ON Wednesday, the 12th instant, at half-past five o'clock in the morning, His Majesty King George of Hanover, Duke of Cumberland, First Cousin to Her Majesty The Queen, departed this life, at His Majesty's residence, at Paris, to the great grief of Her Majesty and of all the Royal Family.

ORDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Friday next, the 14th instant, for His late Majesty King George of Hanover, Duke of Cumberland, First Cousin of Her Majesty The Queen; viz. :—

The Ladies to wear black Dresses, white Gloves, black or white Shoes, Feathers, and Fans, Pearls, Diamonds, or plain gold or silver Ornaments.

The Gentlemen to wear black Court Dress, with black Swords and Buckles.

The Court to change the Mourning on Friday, the 21st instant, viz. :—

The Ladies to wear black Dresses, with coloured Ribbons, Flowers, Feathers, and Ornaments, or grey or white Dresses, with black Ribbons, Flowers, Feathers, and Ornaments.

The Gentlemen to continue the same Mourning.

And on Friday, the 28th instant, the Court to go out of Mourning.

The Earl Marshal's Order for a General Mourning.

IN pursuance of Her Majesty's commands, these are to give public notice, that upon the melancholy occasion of the death of His late Majesty King George of Hanover, Duke of Cumberland, First Cousin to Her Majesty The Queen, it is expected that all persons do put themselves into Mourning for one week, to commence on Friday, the 14th instant.
