

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the powers vested in any Judge of one of Her Majesty's Superior Courts at Westminster relative to the discharge of any Fugitive Criminal when not conveyed out of the United Kingdom within two months after his committal under "The Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873," are thereby vested in and may in the Colony be exercised only by the Chief Justice or the Acting Chief Justice for the time being of the Colony.

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the said Ordinance shall not come into operation until Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the Colony as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870," but that the said Ordinance shall thereafter come into operation as soon as such Order in Council shall have been publicly made known in the Colony.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870," and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect in the Colony of British Honduras without modification or alteration, as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870."

And the Right Honourable Sir Michael Edward Hicks-Beach, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 41st year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for making provision with respect to the preparation and authentication of Commissions and other documents issued from the office of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and for other purposes," it is enacted that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, make, and when made, from time to time revoke, add to, or alter rules—

Prescribing the form in which documents to which the said Act applies, or any of them, are to be worded; and

Making regulations as to the publication of Royal Proclamations, and as to the towns to which copies of such Proclamations are to be sent, and generally as to the best mode of making such Proclamations known to the public:

Provided that—

Acts of or Bills in Parliament may in all cases be cited by their short titles; and

Whenever convenient, the enumeration of Acts of or Bills in Parliament, of names of persons, or other matters, shall be contained in a schedule or schedules, and in particular, in the case of Commissions of the Peace, the names of the Justices shall, so far as seems to Her Majesty convenient, be placed in a schedule with spaces for additions to be made of the names of Justices to be appointed after the issue of such Commission.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her

Privy Council, is pleased to make the rules set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed for the purposes aforesaid.

RULE 1.

The following form shall be used for Commissions of the Peace under the Great Seal for Counties in England and Wales:—

and to keep and cause to be kept all the Ordinances and Statutes for the good of Our peace and for the preservation of the same and for the quiet rule and government of Our People made in all and singular their Articles in Our said County (as well within Liberties as without) according to the force form and effect of the same And to chastise and punish all persons that offend against the form of those Ordinances and Statutes or any one of them in the aforesaid County as it ought to be done according to the form or those Ordinances and Statutes And to cause to come before you or any one of you all those who to any one or more of Our people concerning their Bodies or the firing of their Houses have used threats to find sufficient security for the Peace or their good behaviour towards Us and Our people and if they shall refuse to find such security then them in Our prisons until they shall find such security to cause to be safely kept We have also assigned you and every two or more of you Our Justices to inquire the truth more fully by the Oath of good and lawful men of the aforesaid County by whom the truth of the matter shall be the better known of all and all manner of crimes trespasses and all and singular other offences of which the Justices of Our Peace may or ought lawfully to inquire by whomsoever and after what manner soever in the said County done or perpetrated, or which shall happen to be there done or attempted And to inspect all Indictments whatsoever so before you or any of you taken or to be taken or before others late Our Justices of the Peace in the aforesaid County made or taken and not yet determined And to make and continue processes thereupon against all and singular the persons so indicted or who before you hereafter shall happen to be indicted And to hear and determine all and singular the crimes trespasses and offences aforesaid and all and singular other the premises according to the Laws and Statutes of Our Realm as in the like case it has been accus-
