A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM R.

W Hereas the French King hath lately caused Our Kingdom of Ireland, in a Hostile manner, to be invaded by a great number of Officers, Soldiers, and others, and hath raised and carried on a War against Us in Our said Kingdom, and furnished Our Ribellious Subjects there with Arms, Ammunition, and Money, to the apparent Danger and Hazard of that Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought fit, and by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We do by this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly prohibit and forbid all and every Our Loving Subjects, and all other Persons whatsoever, within these Our Dominions, to Trade or Traffick with any Person or Persons whatsoever in Our said Kingdom of Ireland, without Our Leave first obtained in that behalf, or Correspond or have Communication with any Person in any Part or Places within the same, except such as are in Obedience to Our Government, upon pain of Our utmost Displeasure, and of being proceeded against as Persons holding Correspondence with Rebels and Enemies. And We do hereby Require and Command all and singular Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, and other Our Officers and Subjects, to use their Endeavours in and for the Discovery and Apprehending of all Offenders herein, to the intent that they may be prosecuted and punished according to the utmost Rigour and Severity of Law.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court, the 6th day of June, 1689. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Vienna, May 29. The last Letters from Belgrade gave an Account, That they were there in a very good posture of defence; That ten Imperial Regiments lay encamped under the Walls of the Town; And that the rest of the Forces were on their march to the general Rendezvous: That the Turks had drawn together a Body of about 16000 Men at Nissa; And that the Viceroy was expected there in a short time with the Ottoman Troops, which had rendezvoused at Adrianople. They write from Transylvania, that General Veterani was marching with a strong Detachment out of the Troops quartered in that Country, to join the Imperial Army, having left Major-General Heustler to command there in his Absence. Prince Louis of Baden is on his departure for Hungary. We hear from Poland, that the Tartars had conducted a great Convoy of

Provisions to Caminiec; Whither they had likewise brought the Booty they got in their late Incurfion into Russia, and, among other Prisoners, the Sieur Boworowski Captain of Horse; Who was a few days after sent by the Bassa of Caminiec to Adrianople.

Parisbonne, June 2. They give an account from Munick, of the Elector of Bavaria's being gone to his Army. And that the young Electoral Prince, who was born the 22th, died the 25th of the last month.

Heydelberg, June 2. Several poor People are fled hither from Spiers, Worms, and Oppenheim; From whence they escaped with great difficulty and hazard, after having seen those Famous and Ancient Cities reduced to Ruines; Neither Churches nor Religious Houses being spared, and the miserable Inhabitants being carried away like Slaves towards the French Territories. A Proceeding Cruel and Barbarous, beyond all former Examples, and which plainly shews, what others are to expect that fall under their Tyrannical Power.

Francfort, June 5. Several Imperial Regiments pass daily by this place, to join those that are now posted on this side the Rhine, over against Mentz. The Duke of Lorraine continues still here, expecting the arrival of the Elector of Saxony, to confer with him about the Affairs of the Campagne. His Electoral Highness is come to Aschaffenburg, and will be here to-morrow. The Marschal de Duras forms his Army between Mentz and Philipsburg. The Marquis de Choiseul is posted with a Body of 5 or 6000 Men under the Cannon of Himmingen.

Cologne, June 7. We have Advice from Switzerland, that the Pope had sent a Nuncio to the Romish Cantons, to persuade them not to enter into any Engagement with France, but to join in the common interests with the Emperor and the Empire. The Confederates have not yet formally besieged Keyserwaert. There is a Distemper amongst the French Soldiers at Bonn, of which many dye daily.

Hamburg, June 7. The Sieur Fuchs, the Brandenburg Minister, returned hither the 5th instant from Copenhagen; Upon which the Mediators, and the other Ministers, who assist at this Conference, immediately assembled; And, it's not doubted, but the Business of Holstein will now be quickly accommodated.

Maastricht, June 4. The Dutch Army draws together near Tongres; Where the Train of Artillery, consisting of 60 pieces of Cannon, is expected to-morrow. At the same time another Body of the Confederate Forces is forming near Rheinberg; And besides these the Elector of Brandenburg will be at the Head of 26000 Men, of his own Troops. The 2d instant the Earl of Marlborough, General of the English Forces, arrived here to confer with Prince Waldeck; And yesterday they went together to the Camp; Whither ten English Battalions are likewise on their march. The French Forces, commanded by the Marschal d'Humieres, are encamped near Pieter.

Hague, June 10. The Prince of Nassau, Stadtholder of Friseland and Groningen, returned hither the 8th instant from England. The Letters from Maastricht, of the 6th instant, give an account, that Prince Waldeck was gone from thence to the Army, with a resolution to march towards the Enemy. The Men of War, fitted out by the Admiralty of Rotterdam, are all at Sea except four. We hear from Vlissingen in Zealand, that 4 Privateers had brought in there, on the 6th and 7th instant, 12 French Prizes

Prizes: two of which were Ships bound to the *West-Indies*, and two others bound home from thence with Sugars, &c.

Brussels, June 8. This morning we had Advice, that 1000 French Horse were come to *Gaesbeek*, and that they had burnt several Houses there, and at *Efingen*, upon which our Governor-General marched out himself with a Detachment of Horse and Foot; But the Enemy, upon notice of it, made haste to retire. The Dutch Army encamped yesterday at *Judoigne*. We have an account from *Madrid*, that the King of Spain had ordered Mr. *Stafford*, Envoy from the late King *James II.* to depart his Dominions in 20 days.

