#### INCOME TAX.

WHEREAS it has become necessary to renew the list of persons to supply vacancies amongst the Commissioners appointed to act in the division of Rhuddlan, in the county of Flint, as Commissioners for the general purposes of the Acts of Parliament for granting to Her Majesty duties on profits arising from property, professions, trades, and offices: Now we, two of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, in pursuance of the powers vested in us in that behalf, do hereby convene a meeting of the Land Tax Commissioners for the county aforesaid, being respectively qualified to act as such Commissioners, to be holden at the County Court Hall, Saint Asaph, on Tuesday, the 30th day of April, 1878, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of choosing fit and proper persons to be Commissioners to supply vacancies amongst the Commissioners for the general purposes of the Income Tax Acts for the division of Rhuddlan aforesaid.

Anglesey Union.—Parish of Amlwch.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Amlwch, in the county of Anglesey, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons;

And whereas at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held at the Scientific Hall, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 6th day of December, 1877, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to issue an Order under their Seal of Office, directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57), entitled, ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this parish, as regards the erection of a new Vestry Room.”

And whereas the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolution:

Now, therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty,

intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,” as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding Vestry or other Meetings, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish of Amlwch.

Poplar Union.—Parish of Bromley Saint Leonard.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Bromley Saint Leonard, in the county of Middlesex;  
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS on the application of the Churchwardens of the parish of Bromley Saint Leonard, in the county of Middlesex, made in pursuance of a resolution of the Vestry of the said parish, duly passed on Thursday, the twentieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, the Poor Law Board, by an Order dated the 13th day of January, 1857, ordered, amongst other things, that so much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 57, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, should forthwith be applied to, and be put in force, within the said parish;

And whereas at a Meeting of the said Vestry, held, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 20th day of September, 1877, it was resolved,—

“That the Churchwardens and Overseers be empowered to apply to the Local Government Board for their sanction to purchase the piece of land in the Bow-road, now occupied by Mrs. Bowry’s Almshouses, for the sum of two thousand six hundred pounds (£2,600), for the purpose of building thereon a Vestry Hall and Offices for the use of this parish.”

And whereas the Churchwardens and Overseers of the said parish have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolution:

Now, therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—
