Vienna, May 12.

N Monday last Prince Louis of Baden rereturned hither from Ratisbonne. He has
fent away his Equipage, and will follow himfelf in three or four days to Command the
Imperial Army in Hungary. From whence
we have Advice, That Teckelsy continued
with the Troops he had with him as Widin; and that the
Turks were drawing their Forces together about Sofia.
The Ambassador of Poland had this week a Conference
with Maura Cordato, one of the Turkish Envoys, (his
Colleague Effendi being indiposed) who, as we are told,
again declared that they had no Power to yield to any thing
more than what they had already proposed. The Envoy
of Moscowy has had several meetings with the Imperial
Commissioners appointed to treat with him. The Velt
Marelchal Dunewalt is preparing for his departure for Germany, where he is to Command the Imperial Army under
the Dake of Lorraine.

Francfort, May 22. The Imperial and Confederate Forces are now marching to the places appointed for their general Rendezvous. The Artillery provided by the Landtgrave of Hesse Cassel is arrived here. The Duke of Lorran is daily ex-

pected in thefe parts.

Hamburg, May 20. On Tuesday last the Hol-Rein Minister delivered to the Mediators the final Demands of the Dake his Master; which they communicated the next day to the Plenipotentiaries of Denmark: The chief Points are; That the Dutchy of Sleswicke with all its Dependencies shall be restored to the state it was in at the time the King of Denmark possessed himself thereof in the year 1674; That the Northern Peace shall continue in full force; And pursuant thereunto the Duke of Holftein and his Posterity shall enjoy the Sovereignty of the faid Dutchy, with all Rights thereunto belonging; That although the Duke might justly pretend to the Contributions that have been raised since the faid year 1674, which amount to a Million Sterl. yet he only defires that a general Collection shall be made in the Dutchies of Sleswick and Holstein, as well within the Bailiwicks belonging to Denmark as to the faid Duke, for the rebuilding a Fortress in some convenient place; and that belides 500000 Crowns be paid to the Duke at three Terms; And that the Artillery confitting of 100 Pieces of Brass Cannon, with the Ammunition taken out of the Fortress of Tonningen, when the same was demolished, be re-stored; That the Emperor, the King of Suedon, the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburg, and Princes of Limenburgh, shall be Guarands of the Treaty now to be concluded; And that if these Proposals be not accepted by Denmark before the 10th of the next Month, the faid Duke will be no longer bound by them. We have an account from Berlin, that the Brandenburg Artillery marched from thence the a 8th Instant towards the Rhine, and that the Elector himfelf would follow in few days.

Rhinberg, May 16. Yesterday was figured the Agreement between the Deputies of the Eiector and Chapter of Cologue, and the Baron de Berenfau Coveniror of this place; and in pursuance thereof he and the Magistrates of the Town took this day at Oath of Fidelity to his Electorol Highness Prince Clement of Bavaria; and 400 Brandenburghers, and sive Companies, of the Dutch Regiment of Languentred into the place; where there was before a Garison of 1800 Men, of which 600 are ordered to Arabberg and Werle, and the rest are to go into the Field.

Cologne, May 24. The Confederate Troops before Kerferwaere have begun to attack that place
with their Cannon. The Governor feems hitherto
refolved to defend it; but we are informed that part
of the Garison are enclined to follow the Example of
Rhinberg. We hear from Inspruck that the Duke of
Lorraine intended to begin his Journey the 16th Instant towards the Rhine. In the mean time the Imperial Regiments are marching from their several
Charters to the general Rendezvous between Francfore and Coblenez.

Wesel, May 25. The Elector of Brandenburg intended to part from Berlin on the 22d Instant, and in his way hither to stay a day or two at Maegdenburg to receive the Homage of that City. His Artillery is already on its march. The Troops of Munster were to begin theirs as yesterday, to join the Consederates before Keyserwaers. A Bridge is

laid here over the Rhine.

