Heir Imperial Majesties intend to take a Journy Heir Imperial Majesties intend to take a Journy towards the end of the next Month to Neubowrg, to assist at the Ceremonies of the Queen of Spain's Marriage, which will be performed on the part of His Catholick Majesty by the King of Hungary. From thence their Imperial Majesties will go to Ausbourg; and before They return, it's believed, the King of Hungary will be elected and crowned King of the Romans. We have an account by Letters of the 19th Instant from Belgrade, That Prince Louis of Baden had been to viits Semandria, (whence he had withdrawn the Garison) and the other (whence he had withdrawn the Garison) and the other Posts on that side; and that soeing the Imperial Forces were not yet all come up, and that those with General Hoskirken, who were posted to guard the Passages of the River Morana, began to want Forage and Provisions, which they could not without great difficulty be supplied with, he had seat Orders to the f.id General to reture and joyn the other Forces that were encamped near the Palanque of Hassan Bassa, being resolved to expect the Turkisth Army, which, as was reported, was come to Nissa, under the Condust of the Grand Visier, at the River Jassana. We have certain advice, That the march of the Muscovites has obliged the Chum of Tartary, who was advanced with very considerable Forces into Moldavia, in order to fall into Transilvania, to return home with precipitato fall into Translevania, to return home with precipitation, to defend his own Country. There are Letters which fay, That the Moscovites with a Body of 100000 Men were entred into the Heart of the Crime, and with another Body of the like number had passed the Nieper; and that they design no less than to attack Constantinale this Summer by way of the Black Sea, or by Land, or both. Ratisbonne, June 23. The Emperor has fent hither the Articles of Neutrality offered by the Suiffers, and has defired to know what the Dyet thinks of this Treaty, and whether it be such as cossists with the Honor and Interests of the Empire, to Accept of, and Ratify. And this being a matter of great Consequence, the Deputies have written to their Principals for particular Instructions about it. There happened a Fire at Prague on the 21st Instant, which burnt down the whole quarter of the sews, with 700 other Houses. The Damage is reckoned at 2 Millions.

Hydelberg, June 25. Cologne, July 2. We hear from Coblentz, That several Regiments, as well of the Imperial Forces as those of the Princer of the Panpire, had patied the Robust there to joyn Princes of the Empire, had patied the Rhine there to joyn the Imperial Army which was encamped at M-yen about 7 German Miles from Coblentz. Cologne, July 8.
