ON Saturday, June 22nd, 1878, the Remains of His LATE MAJESTY KING GEORGE OF HANOVER, HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF CUMBERLAND, K.G., First Cousin to Her Majesty The Queen, General in Her Majesty's Army, were privately removed from Paris, and arrived on Sunday Morning at One o'clock A.M., at Calais, and placed on board a Special Steamer for conveyance to Dover.

The Royal Remains were in charge of Captain v n Pawel Rammingen, Aide-de-Camp to His late Majesty, accompanied by some Hanoverian gentlemen, and were met at Calais by the Honourable S. Ponsonby-Fane, C.B., Comptroller in the Lord Chamberlain's Department.

On arrival at Dover, the Remains were conveyed by Special Train, at Four o'clock, by the London, Chatham, and Dover, and South Western Railways to Windsor Station, where they arrived at a quarter-past Six A.M., and from thence were removed to the Nave in St. George's Chapel, near to the Cenetaph of Her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte. The Viscount Barrington, Vice-Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household, was there in waiting to receive them. The Royal Remains were placed under the charge of the Officers appointed by The Lord Chamberlain, and the Hanoverian Gentlemen.

An Escort of the Royal Horse Guards accompanied the Royal Remains from the Windsor Station to St. George's Chapel.

A Guard of Honour of the Scots Guards mounted at the entrance to St. George's Chapel.

On Monday Morning, the 24th of June, at Eleven o'clock, the Royal Remains were buried in the Royal Vault, in St. George's Chapel.

The Queen, accompanied by Her Royal Highness the Princess Beatrice and attended by the Dowager Marchioness of Ely, was present in the Royal Closet during the Ceremony.

Their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Friedericke and Mary of Hanover, attended by Madame von Heimbruch, Madame von Klenck, Madlle. von Hinüber and Countess Bremer; Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, attended by Lady Suffield; Her Royal Highness The Princess Christian of Schleswig Holstein, attended by Lady Susan Leslie Molville; Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise

(Marchioness of Lorne), attended by Lady Sophia Macnamara and F. Campbell, Esq.; Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Teck, attended by Lady Caroline Cust; His Imperial Highness the Prince Napoleon, attended by the Marquis de Bassano, were present at St. George's Chapel during the Ceremony, in the Stalls, to and from which they were conducted by The Lord Chamberlain.

At half-past Ten o'clock, those who had the honour to receive The Queen's Commands to be present, but who did not take part in the Procession, were admitted to St. George's Chapel, and were at once conducted to seats in the Choir.

Shortly before Eleven o'clock, His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, with His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, His Royal Highness The Prince Leopold, and other Royal Personages, assembled at the South Entrance of St. George's Chapel, and were at once conducted to their places in the Procession by The Lord Chamberlain and The Vice-Chamberlain.

On arrival in the Choir, the Crown, Cocked Hat and Sword, and Orders of His late Majesty, were placed on the Coffin.

His Royal Highness the Chief Mourner stood at the Head of the Coffin, with His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales and His Royal Highness The Prince Leopold on either side.

The other Royal Personages stood behind His Royal Highness The Chief Mourner, and their Attendants near them.

The Supporters of the Pall were on either side of the Coffin.

The Lord Chamberlain stood at the foot of the Coffin.

The opening sentences of the Burial Service were sung by the Choir to the Music of Dr. Croft, while the Procession moved up the Nave; after which the 90th Psalm was chanted to the Funeral Chant adapted from Beethoven.

The First part of the Service and the Anthem (Martin Luther's Hymn) having been performed, the Royal Coffin was lowered into the Royal Vault, after which the Service was concluded, when Garter King-of-Arms proclaimed the Style of His late Majesty as follows:—

Thus it has pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life unto His Divine Mercy His late Majesty King George the Fifth of Hanover, Duke of Brunswick-Luneberg, Duke of Cumberland and Teviotdale, Earl of Armagh, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, General in Her Majesty's Army, First Cousin to Her Most Excellent Majesty Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, whom God bless and preserve with long life, health, and honour.

After which The Royal Personages were conducted out of the Chapel, and the others composing the Procession retired while the Dead March in Saul was played.

A Guard of Honour of the Scots Guard was mounted during the Ceremony at the entrance to St. George's Chapel.
