Hamburg, June 14. The Sieter Fuchs: the Brandenburg Minister, being returned from Copenbagen, the Mediators met again at Alsena on the 5th Instant; to whom, the Plenipotenparies of Denmark Helivered their farther Propofals, confifting in these Points: 1. That there he a General Amnestie. 2. That all bands and Rights shall be reffered, fo as they were heretofore enjoyed by the Duke of Holftein, with the Sovereignty, according to the Northern Treaty, and that made at Fontainbleau, this Restitution to be made immediately after the exchange of the Ratifications; and on the other fide, the Duke to quit all Pretentions about the Contributions that have been raised, about the Contributions that have been raised, . 3. The perpetual Hereditary Union between the two Houses, to continue as the fame has been in all former times, and as it was feeled by the Treaties of 1533 and 1623, and the Parties to renounce all Treaties they have made contrary thereunto, and promise to make none fuch for the future; but other Alliances they may make. 4. The Duke may build a Fortress in such place as the Mediators shall think fit. 5. The King of Denmark will refer it to the Arbitration of the Emperor and the King of England, to fettle the Proportion which the Duke shall receive, of the constant Contributions paid by the Bailiwicks belonging as well to the the King as the Duke, for the Common Defence of the Country; and is willing, that the Duke receive a third part from the tune of the Ratification of this Treaty, till the Arbitrators have declared their Determination therein and in case they do give the Duke one half of the said Contributions, the King will repay, the Duke what he has received above his own half. 6. The King will restore Testau, but for the Lands of Femeren, Steenhorst, and Treems puttel, the Questions ariling thereupon to be farther enquired into 7. That the Ratifications be exchanged in 4 weeks. At the same time, the Danish Ministers declared, That if these Pupposals were accepted, and a Treaty concluded thereupon, the King their Master would assist the Engineers with 2000 Meta against themses.
