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Vienna, June 19.

THE Ambassador of Poland parted from hence the 13th Instant; having at his Audience of Leave assured the Emperor, that the King and the Republick of Poland will Religiously observe the Alliance they have entered into, and prosecute the War against the Turks with all possible vigor. The Turkish Envoy's are permitted to send an Exprest to *Adrianople* upon condition that he return hither in 50 days; He will be conducted by Water to *Belgrade*, and from thence under a Convoy to the Turkish Frontiers. We have an account that Prince *Louis of Baden* arrived the 10th Instant at *Belgrade*, near which place he found about 15000 Germans Encamped, and that having sent Orders to the Regiments that were not yet come up, to make all the diligence they could, and to General *Piccolomini*, to join him with the Troops on the Frontiers of *Bosnia*, he took his march directly towards the River *Morava*, which he the more hastned because he had received advice from Major General *Hofkirken*, that the Turks were advanced to that River, and were going to make a Bridge over it, and that he was not strong enough to oppose them. General *Veterani*, who is on his march to join the Imperial Army with part of the Forces from *Transylvania*, was according to our last Letters come to *Gharad*, where he was obliged by the overflowing of the River *Thays*, to make a halt for some days. The Ambassador of Poland before his departure gave in a Memorial, desiring that *Moldavia* and *Valachia* might be re-united to the Crown of Poland; But he was answered, That those Countries had voluntarily put themselves under the Emperor's Protection; and Treaties had been thereupon made, from which his Imperial Majesty could not depart.

Frankfort, June 21. On the 10th Instant all the Princes and General Officers that had been several days in this City to consult about the Affairs of the Campaign, parted from hence to join their respective Forces. The 21th three Saxon Regiments passed by this place to join the other Forces of *Saxony*, which consisting in 18 Regiments of Horse and Foot, are Encamped between the *Adain* and the *Rhine*. The Troops of *Hesse Cassel* lie over against *Mentz* on this side the *Rhine*. Yesterday a Person was seized here, who, as it appeared by some Intercepted Letters, held correspondence with the French.

Frankfort, June 26. The last Letters from the *Palatinate* inform us, that the Elector of *Bavaria* was advanced with his Forces nearer to *Philipsburgh*, having his head Quarters at *St. Leonards* within an hours march of that place; and that there was a Discourse that his Electoral Highness would send a Detachment from his Army to join the Duke of *Lorraine*. The Imperial Forces continue in the mean time to pass the *Rhine* at *Coblentz*; where the Duke of *Lorraine* was on the 24th Instant: It's believed his design is upon *Mont Royal*. The Elector of *Saxony* has his Head Quarters at *Risselheim*, and is laying a Bridge over the *Rhine* at *Germerbeim*. The Forces of *Hesse Cassel* are still Encamped between *Cosheim* and *Mosbach* over against *Mentz*.

Cologne, June 26. Our Magistrates have sent Deputies to Complement the Elector of *Brandenburg* upon his arrival in the Camp before *Keyserwaert*; from whence we hear that the Besiegers are advanced very near to the Ditch of the Town, and that they have begun to make use of their Batteries. The Imperial Forces pass the *Rhine* at *Coblentz*, where they have made another Bridge over that River.

Cologne, June 28. The Imperial and Confederate Forces are moving on all sides, so that we shall now quickly hear of Action. The Duke of *Lorraine* came the 23d to *Cob-*

lentz, being met by the Elector of *Trier* two miles out of Town, and went the day following to his Army, which is Encamped about seven German Miles from thence; According to all appearance his Highness will attack *Montroyall*, and stays only for his heavy Cannon, which comes by the way of *Frankfort*, with the Regiments of old *Staremberg* and *Caraffa*, having passed the *Rhine* on the 23d Instant at *Alschaffenburg*. The Duke of *Duras* is Encamped with the French Troops under his command at *Landau*, to observe the Confederates. *Keyserwaert* is surrendered to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who, we are told, has sent a Body of Horse to invest *Key*.

Hamburg, June 28. The Heer *Van Breiten* is returned from *Copenhagen* with the King of *Denmark's* Answer to the last Project about the *Holstein* Affair, which will be this day communicated to the Mediators. We have great hopes that matters will be accommodated. But in the mean time we hear of the motion of Forces round about us, who are drawing together to expect the issue of this Treaty. The *Danes* are forming a Camp of 18 or 20000 Men in *Holstein*, with a Train of Artillery of 48 Pieces of Cannon. The Forces of *Kell* were to Encamp yesterday within 8 miles of *Harburg*, and those of *Hanover* about 6 miles from the Town of that name. The *Suedes* do assemble 3 or 6000 Men between *Lubecke* and *Wismar*, and are likewise bringing their Troops together in the Dutchy of *Bremen*. On Friday last 1000 Men were sent from hence to secure the *Passes* near this City. The *Suedes* have provided 300 Vessels for the transporting their Forces, and their Fleet is ready to Sail from *Carelskrona*; and Admiral *Spaen* lies with the Danish Men of War under his Command in the *Kygerboch* to observe them.

From the Camp before Keyserwaert, June 26. The Elector of *Brandenburg* arrived in the Camp the 24th Instant, and the night following the Trenches were opened. The 22th two new Batteries were begun; the Besieged Fired very furiously, which somewhat hindered our Work; that night the Trenches were advanced 300 Paces, and Count *Charles* of *Schomburg*, Lieutenant-General of the *Brandenburg* Forces, and the Adjutant-General *Nafmer*, were wounded. The 23th the Trenches were carried within 50 Paces of the Ditch of the Town. On the 24th we had finished our Batteries, and began to play upon the Town with our Cannon and Bombes, which set Fire to the great Tower, and to divers Houses. The 25th in the Afternoon the Governor, Monsieur *Maccegnot*, finding the German Soldiers of the Garrison inclined to Capitulate, Bear a Parley, and the next morning the Capitulation was Signed, by which