Roermont, May 25. The Bridge over the Maese near Secchem is finished. And three Bridges are laying over the Rhine at Cologne, Duseldorpe, and Ordingen. The Troops of Brandenburg have raised two Batteries on this side the Rhine against Keylermaert; To morrow those of Munster are expected to join them; and then they will begin a formal Attack.

Bruffels, May 22. On Friday last General Webstenum arrived here from Holland to Confer with our Governor General about the Affairs of the Campagne. We are told that 1500 Spanish Horse are to join the Dutch Army commanded by Prince Waldecke; And that the rest of the Spanish Forces and 8000 Dutch Foot are to form another Camp under the Command of our Governor. The French we hear are drawing together a Body of 15000 Men between Mabeuge and Bouchain.

Amsterdam, May 27. On Tuesday last fix Dutch Merchant Ships arrived in the Texel five of them from Carassow. They parted in the Latitude of 46 with seven other Vessels that came with them from the Wessels, (two whereof belonged to the Wessels India Company of these Provinces) which, as we hear from France, sell in afterwards among the French

Fleet, and are carried to Breft.

Retterdam, May 27. This day arrived here from

England the Earl of Marielorough, Lieutenant General of His Majesties Forces. Nine English Batal lions are ordered to be in a readiness to go into the

Paris, May 31. Yesterday about Noon the King was taken with a violent fit of an Ague, which lafted 9 or 10 hours. The Duke de Noailles is entred with the Troops under his Command into Catalonia, and has possessed himself of some Posts there. We hear from Rome, that they continue to make new Levies, and to fortifie Civita Vecchia, whither they had fent Cannon and all fort of Provisions for The Great Duke of Tuscany is likethe Garison. wife on his Guard, and fortifies Leghorne and Porto Ferrato.

Edinburgh, May 19. There are Letters come from Captain Toung, who was sent to Kintyre with a Detachement of 500 Men of the new Levies, giving an account, that on the 16th Instant they were on their march attack'd by a Body of Men from the Hills, who fired furioufly upon them, but putting themselves immediately in order, they marched up the Hills, and fell upon them, killing some, taking others Prisoners, and putting the rest to flight. The Viscount of Dundee is gone Northwards towards Lochquaber, and Major General Mackar is marching after him. Yesterday in the Evening a Dutch Man of War with 40 Sail of finall Merchant Ships came into this Frith, which put to Sea again this Morning.

Leverpoole, May, 22. Yesterday Major General Kirke with the three Regiments under his Command, which Embarked on Thursday last, set Sail, and were out of fight before it was dark, the Wind being at E. N. E. which has continued so, and at N. E. ever fince; so that it's hoped they will be quickly at Londonderry. Where, as we are informed by feveral Perfons come from Ireland, the Protestants continue to make a very brave defence. On the 9th Instant the Irish sent a strong Detachement of Foot with four Troops of Horse under the Command of Colonel Ramsey, to seize upon a Well near the Town, which the Protestants having notice of, they fallied out, and defeated them with a great Slaughter, Colonel Ramsey with divers other Officers being killed, and feveral taken Prisoners. The Irish Army was so discouraged and weakened with the Losses they had suffered, and the Fatigue they had endured during the Siege, that it was thought necessary to fend them fresh supplies from Dublin.

Falmouth, May 20. Yesterday arrived here a Dutch Vessel in seven weeks from a small Island called Stacia in the West-Indies, belonging to the Hollanders; The Master reports, That the French came in fifteen small Vessels and two Frigats from St. Christophers to attack that Island, which the Inhabitants defended very bravely, and killed about 400 of the French, but the Islanders not being above 100 Fighting Men, were at last forced to submit; and this Veffel hardly escaped to St. Thomas, a small

Island belonging to the Danes.

Plimeuth, May 21. This day arrived here Their Majesties Ship the Rupert, Sir France Wheeler Commander, with a French Merchant Ship of 200 Tun and 16 Guns, laden with Sugar, Tobacco, Indico, Sc. from the West-Indies, which he took as she was going into Brest. The Margaret of London, Thomas Dobbins Mafter, arrived here yesterday from the West-Indies.
