REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations should be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

WHEREAS by section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870," it is among other things enacted "that if by any law made after the passing of the said Act by the Legislature of any British Possession provision is made for carrying into effect within such Possession the surrender of Fugitive Criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British Possession, Her Majesty may by the Order in Council applying the said Act in the case of any Foreign State or by any subsequent Order either—

Suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the said Act, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer;—

Or direct that such Law or Ordinance or any part thereof shall have effect in such British Possession with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the Act.

And whereas by an Ordinance enacted by the Legislature of British Honduras, the short title of which is "The Extradition Ordinance (British Honduras) 1877," it is provided that "all powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by a Police Magistrate or any Justice of the Peace in relation to the surrender of Fugitive Criminals in the United Kingdom under 'The Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873,' are thereby vested in and may in the Colony be exercised and done by any Police Magistrate or Acting Police Magistrate for the time being of the Colony in relation to the surrender of Fugitive Criminals under the said Acts."

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the powers vested in any Judge of one of Her Majesty's Superior Courts at Westminster relative to the discharge of any Fugitive Criminal when not conveyed out of the United Kingdom within two months after his committal under "The Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873," are thereby vested in and may in the Colony be exercised only by the Chief Justice or the Acting Chief Justice for the time being of the Colony.

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the said Ordinance shall not come into operation until Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the Colony as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870," but that the said Ordinance shall thereafter come into operation as soon as such Order in Council shall have been publicly made known in the Colony.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870," and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect in the Colony of British Honduras without modification or alteration, as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870."

And the Right Honourable Sir Michael Edward Hicks-Beach, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 41st year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for making provision with respect to the preparation and authentication of Commissions and other documents issued from the office of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and for other purposes," it is enacted that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, make, and when made, from time to time revoke, add to, or alter rules—

Prescribing the form in which documents to which the said Act applies, or any of them, are to be worded; and

Making regulations as to the publication of Royal Proclamations, and as to the towns to which copies of such Proclamations are to be sent, and generally as to the best mode of making such Proclamations known to the public:

Provided that—

Acts of or Bills in Parliament may in all cases be cited by their short titles; and

Whenever convenient, the enumeration of Acts of or Bills in Parliament, of names of persons, or other matters, shall be contained in a schedule or schedules, and in particular, in the case of Commissions of the Peace, the names of the Justices shall, so far as seems to Her Majesty convenient, be placed in a schedule with spaces for additions to be made of the names of Justices to be appointed after the issue of such Commission.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her

Privy Council, is pleased to make the rules set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed for the purposes aforesaid.

RULE 1.

The following form shall be used for Commissions of the Peace under the Great Seal for Counties in England and Wales:—

Form of County Commission of the Peace.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen Defender of the Faith To Our Lord Chancellor of that part of Our said United Kingdom called Great Britain The Lord President of Our Council The Lord Keeper of Our Privy Seal and the other Members of Our Most Honourable Privy Council now and for the time being The Keeper of the Rolls of Our Peace of Our County of

now and for the time being The Lord Chief Justice of England The Master of the Rolls The Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas The Lord Chief Baron of Our Exchequer The Lords Justices of Our Court of Appeal and the Justices of Our High Court of Justice now and for the time being Our Attorney and Solicitor General now and for the time being And the Persons named in the Schedule hereunto annexed Greeting: Know ye that We have assigned you jointly and severally and every one of you Our Justices to keep Our peace in the County of

and to keep and cause to be kept all the Ordinances and Statutes for the good of Our peace and for the preservation of the same and for the quiet rule and government of Our People made in all and singular their Articles in Our said County (as well within Liberties as without) according to the force form and effect of the same And to chastise and punish all persons that offend against the form of those Ordinances and Statutes or any one of them in the aforesaid County as it ought to be done according to the form or those Ordinances and Statutes And to cause to come before you or any one of you all those who to any one or more of Our people concerning their Bodies or the firing of their Houses have used threats to find sufficient security for the Peace or their good behaviour towards Us and Our people and if they shall refuse to find such security then them in Our prisons until they shall find such security to cause to be safely kept We have also assigned you and every two or more of you Our Justices to inquire the truth more fully by the Oath of good and lawful men of the aforesaid County by whom the truth of the matter shall be the better known of all and all manner of crimes trespasses and all and singular other offences of which the Justices of Our Peace may or ought lawfully to inquire by whomsoever and after what manner soever in the said County done or perpetrated, or which shall happen to be there done or attempted And to inspect all Indictments whatsoever so before you or any of you taken or to be taken or before others late Our Justices of the Peace in the aforesaid County made or taken and not yet determined And to make and continue processes thereupon against all and singular the persons so indicted or who before you hereafter shall happen to be indicted And to hear and determine all and singular the crimes trespasses and offences aforesaid and all and singular other the premises according to the Laws and Statutes of Our Realm as in the like case it has been accus-

