Vienna, June 5. Prince Louis of Baden parted from hence the 30th past for Hungary, to command the Imperial Army, which has its Rendezvous near Belgrade. The Ottoman Forces draw together at Sophia, where the Grand Signior intends to appear in Person. Notice has been given to the Ministers of the Allies, of the Emperors Resolution to keep the Turkish Envoys here or at Raab till the Campaign is over.

Hydelsberg, June 4. The Elector of Bavaria arrived the 31th of the last Month at Bretten; where his Electoral Highness took the next day a review of his Forces. Philipsburg is blocked up; and the Troops in Garison here will march to morrow to reinforce the Blockade. The French are going to burn Frankendal, as they have done Spire and Wormes, and threaten to destroy all the Country from thence to Strasbourg.

Basel, June 12. The 9th Infant the Marquis of Chausseul passed the Rhine at Humingen with 4000 Horse and Dragoons, and entred into the Country of Durlach, declaring at first that he came only to forage, and promising not to molest any Persons that should remain quietly in their Houses, which the Country People relying upon, thought they had nothing to fear, but they quickly found what regard the French have to their word; for no sooner had they posted themselves in the places they designed, but the Country was given up to the discretion of the Soldiers, who committed the most outrageous Insolences and Violences that can be imagined; and many of the poor People, after having been plundered of all they had, and abused in their Persons, were driven towards Eriburg and Brisac; Those that could escape fled most of them to the black Forest. The French are now busy in cutting down the Corn, and destroying the whole Country.

Francfort, June 16. The Elector of Bavaria arrived here the 13th Instant; The same day he had a Conference with the Elector of Saxony, the Duke of Lorraine, the Prince of Hanover, &c. and another the day following; and yesterday his Electoral Highness returned to his Army, which is Encamped between Bretten and Uffat, consisting of 22000 Men. The Imperial Forces are now moving on all sides; several Regiments have already passed the Rhine at Coblentz, and others are marching thither; The Troops of Saxony, and Hesse, &c. intend to pass it in other places, and are preparing Bridges for that purpose; and in a few days all these Forces will be in a Body, and enter upon some great Action. The French in the mean time lie Encamped in several small Bodies, intending to govern themselves by the motions of the Confederates.

Hamburg, June 17. The Conferences are still continued for the adjusting the Business of Holstein; the term which expired the 10th being prolonged till the 20th of this Month. In the mean time we have advice, that the Danish Fleet is at Sea, composed of 28 Men of War, under the command of Admiral Spaen, to hinder the Transportation of the Swedish Forces; and that the King of Denmark is forming a Camp in Holstein. The Lauenburg Troops

Troops move at the same time towards the *Elbe*. And the Preparations in Sweden are carried on with great diligence and vigor; but it's hoped matters will be as last accommodated.

**Cologne, June 15.** We are told from *Coblentz*, that 2000 Imperial Horse, and 5000 Foot passed the *Rhine* there the 12th and 13th Instant, taking their march along the *Moselle*, and that the rest of the Imperial Forces with those of *Saxony, Hesse, and Lunenburg*, the latter being commanded by the Prince of *Hanover*, are marching thither; their design, as it's believed, being upon *Mons Royal*; from whence 22 French Deserters are come over to the Imperialists, and have given them an account of the condition of that place. It is agreed between the Duke of *Lorraine* and the Elector of *Saxony*, that the first shall command the Right, and the other the Left Wing of the Imperial Army during this Campaign. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is expected in two or three days in the Camp before *Keyserwaert*.

**Wesel, June 15.** The Elector of *Brandenburg* arrived here yesterday; His Forces with the Artillery march towards *Duisburg*; And on Friday next his Electoral Highness intends to go himself to the Army.

**Roermond, June 18.** The Imperial Regiments which passed the *Rhine* at *Coblentz* the 13th Instant, are come down towards *Bonn*; and are quartered at *Brisick, Remagen, Mariemoort, &c. Keyserwaert* is now formally besieged.

**Brussels, June 15.** Five Regiments of Spanish Horse have joined the Dutch Army, which is Encamped near *Tirlemont*. The Marechal d'*Humières* was according to our last advice, going to decamp from *Pieton*, to retire to *Mabeuge*.

