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Whitehall, June 22.

This day the Lord Mayor of London, attended with the Sheriffs, presented to His Majesty the following Address.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commoners of the City of London in Common-Council Assembled, being deeply sensible of Your Majesties great Care and tender Regard for our Religion, Laws, and Liberties, and Your particular Favour and Condescension to this City, do render Your Majesty our most humble Thanks for vouchsafing to Communicate to us the several Letters and other Papers which have been now read in this Common-Council, manifesting the progress of Your Enemies in Your Kingdom of Ireland, and also discovering a Conspiracy within this Kingdom of England, to Aid and Abet Your said Enemies in their Design to invade and bring the War upon this Kingdom.

And we most humbly beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, that we will as far as our Power extends, oppose our selves to, and suppress all Designs of that nature, and will search after, disarm, seize, secure, and bring to Justice all Persons concerned therein, or contributing thereto; And we are unanimously, firmly, and unalterably, Resolved and determined to stand by, defend, and maintain Your Majesty and Your Government with the uttermost hazard and expence of our Lives and Estates, against all Persons whatsoever that shall Conspire or Attempt anything against the same.

There has been likewise presented to His Majesty a very Loyal Address from the Tanners of Cornwall, which follows.

To the King and Queen's Most Excellent Majesties.

The Humble Address of Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Tanners in Your Majesties County of Cornwall.

THE Powerful hand of Eternal Wisdom, having by a wonderful Providence, seated Your Majesties on the Imperial Throne of this Realm, and thereby rescued our Religion, restored our Liberties, and removed our languishing Laws; We cannot but with Hearts, as full of Admiration as Gratitude, render our unfeigned Thanks to the King of Kings, for disposing and enabling Your most Sacred Majesties, to be the glorious Instruments in so miraculous a Preservation, which seemed to transcend all humane Expectations: And likewise to Your Majesties, for Your great Care of, and Concern for the Preservation of the Protestant Religion, as by Law Established, than which nothing can be more dear unto Us. And now we beg Your Majesties to believe, that we ever will be, as really we are, ready on all occasions, to expose our Lives and Fortunes in Defense of Your Majesties most Sacred Person, against the Machinations of all Enemies to Your Majesties, and this Nation; which that Your Majesties may Govern long in Peace and Plenty, and be afterwards Crowned with Everlasting Felicity; are, and shall be the Prayers of,

Your Majesties most Faithful, and Most Obedient Subjects and Servants.

Smirna, April 16. *Tadic* Bei, Uncle to *Triben* Bassa, who was lately taken near *Sophra*, and Strangled by order from the Vicer, having his Forces greatly increased by multitudes of Robbers, and other loose People which flocked to him, became so formidable that the Grand Signior sent *Nefran* Bassa, and a *Tefrish* Bassa, to suppress him. *Tadic*

engaged with them both, and defeated them; the *Tefrish* being killed upon the place, and all his Troops cut off and dispersed. *Tadic* is now Encamped in the Plains of *Kara*, about 8 days Journey from this City, which hath given us a great alarm, that some have put their Goods on board the Ships in Port; and the Caravans will not adventure to stir from hence for fear of the Forces of *Tadic*, who now commands all these Countries.

Venice, June 11. The Prince of *Brunswicke*, and the Prince of *Harcourt*, are Embarked to pass to the *Levant* with the Conyoy that is now going from hence with 300 Soldiers, and with Money, Provisions and Ammunition for our Army. By a Vessel come from the *Mores* we have advice, that the Doge had appointed the general Rendezvous at *Porto Parro*; and that he had sent Orders to Signior *Venier*, to Sail with the Squadron under his Command to *Scio*, to attack 10 Turkish Ships which were in that Port; That Signior *Cornaro*, Provoditore General of the *Mores*, had posted a considerable Body of *Maynotes* and *Greeks* near *Napoli di Malvasia*, to hinder the Incursions of that *Garrison*. The Gallies of *Malra* being returned from their Expedition on the Coast of *Barbary*, are now gone towards the *Levant*, to join the Fleet of this State.

Madrid, June 2. The King having declared his intended Marriage with the Princess *Marie Anne* of *Neubourg*, Daughter of the Elector *Palatine*; Count *Mansfeld*, who has resided here several years as *Ataballador* from the Emperor, parted from hence yesterday for *Vienna*, to Conduct her thither; It's believed he will take his way by *Portugal*, and from thence by Sea to *England*. And the *Marquis de Leganes* is named to carry the Present of Jewels to the new Queen, who, it's hoped, may arrive here about *September* next.

Warsaw, May 27. The Crown General is gone to *Lemberg*, where the Forces of this Kingdom are to have their Rendezvous the 23 of the next Month; and the King will part from hence the 31th Instant to be present at it. The *Kain* of *Tartary* continued according to our last Advices at *Kilianova*, but had sent orders to his Troops to be in a readiness to march.

Vienna, June 12. We have advice by an Express from *Belgrade*, that the Turks were moving towards the River *Morava*, with a design to pass it; and that Major General *Hofkirken* had thereupon ordered all the Imperial Regiments quartered on those Frontiers, to march towards the said River to oppose them. Prince *Louis* of *Baden*, who is to command the Imperial Army against the Turks, was expected at *Belgrade* on the 10th Instant. They write from *Transylvania*, that Major General *Hewler* was marched towards *Cronstadt*, to secure the Country on that side against the Incursions of the *Tartars*. The Imperial Ministers had this week a Conference with the Ambassadors of *Poland* and *Venice* about the Affairs of the War; and the Ambassador of *Poland* has since taken his leave of the Emperor in order to his return home.