tomed or ought to be done. And the same offenders and every of them for their offences by fines ransoms amerciaments forfeitures and other means as according to the law and custom of Our Realm or form of the Ordinances or Statutes aforesaid it has been accustomed or ought to be done to chastise and punish: Provided always that if a case of difficulty upon the determination of any of the premises before you or any two or more of you shall happen to arise then let judgment in no wise be given thereon before you or any two or more of you unless in the presence of one of Our Justices appointed to hold the Assizes in the aforesaid County. And therefore We command you and every of you that to keeping the peace Ordinances Statutes and all and singular other the premises you diligently apply yourselves and that at certain days and places which you or any such two or more of you (as aforesaid) shall appoint for these purposes into the premises you make inquiries and all and singular the premises hear and determine and perform and fulfil them in the aforesaid form doing therein what to justice appertains according to the Law and Custom of Our Realm. And We command by the tenor of these Presents Our Sheriff of the said County of that at certain days and places which you or any such two or more of you (as is aforesaid) shall make known to him he cause to come before you or such two or more of you as is aforesaid so many and such good and lawful Men of his Bailiwick (as well within Liberties as without) by whom the truth of the matter in the premises shall be the better known and determined. We also command the Keeper of the Rolls of Our Peace in Our County aforesaid to bring before you at the days and places aforesaid the Writs Precepts Processes and Indictments aforesaid that they may be inspected and by a due course determined as is aforesaid. In witness whereof We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent Witness Ourself at Westminster the day of in the year of Our Reign.

RULE 2.

The same form of Commission of the Peace as set forth in Rule 1 shall be used for the Liberties of St. Alban, the Cinque Ports, Cawood, Peterborough, Ripon, the Tower of London, Westminster, the Isle of Ely, the Town and County of Haverfordwest, and the Isle of Man; the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Constable of the Tower, and the Governor of the Isle of Man being respectively substituted for the Keeper of the Rolls.

RULE 3.

The same form of Commission of the Peace as set forth in Rule 1 shall be used for Scotland, except that the Judges and Law Officers of Scotland shall be substituted for the Judges and Law Officers of England.

RULE 4.

The following form shall be used for Commissions of the Peace under the Great Seal for boroughs in England and Wales:—

Form of Borough Commission of the Peace.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen Defender of the Faith To the Mayor of the Borough of now and for the time being and the persons named in the Schedule hereto Greeting: Know ye That We have assigned you and every of you jointly and severally Our

Justices to keep Our Peace in and throughout the said Borough of and to keep and cause to be kept all Ordinances and Statutes made for the good of Our Peace and for the conservation of the same and for the quiet rule and government of Our People in all and every the articles thereof in the said Borough according to the Form and Effect of the same and to chastise and punish all persons that offend against the form of those Ordinances or Statutes or any one of them in the aforesaid Borough as it ought to be done according to the form of those Ordinances and Statutes and to cause to come before you or any one of you all those who to any one or more of Our People concerning their Bodies or the Firing of their houses have used threats to find sufficient security for the Peace or their good behaviour towards Us and Our People and if they shall refuse to find such security then them in Our Prisons until they shall find such security to cause to be safely kept. And therefore We command you that you diligently apply yourselves to the keeping Our Peace Ordinances Statutes and all and singular other the premises and perform and fulfil the same in form aforesaid doing therein what to Justice appertains according to the Laws and Customs of England. In witness whereof We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent Witness Ourself at Westminster the day of in the year of Our Reign.

RULE 5.

The following form of Commission for declaring the Royal Assent shall be used when Parliament has been opened by the Queen:—

Form of Royal Assent when Parliament has been Opened by the Queen.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen Defender of the Faith To Our right trusty and right well-beloved the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and to Our trusty and well-beloved the Knights Citizens and Burgesses of the House of Commons in this present Parliament assembled Greeting: Whereas in Our said Parliament divers and sundry Acts have been agreed and accorded on by you Our loving subjects the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and the Commons in this Our present Parliament assembled and endorsed by you as hath been accustomed the Titles or short Titles of which Acts are set forth in the Schedule hereto. And albeit the said Acts by you Our said subjects the Lords and Commons in this our present Parliament assembled are fully agreed and consented unto yet nevertheless the same are not of force and effect in the Law without Our Royal Assent given and put to the said Acts. And forasmuch as for divers causes and considerations We cannot conveniently at this time be present in Our Royal Person in the Higher House of Our said Parliament being the accustomed place for giving Our Royal Assent to such Acts as have been agreed upon by you Our said subjects the Lords and Commons We have therefore caused these Our Letters Patent to be made and have signed the same and by the same do give and put Our Royal Assent to the said Acts and to all articles clauses and provisions therein contained and have fully agreed and assented to the said Acts Willing that the said Acts and every article clause sentence and provision therein contained from henceforth shall be of the same strength force and effect as if We had been personally present in the said Higher House and had openly and publicly in the presence of you all assented to the same. And We do by these Presents declare and notify the same Our