Paris, June 18. The Sieur de *Castagniers de Chasteneuf*, who is appointed to go Ambassador to *Turkey*, has Orders to repair forthwith to *Thoulon*, to embark there on a Man of War, which is to carry him to *Constantinople*. We have Advice, that the King of *Denmark* has quitted the Alliance of this Crown, and resolved to join with the Emperor and the Empire. They write from *Mentz*, of the 8th instant, that the Imperial and Confederate Troops continued their march towards *Coblentz*, where they intended to pass the *Rhine*. That the Elector of *Saxony* arrived the 6th at *Frankfort*, where he had the same day a Conference with the Duke of *Lorraine*, the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, the Prince of *Hanover*, Duke of *Wurtemberg*, Count *Maximilian* of *Stavemberg*, &c. And that the Elector of *Bavaria* arrived the 4th at *Bratten*, having appointed the rendezvous of his Forces between that place and *Bruchsal*. We hear from *Provence*, that the French Squadron, of about 20 Men of War, sailed the 4th instant from *Thoulon*.

Edinburgh, June 6. Yesterday the Estates met again: His Grace the Duke of *Hamilton* acquainted them, that His Majesty had been pleased to send him a Commission to represent His Royal Person in the ensuing Parliament; And that he had received Instructions from His Majesty, to give His Consent to an Act for the turning the Meeting of the Estates into a Parliament; And then to Adjourn them to the 7th instant; And thereafter to Consent, not only to such Laws as may redress the particular Articles of Grievances, but likewise to any other Acts, which they should advise for the Securing the Religion, Peace and Happiness of the Kingdom. His Majesties Commission, and His Gracious Letter to the Estates, were then read; After which the Lord Commissioner intimated, That it was His Majesties Pleasure, That the Earl of *Crawford* should preside in the Parliament, who was accordingly called to the Presidents Seat: Then the Estates passed an Act, declaring, That the Three Estates now met together, on this Fifth day of June, 1689; consisting of the Noblemen, Knights, and Burgesses, are a Lawful and Free Parliament, to all Intents and Purposes whatsoever. And that it shall be High Treason for any Person to do down, quarrel or impugn the Dignity and Authority of this Parliament, upon any pretence whatever: This Act being touched with the Scepter, the President, by Command of the Lord Commissioner, Adjourned the Parliament to the 17th of this instant June. The Lord *Lowrie* was discharged the 3d instant, he having written to his Followers and Vassals to join with Major-General *Mackay*: And the Lord *Tarbat* was likewise set at Liberty upon his Parole to appear when called, and to keep the Peace. Major-General *Mackay* lay, according to our last Advices, with 4000 Men, at the Head at *Strathspye*, within 6 miles of *Dundee*, who was still with an inconsiderable Party in *Bodenock*, sheltering himself among the Hills.

The Laird of *Strathnaver*, the Laird of *Grant*, and the Laird of *Whitoch*, with their Followers, have joined with Major-General *Mackay*, and keep the Passes betwixt *Dundee* and the North, so that he will not be able to get Provisions, being in a very bare Country; and Colonel *Ramsay* with 1400 men has it's believed by this time likewise joined the Major-General; as also Captain *Cleveland* with 1200. It is ordered that a farther supply of Victuals be sent to *Londonderry*, from whence we continue to hear of the great successes of the Protestants, and that the Irish were withdrawn from before the Town. The two Scots Frigats that are cruising between *Scotland* and *Ireland* have taken 30 men of the *Macdonnells* and the *Macdonalds* that were going from *Argyleshire* to *Ireland*.

Plsmouth, June 9. Yesterday Their Majesties Ship the *Nonsuch*, Robert *Sincock* Commander, sailed from hence with his two Prizes to the Eastward. This day arrived here the *Willing-Vind of London*, John *Wanacott* Master, from the *Canaries*; He met yesterday a French Privateer, with whom he exchanged several Guns; After which the Privateer left him.

Weymouth, June 10. This morning a Fleet of about 50 Sail of Merchant ships passed by *Fortland* to the Eastward.

Yarmouth, June 10. This day about noon the *Assurance* Frigate came into this Road with about 100 Sail of laden Collies bound to the Southward.

Plymouth, June 11. Their Majesties Ship the *St. Albans* Captain *Layton* Commander, has brought 3 Prizes to *St. Helens*; and the *Diamond* has taken another.

Deale, June 10. Four French Privateers having forced a Dutch Fireship on the *Goodwin Sand*, the men set fire to her, and betaking themselves to their Boat, got safe to *Ramsgate*.

Deale, June 11. This morning came into the Downs Captain *Robson* in the *Castle* Frigate from the *Barbadoes*; he met off of the *Start* with a French Man of War of 30 Guns, who fired a whole Broadside into him, and killed 2 of his men; but Captain *Robson*, who had but 12 Guns, defended himself so well, that the French Man stood at last from him. We now see on the other side of the *Goodwin* about 60 Sail of Dutch Ships great and small going to the Westward.

Whitehall, June 10. His Majesty was Graciously pleased on Tuesday the 4th instant, to confer the Honor of Knighthood upon *Ed. Mosley* of *Hulme* in the County of *Lancaster* Esq.

Hampton-Court, June 11. This morning a considerable number of Able Seamen, of the Cinque-Port of *Hastings*, in *Suffex*, offered their Service to His Majesty, to serve on Board Their Majesties Fleet, being presented by the Right Honorable the Lord *Abburnham*; And His Majesty received them very Graciously.
