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Vienna, June 10.

THE Imperial Forces are, it's Believed, by this time in a Body near *Belgrade*. The Turks continue to affemble at *Sophia*; whither the Grand Signior was, according to our last Advices, on his March from *Asriamople*. Yesterday being the Emperor's Birth-day, when his I. M. entered into the 50th year of his Age, was observed here with the usual Solemnity.

Copenhagen, June 11. Upon the arrival of an Express from *Hamburg*, several Regiments, with the Horse-Guards, are ordered to march to *Holstein*, and the King will begin his Journey thither on the 15th Instant. Admiral *Spezen* went to Sea yesterday with 28 Men of War, to hinder the Transportation of the Swedish Forces. Our whole Fleet will be composed of 40 Men of War in 3 Squadrons; commanded by Admiral *Juel*, and under him by Admiral *Biecke*, and Admiral *Spaen*.

Hamburg, June 14. The *Sieur Fuchs*, the *Brandenburg* Minister, being returned from *Copenhagen*, the Mediators met again at *Altena* on the 5th Instant; to whom, the Plenipotentiaries of *Denmark* delivered their farther Proposals, consisting in these Points: 1. That there be a General Amnestic. 2. That all Lands and Rights shall be restored, so as they were heretofore enjoyed by the Duke of *Holstein*, with the Sovereignty, according to the Northern Treaty, and that made at *Fontainebleau*, this Restitution to be made immediately after the exchange of the Ratifications; and on the other side, the Duke to quit all Pretensions about the Contributions that have been raised, &c. 3. The perpetual Hereditary Union between the two Houses, to continue as the same has been in all former times, and as it was settled by the Treaties of 1533 and 1623, and the Parties to renounce all Treaties they have made contrary therunto, and promise to make none such for the future; but other Alliances they may make. 4. The Duke may build a Fortrefs in such place as the Mediators shall think fit. 5. The King of *Denmark* will refer it to the Arbitration of the Emperor and the King of *England*, to settle the Proportion which the Duke shall receive, of the constant Contributions paid by the Bailiwicks belonging as well to the the King as the Duke, for the Common Defence of the Country; and is willing, that the Duke receive a third part from the time of the Ratification of this Treaty, till the Arbitrators have declared their Determination therein; and in case they do give the Duke one half of the said Contributions, the King will repay the Duke what he has received above his own half. 6. The King will restore *Tristau*, but for the Lands of *Femeren*, *Steenhorst*, and *Treembuttel*, the Questions arising thereupon to be farther enquired into. 7. That the Ratifications be exchanged in 4 weeks. At the same time, the Danish Ministers declared, That if these Proposals were accepted, and a Treaty concluded thereupon, the King their Master would assist the Emperor with 8000 Men against *France*.

On the 6th, The said Proposals were communicated to the Plenipotentiary of *Holstein*, who answered on the 8th, That the Duke agreed to the first and second Articles, with some farther Explanation. 3. That the Union should be maintained according to the Northern Treaty, excluding that of *Fontainebleau*. 4. The Duke to have the Right of Fortifying as heretofore, and building one or more Fortresses as he thinks fit. 5. The Duke to have half of the Contributions raised for the Common defence, without referring the same to Arbitration. 6. That *Femeren*, *Steenhorst*, and *Treembuttel*, as well as *Tristau*, be forthwith restored. 7. That the Ratifications be exchanged in 4 weeks, and the Restitution made immediately after. On the 10th, the Mediators and the other Ministers assisting at the Conference, formed, upon what had been Proposed on

both sides, a Project in substance as follows. 1. That there shall be a General Amnestic. 2. That all things with the Sovereignty shall be restored, as they were before the year 1675; which Restitution shall be made presently after the exchanging of the Ratifications, and the Duke shall quit his Pretensions concerning the Contributions that have been raised. 3. The ancient Hereditary Union shall continue, according to the former Treaties and Agreements between the Kings of *Denmark* and Dukes of *Holstein*, and all Treaties made to the prejudice thereof, and the Dukes Sovereignty shall be annulled, and none such made for the future; but each side shall be at liberty to make other Alliances. 4. The Duke to have the Right of building Fortifications, but shall raise none but at two Miles distance from any fortified Place belonging to the King of *Denmark*. 5. The Duke to receive one half of the Contributions for the Common Defence. 6. The King of *Denmark* shall restore *Tristau*, with the Island of *Femeren*, and the Bailiwicks of *Steenhorst* and *Treembuttel*, but shall retain his Pretensions, which, with other smaller matters, shall be referred to Arbitrators. 7. The Treaty to be ratified in a fortnight: And the Emperor, and such other Princes as the Parties do desire, to be Guarantors of it. With this Project, the *Sieur Britensau* went the next day towards *Copenhagen*; and the Dutch and Swedish Ministers to *Zell* to confer thereupon with the Princess of *Lunenburg*.

Hamburg, June 17. The Ministers that went to *Zell*, are come back, with some Addition in the Project they carried with them; the most material is, That the new Fortrefs the Duke is to build, shall be Garrison'd by 2 or 3000 Men, half *Suedes* and half *Lunenburgers*, who are to take an Oath of Fidelity to the Duke. The Parties are finally to declare themselves upon this Project before the 30th Instant.

Brussels, June 15. The Dutch Army is encamped near *Tilmont*, where 1500 Spanish Horse have joyned it. The Prince de *Vaudemont* is posted with 2000 Horse between this place and *Zoff*. The *Marschal d'Humieres* was on Monday last at *Nivele*, from whence he is since returned to his Camp at *Pieton*, which he is going to remove to between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, and General *Calvo* lyes with 7000 Men between *Conde* and *Tournay*. The French Soldiers desert in great Numbers. Two days ago, 32 came hither, together with a Lieutenant and a Sergeant. The last Letters from *Frankfort* said, The Imperial Forces were passing the *Rhine* in several places.