Heydelberg, June 14. The Imperialists that were in *Garrison* here are gone to join the *Bavarian* Forces; and 500 Men of the Circle of *Branconia* are come hither in their place. *Philipsbourg* will be block't up, where the *Garrison*, consisting of 3500 Men, begins already to want Provisions. We hear from *Strasbourg*, that the French are going to undermine the great Church there, which makes it believed they intend to treat that City, when they find themselves no longer able to keep it, as they have done *Spre*, *Wormes*, &c. which are now nothing but heaps of Ruines.

Frankfurt, June 19. The Imperial Forces pass the *Rhine* and march towards *Creuznach*, where some Troops have already posted themselves. The *Bavarian* Army is Encamped between *Bratheim* and *Philipsbourg*; The Troops of *Saxony* between the *Main* and the *Rhine*; and those of *Cassil* from hence to *Cosheim*. Great Store of Provisions and Ammunition passes daily through this place for the use of the Forces that are to act on this side, which will now in few days open the Campaign with some great Enterprize. The Landgrave of *Hesse* entertained yesterday the Duke

of *Erratum*, with the other Princes and General Officers who are now in this City. They write from Baden of the 12th Instant, that the Dyet of the Cantons was to end that day.

Cologne, June 17. The last Letters from the Camp before *Keyserwert* give an account, that they had finished their Batteries, and that on the 15th the Trenches would be opened. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* intends, after the Place is taken, to go and confer with the Duke of *Lorraine*. Yesterday 40 French Soldiers, Armed only with Swords, were seized upon by the Country People within two miles of this place; They pretend to be Defectors. They write from *Basse*, that it was believed the Swiss Cantons would declare for the Allies, at least they were very much pressed to take a Resolution so agreeable to their own Interests, as well as to those of all Christians.

Münster, June 18. Prince *Waldeck* parted from hence the 14th Instant for *Wesel*, to Confer with the Elector of *Brandenburgh*. The Dutch Army is Encamped at *Tirlemont*. We hear from all the Frontier Places of the daily desertion of the French Soldiers in great numbers, notwithstanding the rigorous Discipline that is observed in their Camps and Garrisons to prevent it.

Brussels, June 25. Our Governor-General has sent the Count de *Pontenoy* to Compliment the Elector of *Brandenburgh* upon his arrival at *Wesel*. So soon as Prince *Waldeck* returns from thence, the Dutch Army, which is now Encamped at *Tirlemont*, will march towards the Enemy. And at the same time our Governor-General will take the Field with 10000 Foot, and 4000 Horse. The French Army commanded by the *Marschal d'Humieres* continues Encamped at *Pieton*, being very much weakened by the desertion of the Soldiers; The 22th Instant there came hither 82 Defectors, and the day following 60 of different Nations, who had been a considerable time in the French Service, and declare greater numbers would follow so soon as they could have an opportunity. We hear from the Camp before *Keyserwert*, that they began on the 19th to throw Bombes into the Town, against which they had raised five Batteries.

Paris, June 29. Yesterday was published here a Declaration of War against *England* and *Scotland*. The last Letters from *Flanders* said, that the *Marschal d'Humieres* was Encamped at *Nivelle*: And those from *Rouffillon* give an account, that the Duke de *Noailles* had removed his Camp to *Boulogne*, where he expected a Reinforcement of 6002 Men from *Languedoc*. It is reported that the *Chevalier d'Anfreville* has taken five Dutch Ships in the *Mediterranean*.

Edinburgh, June 18. The Parliament met yesterday. The first thing they did was the passing of an Act for Asserting and Recognizing their Majesties Authority; and afterwards all of them took the Oaths except two, who withdrew. And this day several Members that were absent yesterday came and took the Oaths; after which an Act was read regulating the Articles, whereupon there rose a Debate which continued that Forenoon; and then they Adjourned till Friday. We had yesterday an account by an Express from Major General *Mackay*, That he was coming Southwards, having left a good Garrison in *Inverness*; *Dundee's* Men are all scattered, and he himself retired to *Lochaber* dangerously ill of a Flux, having only with him about 20 Horse. We have also Advice from *Argyleshire*, that Captain *Young* is gone to the Isle of *Mull*, and has defeated another Party of the *Macleans*, and killed many of them. We have an account from *Ireland*, That some Vessels had, notwithstanding the Opposition from *Kilmore Fort*, got into *Londonderry* with Provisions.

Plymouth, June 17. On Friday last came in here Their Majesties Ships the *Hampshire*, the *Mordant*, and the *Tyger*, and having taken in fresh Water for themselves and for the *Rupert* and *Dover* that were cruising off of the Harbour, put to Sea again yesterday. The *Bombard* Ships that were in *Mounts Bay* are come into this Port.

Plymouth, June 18. This day Their Majesties Ship the *Dismant* came in here from the Fleet, which, we suppose, is now in *Torbay*, the Wind proving contrary.

Dantz, June 20. Their Majesties Ship the *Dantz*, a Second Rate, with the *Berkeley Castle*, passed this morning through the *Dantz*, going to the Westward to joyn the Fleet.
