

partly by the parish of Leigh aforesaid, on the west by the last-named parish, on the north by the new parish of West Houghton in the county and diocese aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say generally on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Atherton aforesaid at the centre of New Bridge which carries Kate-lane over the stream called or known as Lee Hall Brook and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction at or near the house called or known as Far Atherton with the road or lane leading from Nicholas Fold to Four Lane Ends and extending thence generally southward along the middle of the last-mentioned road or lane for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction at Four Lane Ends aforesaid with the road leading from Hindley to Chowbent and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of forty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading past Crab Brow and the Atherton Cemetery into the Bolton and Saint Helen's Trust-road, and extending thence (that is from the last-mentioned point of junction) generally southward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the north-eastern side of the said cemetery) to the point at the south-eastern angle of the same cemetery where the same footpath joins the said trust-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the same trust-road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bee Fold-lane and extending thence generally southward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of fifty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Longley Platt-lane and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twenty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts to the point at Longley Platt Bridge which carries the same lane over the stream called or known as Hindsford Brook at which point the said lane is joined by Miller's-lane and by the road or footpath leading past Grange Farm to Walmsley House and extending thence, (that is, from the last-described point of junction) southward along the middle of the last-mentioned road or footpath for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the boundary at or near to the northern end of the bridge which carries the line of the Kenyon and Tyldesley Branch of the London and North-Western Railway over the same road or footpath which boundary divides the said new parish of Atherton from the new parish of Bedford aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of "The Ecclesiastical Commission Act, 1868," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of 'The Ecclesiastical Commission Act 1868' section three have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Norwich.

"Whereas under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine and duly published in the London Gazette of the nineteenth day of the same month the annual sum of two thousand and six hundred pounds is payable by us to the said Dean and Chapter.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter have agreed with us that a scheme should be laid before your Majesty in Council for transferring to them in lieu of the said annual sum so payable to them by us, the lands and hereditaments which are particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, which lands and hereditaments are vested in us in fee simple and are sufficient to secure to the said Dean and Chapter a clear annual income therefrom, after deducting rates taxes and other outgoings, of two thousand and six hundred pounds.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Norwich and with the consent of the Right Reverend John Thomas Bishop of Norwich as Visitor of the said Dean and Chapter (testified by their having hereto affixed their respective corporate seals) we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any further conveyance or act in the law, the lands and hereditaments comprised in the schedule hereunto annexed shall together with the benefit of the perpetual land-tax charged thereon which has been redeemed, be transferred to the said Dean and Chapter in the manner contemplated by the said Act in lieu of the annual sum of two thousand and six hundred pounds so paid to them by us as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said Dean and Chapter shall be entitled to the rents profits and proceeds of the said property as from the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and that the payment to them by us of the said annual sum of two thousand and six hundred pounds shall cease as from the same date.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act or of any other Act of Parliament.
