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His Majesties most Gracious SPEECH to Both Houses of Parliament, on Friday the 28th of June.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE time of the Year being so far advanced, and there being several Acts yet to be Passed for the Safety and Settlement of the Nation; I desire you would Expedite them as soon as you can, it being necessary there should shortly be a Recess; both that I may be at liberty to pursue the Business of Ireland with all possible vigor, and that the Members of both Houses may repair to their several Counties, to secure the Peace, and to put the Militia into some better posture.

I am very sensible of the Zeal and good Affection which you, Gentlemen, of the House of Commons have shewed to the Publick, in giving these Supplies you have done already; And I do not doubt, but from the same Inducements you will be ready to give more, as the occasions Require, which I must let you know, will be sooner than perhaps you may expect, because the necessary Expence of this Year will much exceed the Sums you have provided for it. And that you may make the truer Judgment in that Matter, I am very willing you should see how all the Monies have been hitherto laid out; And to that end, I have Commanded these Accounts to be speedily brought to you, by which you will see, how very little of the Revenue has been applied to any other use, than that of the Navy and Land-Forces.

I must re-mind you of making an effectual and timely Provision of the Money for the States of Holland; And I doubt not but you will take Care to see a fitting Revenue settled for My Self.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I will add no more, but to recommend earnestly to you, to avoid all occasions of Dispute or Delay, at a time that requires Union and Vigor in Your Councils, upon which, the Preservation of all that is dear to Us, doth so much depend: And I do promise, that nothing shall ever be wanting on My part, which may contribute towards it.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM R.

WHeres Sir Adam Blair and Robert Grey Doctor in Physick, being Charged with High Treason for Dispersing a Treasonable Paper, Entituled, A Declaration of King JAMES the Second, have withdrawn themselves and fled from Justice; And the Commons now Assembled in Parliament having applied to Us to Issue out Our Proclamation for apprehending the said Sir Adam Blair and Robert Grey, and taking them into safe Custody: We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby Command and Require all Our Loving Subjects, to Discover, Take and Apprehend the said Sir Adam Blair and Robert Grey, where ever they may be found, and carry them before the next Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, whom We do hereby Require to Commit them to the next Gaol, there to remain until they be thence delivered by due Course of Law. And We do hereby Require the said Justice or other Magistrate, immediately to give Notice thereof to Us or Our Council; And We do Promise him or them that shall

Discover or Apprehend the said Sir Adam Blair and Robert Grey for a Reward, the Sum of One hundred pounds for each of them: And We do also hereby give Notice to all Persons that shall Conceal the said Sir Adam Blair and Robert Grey, or be Aiding or Assisting in the Concealing of them, or furthering their Escape, that they shall be Proceeded against for such their Offence, with the utmost Severity according to Law.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court, the Twenty-fourth day of June, 1689. In the First Year of Our Reign.

Genoa, June 12. The 9th Instant a Squadron of seven Gallies, commanded by the Duke of Turin, parted from hence for Naples.

Madrid, June 15. Count Mansfeldt, the Emperor's Ambassador, began his Journey on Monday last for Germany, to conduct hither the new Queen; and was followed yesterday by the Marquis de Leganis, who carries the Present of Jewels. We have an account from Barcelona, That the Duke de Villa Hermosa, Vice-Roy de Catalonia, intended to take the Field the 12th Instant with 4000 Horse and 6000 Foot, of old Troops; the Militia of the Country making a Body apart. The French have demolished the Fortifications of Campredon; the late Governor of which place is a Prisoner for not having better defended it.

Vienna, June 20. The last Letters from Belgrade gave an account, That the Turks were advanced to the River Morava, and that Prince Louis of Baden was march'd with the Imperial Army to hinder their passing it. The Moscovites are certainly upon the Borders of the Crimea, which has obliged the Tartars to return home, to defend their own Country.

Ratisbonne, June 24. The Count de Argente passed yesterday through this place, in his way to Vienna, to acquaint the Emperor with the Resolutions taken at the Meeting of the Princes at Francfort. The Imperial Forces that are to Act under the Duke of Lorraine pass the Rhine at Coblenz; It's believed the Elector of Bavaria will send a strong Detachment to join them; That General Serini with the rest of the Bavarian Troops will block up Philippsburg to hinder the Excursions of that Garrison; and that the Forces of Saxony and Hesse will besiege Mentz.

Cologne, June 28. The Fortress of Keyserwaert having surrendered upon Capitulation, as you had an account in our last; The Governor marched out yesterday with 150 French Soldiers, who are to be conducted to Luxemburg, the Germans about Five hundred being at liberty to retire whither they please. There was found in the place a great Sum of Money, amounting it's said to above 30000 Crowns, which had been raised by Contributions, 2000 whereof the Governor was permitted to take with him; the rest being left to the disposal of the Electoral of Brandenburg. The Count de Schomberg commands there at present on the part of his Electoral Highness, with a Garrison of 800 Men, to wit, 400 Brandenburgers, 200 HOLLANDERS, and 200 Munsterians. The Duke of Lorraine, who passed the Rhine on Saturday last at Coblenz, is Encamped with above 20000 Men within seven German Miles of that place, and will in few days be joined by the other Regiments, which are now on their march towards Coblenz. The Elector of Bavaria had his Head Quarters the 26th Instant at Leinhard, about an hours march from Philippsburg. The Elector of Saxony is laying a Bridge over the Rhine at Gernshaim between Mentz and Oppenheim; and the Troops of Hesse are posted between Mosbach and Cessheim over-against Mentz. The Elector of Brandenburg has his Quarters still at Heltrup about two Miles from Keyserwaert, but will decamp in a day or two, and march towards Bonn. On the other side the Duke de

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
