THE Secretary of State hereby gives notice, that the School Board for London Industrial School Training; Ship "Shaftesbury," off Grays, in the county of Essex, has been certified by him as fit to be an Industrial School under the provisions of "The Industrial Schools Act, 1866," for the reception of Boys not exceeding 350 in number, of whom 70 may be Roman Catholics.

THE Secretary of State hereby gives notice, that he has approved of the transfer of the Saint Vincent's Industrial School for Roman Catholic Boys at Tanner's Hill, New Cross, to new premises at Dartford, in the county of Kent, and that the said premises have been certified by him as fit to be an Industrial School for the reception of Boys, not exceeding 200 in number, under the provisions of "The Industrial Schools Act, 1866," under the title of "The Saint Vincent's Industrial School for Roman Catholic Boys, at Dartford, in the county of Kent."

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 39th and 40th years of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "An Act for the preservation of Wild Fowl," it was by the 2nd section provided that any person who shall kill, wound, or take, or attempt to kill, wound, or take any wild fowl as defined by the said Act, or use any boat, gun, net, or other engine or instrument for the purpose of killing, wounding, or taking any wild fowl, or shall have in his control or possession any wild fowl recently killed, wounded, or taken, between the 15th day of February and the 10th day of July in any year, shall be liable to the penalty therein mentioned, and by the 3rd section, power was given to the Home Office as to Great Britain, upon the application of the Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled of any county, to extend or vary the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl was prohibited by the said Act, such extension or variation to be made by Order, under the

hand of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State:

And whereas the Justices of the county of Cumberland, in Quarter Sessions assembled, have applied to me to the effect that an Order should be made directing that the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited shall be varied in the county of Cumberland, so as to be from the 1st day of March to the 1st day of August in each year.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the said Act, and on such application as aforesaid, hereby order as follows:—

The time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited, shall be varied in the county of Cumberland, so as to be from the 1st day of March to the 1st day of August in each year.

And whereas the Justices of the liberty of Pevensy, in Quarter Sessions assembled, have applied to me to the effect that an Order should be made directing that the time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited shall be varied in the liberty of Pevensy, so as to be from the 15th day of February to the 1st day of August in each year.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the said Act, and on such application as aforesaid, hereby order as follows:—

The time during which the killing, wounding, and taking of wild fowl, as defined by the said Act, is prohibited, shall be varied in the liberty of Pevensy, so as to be from the 15th day of February to the 1st day of August in each year.