**Hague, June 21.** The Earl of *Pembroke*, Ambassador Extraordinary to this State, and the Duke of *Ormond*, who will pass the Campaign in the Dutch Army, arrived here this day from *England*. We hear from *Masfricht*, that Prince *Waldecke* was gone to confer with the Elector of *Brandenburg* at *Wesel*: The Count de *Nassau* General of the Horse, commanded, during his absence, the Army of the State, which was Encamped between *Judoigne* and *Tirlemont*; where six English Battalions joined it on the 10th Instant, and four more were expected in two or three days. The States have named the Heer *Van Duyvenvoorde* to return the Compliment which the Elector of *Brandenburg* has made them, by an Envoy sent either on purpose upon his arrival at *Wesel*. We had an account on the 13th Instant that 7 Men of War sailed two days before from *Helvoet Sluys* and *Goeree*, with the Merchant Ships that lay ready; and we since hear that the remaining Ships of those fitted out by the other Admiralties, are likewise gone to Sea to join the English Fleet.

**Paris, June 22.** We hear from *Rome*, that the Marquis de *Nigrelli*, who is in the Emperor's Service, was arrived there to command the Popes Forces. The Envoy of *Denmark* is preparing for his departure from hence. Its said that there is some division amongst the Swiss Cannons.

**Edinburgh, June 8.** Major-General *Mackay* was, according to the last Account we had from him, within two Miles of *Dundee*; The Lord of *Strathmaver*, the Laird of *Grant*, and the Laird of *Mackintosh*, keeping the Passes both to the North and East of him; And Colonel *Ramsay*, and Captain *Cleveland*, with the Forces under their Command, being on the South-side of him; So that he cannot get Provisions; Many of his Men have deserted him, and we are informed he has but Nine hundred Foot and 200 Horse. The *Athol* Men, upon the Lord *Murray's* going amongst them, are separated; Some have joined with Major General *Mackay*, and the rest are returning home; none being gone into *Dundee*; Who has been likewise disappointed of his Expectation from the Duke of *Gordon's* Men, few of which have joined him. The Siege of the Castle continues as formerly; and the Besiegers are making a new Trench on the North side of it. This day arrived here a Person with a Letter from Mr. *Walker* and Captain *Baker*, dated at *Londonderry* the 23d of the last Month; wherein they declare, that the Success designed for them may be hastened for the greater security of that place; and give an account, that since they had the Government of it, they have by the Blessing of GOD, been very successful against a barbarous and cruel Enemy, having kill'd at least 70 of their Officers and Principal Men, viz. Two French Generals, Brigadier *Ramsay*, Lord *Gilroy*, Major *Taff*, and many others; And that the Irish Soldiers, for want of Officers to push them forward, betook themselves to their old method of running away, whenever the Protestants met them upon equal terms. They add, That the *Insidling* Men had lately defeated Lieutenant-General *Macarty*, who had laid Siege to that Place.

**Lewerpool, June 10.** We have an account by a Vessel come from the *Ile of Man*, that Major General *Kirke* was forced by the contrary Winds to put in there the 2d In-

stant; from whence he sailed again the 5th with a fair Wind, so that it's hoped he is arrived at *Londonderry*.

**Plymouth, June 10.** Since my last the *Jane* of *London*; the *New York* of *Dartmouth*, and the *Success* of this place are arrived here from the *Barbadoes*. The *Adventure* of *London* from *Virginia*; and six other Merchant Ships from the *Streights*.

**Portsmouth, June 13.** Their Majesties Fleet, with the Dutch Men of War that are at *Spithead*, will sail this morning to the Westward, their Foretopails being loose, and the Admiral having Fired a Gun for the Boats that are ashore to come on Board.

**Deale, June 14.** The 10th Instant the *Berwick, Kingsfisher*, and two Fireships, failed out of the *Downes* for *Spithead*. The *Nonsuch* with her two Prizes arrived in the *Downes* the same day. We hear that the *Larke* has taken 3 Prizes.

**Deale, June 15.** We discern on the back of the *Goodwin Sand* 15 great Ships going to the Westward, which it's believed are Dutch Men of War.