Paris, June 25. We hear yet of no considerable Action on the *Rhine*. The *Marquis de Chajseul* has passed that River with 8 Battalions and 4000 Horse, to ravage the Country of the *Marquis of Baden Dourlach*. They write from *Toulon*, That 20 French Men of War, and 4 small Frigats, sailed the 9th Instant from the Isles of *Hieres*, under the Command of the *Chevalier de Tourville*.

Edinburgh, June 14. The last Letters from Major-General *Mackay* give an account, That having marched Southwards, as far as *Beggie*, to meet the Troops commanded by Colonel *Ramsay*, and they having joyned him on the 6th Instant, he turned towards *Dundee*, who, he heard, was come to *Edinglassie* with about 2000 Men, but being advanced within a Mile of that place, was informed, That *Dundee*, upon notice of his March, retired from thence that Morning, but some of his People and Servants, who stayed behind, were taken. That marching after the Rebels, he found them Encamped in the Land of *Grant's* Country, beginning to spoil and rob as they had done in other places, being posted in Woods and Strait Passes, where four Men could not march in front towards them; That immediately after his arrival, having notice, That a Party of the Rebels had engaged the Land of *Grant*, who had with him 30 Dragoons, which had been given him for a Con-
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voy to his House, he detached 150 Dragoons, commanded by Sir Thomas Levingston Colonel of the Scots Dragoons, and Lieutenant-Colonel Hawley of Berkeley's Regiment, who encountering near a Rocky Hill about 500, most of the *Maclean's*, newly come up, beat them presently. (they not daring to abide the Fire) and alighting from their Horses, pursued them so closely among the Hills, whither the *Higlanders* retired in great confusion, that they killed about 200 of them; On our side, the Laird of *Ardrour*, and a Captain of Berkeley's, with 5 or 6 Dragoons, were killed, and some few wounded; the English and Scots Dragoons behaving themselves equally well on this occasion. *Dundee* in the mean time betook himself to the Hills again, his Men being scattered, and several taken Prisoners, and His Majesty's Forces still pursuing him: Lieutenant-Colonel *William Levingston*, and some other Officers of the same Regiment, have been secured by Major-General *Mackay*, upon the discovery of their having Intelligence with *Dundee*, and are bringing Prisoners hither. Yesterday in the Evening the Duke of *Gourdon*, finding the Beliegers had advanced their Trenches near to the Ditch, after several Parleys delivered up the Castle upon the following Capitulation, which was confirmed by the Privy-Council. The Duke of *Gourdon* is under Confinement till His Majesty's Pleasure be known:

Articles agreed upon betwixt the Duke of *Gourdon* and Sir *John Lanier* Major-General of His Majesty's Forces, for Surrendering up the Castle of *Edinburgh*, June 13. 1689.

THE Duke of *Gourdon* hath so much Respect for all the Princes of King James the Sixth's Line, nor to make Conditions with any of them for his own particular Interest, so he renders himself entirely to King William's Discretion.

1. That Lieutenant-Colonel *Windrath* Lieutenant-Governor of the Castle, shall submit himself to King William's Pleasure, his Life being secured, and all the rest of the Garrison shall have their Lives, Liberties, and Fortunes secured, and Passes granted to those that will take Oaths not to bear Arms against the present Government.
2. The Garrison is allowed to march out with their Swords and Baggage belonging properly to themselves.
3. That all the Gentlemen-Volunteers, Servants, and others, within the Garrison, shall have the same Capitulation with the rest of the Garrison.
4. That all manner of Persons shall have the benefit of the first Article, who have kept Correspondence with the Castle, and who have not been in Arms, and being at present at *Edinburgh*, or in the same County, shall be indemnified, and have the benefit of this Capitulation.
5. That sick Soldiers shall have liberty to dispose of themselves as they think best, they behaving themselves as *bonobes*.
6. That all the Officers, Gentlemen, Servants and Soldiers, shall have the same benefit which others have, they living peaceably.
7. A considerable Post within the Castle shall be immediately, how soon Security is granted to the Garrison for the above-written Articles, put in possession of those Forces under the Command of Major-General *Lanier*.

Convent, June 12. On Monday last, we had an account of 60 Sail of Ships that were seen off of this Island, which we hear this day were a Fleet of *Straights* Men bound to the Eastward. The *Soldadoes* has brought in here a *Pink*, which came lately from *Bordeaux*.

Wylmouth, June 17. Yesterday passed by *Portland* to the westward a great Fleet of Merchant Ships, and another this Morning, with their Convoy.

Portsmouth, June 16. On Friday Morning the whole Fleet set sail from *Spithead* with the Wind at East, but it chipping about to the West, they came to an Anchor at *St. Helen's*. From whence, they sailed last Night to the westward, the Wind E. N. E.

Portsmouth, June 18. This Morning two Dutch Men of War came to *Spithead*, and there are now in sight from our Tower 15 Sail of great Ships, which we suppose to be the rest of the Dutch Fleet.

London, June 20. On Monday last, about 80 of the City Clergy went in a Body to the Court of *Chancery*, where they took the Oaths required by the late Act of Parliament. The like was done the same day by divers others of the said Clergy in the Court of *Kings-Bench*.

The Grand Juries of *London* and *Middlesex* have of late made several Presentments against *Clippers* and *Falses*
