed a great number, with several of their Principal Officers. And that the Marquis de Puysignan, and the French Bombardier were both dead of the wounds they received in the former Sallies.

Salt-Ray, May 19. Yesterday in the morning Their Majesties Ship, the *Lark* Captain Fitz-Patrick Commander, met a French Privateer under Orfordness, which he chased five or six Leagues to Sea, but by the help of her Oars she got from him; In his return to the shoal he gave chase to another Privateer, and took her in this Bay, she belonging to Du Turke, carrying 53 Men; which Prize he is carrying to Yarmouth.
