The Forces of Helfe Caffel are ftill Encamped between Coffheim and Mologeh overage ant Mentz.

Hamburgh, June 28. The Heer Van Britenau is returned from Capenhagen with the King of Denmark's Antwer to the last Project about the Hollein Affair, which will be this day communicated to the Mediators. We have greathopes that matters will be accommodated. But in the mean time we hear of the motion of Forces round about us, who are drawing together to expect the liftue of this Treary. The Danes are forming a Camp of 18 or 20000 Men in Holflein, with a Train of Artillery of 48 Pieges of Cannon. The Forces of Kell were to Encamp yesterday within 8 miles of Harburg, and thole of Hanour about 6 miles from the Town of that name. The Suedes do attemble 5 or 6000 Men between Lubecke and Wilmar, and are likewife bringing their Troops together in the Dutchy of Bremen. On Friday last 100 Men were fent from hence to fecure the Paffer near this City. The Suedes have provided 300 Veffels for the transporting their Forces, and their Fleet is ready to Sail from Carelferon; and Admiral Spaen lies with the Danish Men of War under his Command in the Kugkerboch to observe them.

The 25th in the Afternoon the Governor, Monfieur Mercegnet, find-ing the German Soldiers of the Garifon inclined to Capitulate, Bear a Parley, and the next morning the Capitulation was Signed, by which