to the Sheriffs of all Counties, Cities, and Towns, in England and Wales, and to the Sheriffs of all Counties in Scotland, who are hereby required to make them known in manner accustomed.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Cuthbert situate at Everton in the parish of Walton on the Hill in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Cuthbert situate at Everton as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Walton on the Hill which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Cuthbert situate at Everton as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Cuthbert, Everton.'

"And with the like consent of the said William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Cuthbert, Everton, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Walton on the Hill in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Chester which is comprised within and is co-extensive with that portion of the conventional ecclesiastical district now remaining attached to the church of Saint George Everton which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the chapelry district of Saint Mary Kirkdale in the county and diocese aforesaid from the parish of Walton on the Hill aforesaid at the point where Walton-lane is joined by Walton Breck-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Sherlock-street and extending thence southward along the middle of the said street for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its present southern termination and continuing thence in the same direction and for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts in a straight line to a point in the middle of Calder-street and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Beacon-lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Breckfield-road North and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fourteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Granton-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same road with Oakfield-road which boundary divides the township of Everton in the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the township of Walton-on-the-Hill in the same parish and which said township boundary also forms the north-eastern boundary of the conventional ecclesiastical district attached to the church of Saint George Everton as aforesaid and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned point of junction north-westward along the said township boundary for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts thereby following in one part the course of Oakfield-road aforesaid and in another part the course of Anfield-road to the point at the junction of the last-named road with Walton-lane aforesaid where the same township boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the chapelry district of Saint Mary Kirkdale aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary thereby following the course of Walton lane aforesaid for a distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts to the first described point at the junction of the same lane with Walton Breck-road as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of

Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Yardley in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Worcester.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Yardley which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas by a certain deed bearing date on or about the first day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the ‘New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856’ or of some of them and being under the hand and seal of James Horsfall of Birmingham in the county of Warwick, Manufacturer and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners (which deed is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of your Majesty’s High Court of Justice) the said James Horsfall did give grant and convey unto us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and our successors as an endowment for the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted one perpetual yearly rent-charge or annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds free from all deductions and out-goings and to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon certain closes pieces or parcels of land mansion house and hereditaments situate in the parish of Sutton Coldfield in the said county of Warwick and more particularly described in the schedule annexed to the same deed, and we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners did in and by the same deed declare that the said yearly rent-charge is accepted by us as an endowment for the said district to the intent that so soon as may be the same rent-charge may become vested in the incumbent of the said district and his successors.

“And whereas the said rent-charge has been so given granted and conveyed as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such an arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Yardley which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Cyprian Hay Mill.’

“And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

The District of Saint Cyprian Hay Mill being:—

All that part of the parish of Yardley in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Worcester wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the county boundary which divides the said parish of Yardley from the new parish of the Holy Trinity Bordesley in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Great Western Railway over Hay Mill Brook and extending thence north-eastward along the said county boundary that is along the course of the said brook for a distance of one mile or thereabouts thereby following in part the boundary which divides the said parish of Yardley from the new parish of the Holy Trinity Bordesley aforesaid and in part the boundary which divides the said parish of Yardley from the new parish of Saint Andrew Bordesley in the said county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid to the point where Hob-lane crosses the same brook and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with the lane leading from the Fast Pits Farm to the Old Workhouse and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described lane for a distance twenty-two chains or thereabouts to its junction

with the Birmingham and Coventry turnpike-road and with Timber-lane and continuing thence still south-westward across the said turnpike road and along the middle of Timber-lane aforesaid for a distance of seven and a half-chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bull's Head-lane and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Rushall-lane and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to a point at the centre of the bridge which carries the same lane over the Birmingham and Warwick Canal upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Yardley from the new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Acocks Green within the original limits of the parish of Yardley aforesaid and continuing thence in a direction generally westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts thereby following in part the middle of the last-named lane and in part the middle of the road leading from Yew Tree Cottage to Greet to the centre of the bridge which carries the last-described road over the line of the Great Western Railway aforesaid and extending thence (that is from the said last-mentioned boundary north-westward along the middle of the same line of railway for a distance of forty-seven chains or thereabouts to the first-described point at the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over Hay Mill Brook as aforesaid upon the county boundary which at this point divides the said parish of Yardley from the new parish of the Holy Trinity Bordesley aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly herein-before mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Yardley out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is hereby pleased to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said Majesty chapter thirty-seven ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said of diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty

in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventeenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say :—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain tithe rent-charges arising in the parish of Cheswardine, in the county of Salop, now vested in us :

