

Saint Paul, situate at Clackton on Sea, within the limits of the parish of Great Clacton, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Clacton on Sea as aforesaid.

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Great Clacton, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Clacton on Sea, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Clackton on Sea.’

“And with the like consent of the said Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Clacton on Sea as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Clacton on Sea, being:—

“All that part of the parish of Great Clacton, in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans which is bounded on the south-east by the sea on the east by the parish or chapelry of Little Holland and upon all other sides that is to say on the north and on the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish or chapelry of Little Holland from the parish of Great Clacton aforesaid at a point in the middle of the road leading from Little Holland Hall to Great Clacton such point being near to the house called or known as ‘the Princess Eleanor Public House’ and extending thence, westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction at or near to Valley Farm with the road leading past Lily Farm to Clacton on Sea and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of forty eight chains or thereabouts to a point where the same road bends sharply to the south and opposite to a boundary stone inscribed ‘C. St. P. D. C. 1878 No. 1,’ and placed at the north-western angle of the road at

this point and extending thence first north-westward to the said boundary stone and then south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of fifty-eight chains or thereabouts to a boundary stone inscribed ‘C. St. P. D. C. 1878. No. 2’ and placed on the eastern side of the road leading from Great Clacton to Eastness at its junction with the road called or known as Pier-avenue and continuing thence still south-westward to a point in the middle of the road leading from Great Clacton to Eastness as aforesaid and extending thence first southward then westward and then again southward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of seventy chains or thereabouts to the point where it strikes the sea shore near to, and to the west of the Wash Farm Coast Guard Station, and at the point where the said road is joined by the road, leading to the said coast guard station and extending thence that is from the said point of junction south-eastward and in a direct line to the south-eastern boundary of the said parish of Great Clacton upon the seashore.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.