"Whereas under and by virtue of an indenture bearing date the third day of July one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four made or expressed to be made between Robert William Melvil therein described and the Right Honourable John Lord Romilly of the first part the said John Lord Romilly of the second part the said John Lord Romilly and the Right Honourable Edward Lord Belper of the third part, the Venerable William Bruere Otter, therein described of the fourth part and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fifth part, the tithe rent-charges specified in the schedule hereto annexed became and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the said tithe rent-charges are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but some part or parts thereof are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said tithe rent-charges or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in the said tithe rent-charges or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign all or any of the said tithe rent-charges so vested in us as aforesaid, and all our estate right title and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable ; it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, titles, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed, and in the meantime to invest the proceeds in some Government or parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"SCHEDULE.

"All that the tithe commutation rent-charge or annual sum of six hundred and ten pounds in lieu of great or rectorial tithes arising in and payable out of lands within the townships of Cheswardine Chipnall, Great and Little Sowdley and Godstone in the parish of Cheswardine in the county of Salop which said rent-charge is payable by virtue of an apportionment duly confirmed by the tithe Commissioners for England and Wales on the nineteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and forty-four and is apportioned upon lands in manner hereinafter appearing.

JOHN MITCHELL, Carpenter, WILLIAM STEWART, Sailmaker, and CHARLES WILSON, A.B., late Seamen of the "Conference," of Bristol.

The following is an account of the services in respect of which these decorations have been conferred:—

On the 13th May, 1877, the "Conference" and "Avonmore" and twenty-five or thirty other vessels, were lying at anchor off the village of Huanillos, a short distance from the shore, loading with guano. The village itself stands on a platform or ledge of the mountains, about thirty feet above the sea-level, and the mountains rise precipitously to a height of 5,000 feet. According to the statement of Captain George Williams, the late Master of the "Conference," at about 8.30 P.M., the weather being dark and gloomy, with a calm sea, a severe shock of an earthquake was felt. The ship trembled so much that the masts and yards seemed to be coming down, and the stern moorings parted. The noise of the earthquake, as it shook the mountains, was very great. Large boulders were rolled down the side of the mountains, and, striking against each other, emitted sparks of fire, while the cries of the guano-diggers on the mountains, who were in danger of their lives, increased the terror of the scene. The earthquake was followed by three distinct tidal-waves, which rolled in from seawards at intervals of about ten minutes, rising about fifty feet, as seen by the marks on the shore, causing many vessels to break their moorings and drag their anchors, and submerging the village of Huanillos. The first tidal-wave drove two vessels across the bows of the

"Conference," and carried away her bowsprit and jibboom. The second tidal-wave carried away her starboard bower-chains; and at the same time the American vessel "Geneva" was driven against the fore-rigging of the "Conference," damaging her severely. She then commenced to drift towards the rocks. The "Geneva" was then carried back, and again driven against the "Conference," cutting the latter down amidships, four or five planks below the covering-board. Then a vessel which afterwards proved to be the "Avonmore," was seen for a moment as she was driven at a furious rate across the bows of the "Conference." Almost immediately her anchor-light disappeared, and the cries of drowning people were heard. It was at this time when, as it is stated, "everything was calculated to destroy the strongest nerves," when ships, out of the power of human control, were ranging about in all directions, the sea confused and turbulent, and the "Conference" herself badly damaged, that the Master called for volunteers from his crew to man the jolly-boat. After some hesitation, JOHN MITCHELL, WILLIAM STEWART, and CHARLES WILSON volunteered their services. They rowed away into the darkness, which was then described as so great that objects were invisible at a distance equal to the ships' length, and after some time succeeded in finding and rescuing the Master of the "Avonmore" and his child, the Second and Third Officers, and an A.B. Fortunately there was no further tidal-wave, and when the boat returned to the "Conference" the disturbance of the sea had considerably abated, but the rest of the crew were about to abandon the "Conference" in their other boat, as she was then close on the rocks, with her stern and bows knocked in. Both boats then rowed out to sea. Four vessels, including the "Avonmore" and the "Conference," were totally wrecked that night at Huanillos, five were uninjured from being moored outside of the others, and all the rest were more or less damaged. Numerous lives were lost.

The Board of Trade have further determined to recognize the great bravery and presence of mind shown by Captain Williams, of the "Conference," by a suitable present.
