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Constantinople, April 9.

HE French Ambassador died suddenly in the beginning of January, in the height of his Negotiation for hindering a Peace with the Germans, and his Endeavours to make Teckeley Prince of Transitvania, whom he supplied with Money: His sudden Deari, and private Burial that Evening, in his own Chapel, made the Turks think, that having made great Promiles to the Port, and told them many things, which they found afterwards to be falle, he was fled for Fear and Shame; His Jawards to be false, he was fied for Fear and Shame; His Janisaries were examined, whether he was really dead; And to take of this Suspirion; some days after, a solemn Funeral was made for him. On the 20th of January the Fartar Flan arrived at Advianople, the Visier having stont his Kia, with 300 Soldiers of his Guards, 20 Aga's, the Chiaus-Bashi with 40 Chiauses, &c. a days Journy to meet him, and going himself, attended by his Aga, the two Generals of the Spahi, with the Spahi in the City, &c. two hours distance from Advianople, where a Tene was pitch'd to receive the Han: The Visier baving reposed half an hour. distance from Adriangole, where a Tent was pitch'd to receive the Han: The Visier baving reposed half an hour, the Han approach'd, and the Visier met him at the Entrance of the Tent, and weat before him, conducting him in, where having drunk Cosfee and Sherbee, they again mounted their Horses, the Visier going on the Right, and the Han on the Left, the Visiers Guards and Chiauses marching before, and the Pages and Musick following, with 300 Tartars; Being come to the Visier's Palace, the entred first, and then the Han, and while he alighted, the Visier stood at the Stair head to receive him, and went before him to the Chamber of Audience, where the Visier before him to the Chamber of Audience, where the Viner lat on the Left Hand, and the Han on the Right, and having had a long discourse, they afterwards supp'd together; which being ended, the Visier vested him with a Sables Vest, which being ended, the vitted min with a saotes very, and then accompanied him to the Stair-head; The Han mounted a Horfe, preferred him, with all the Furniture, by the Vifier, and was conducted to a Palace prepared for him. The next day the Vilier went and vifited him; And him. The next day the Vilier went and vilited him; And on the 23d fent to invite him to his Audience of the Grand Signior; He was first conducted to the Visier's Palace, and after a short stay there, to the Seraglia, accompanied with the Visier; Which they entered at the Garden Gate, going directly to the Bostangee Bashi's (or Chief Gardener's) Lodging, where they disnounted; And while they were drinking Costee, the Visier was call'd to the Grand Signior, and a little after came the Capaga and Capigilar Kia to conduct the Han to the Chamber where the Grand Signior and a little after came the Capaga and Capigliar Kia to conduct the Han to the Chamber where the Grand Signior was. The Han being entered, bowed his Head, and put his Hand to the Ground, and the Grand Signior came down from his Throne, advancing three Steps to receive him, and faluting him with bowing his Head, and then returned to his Throne, the Han hitting on a Stool on his Right Hand, and the Vilier in the fame manner on the Left; After a quarter of an-hours Difcourfe the Han was vefted with a Sables Veft, with great Gold Buttons and Loops, and a 3 thles Cap, with two small Feathers on each fide fet in sewels, and having taken leave he mounted a Horse surnished as for the Grand Signior himself, 40 Tartars walking a Root 2 by 2 before him, next the Chiaus Balhi with his Chiauses, and then the Mafter of the Ceremonics, and after them the Han on the Right Hand, and remonies, and after them the Han on the Right Hand, and the Vilier on the Leit, and behind them the Vilier's Court, and then the Han's Viner, with all the Tarrars two by 2, vefted with Veff's given them by the Grand Signior; And being with this Pomp come to the Viners Palace-Gate, the Vrier, without alighting, faired the Han, and went into his Palace with the Captain of his Goard and his Pages, and the Han, with the reft of the kernuc, went to his Quarters. Several Confidences were held the days fol-Lowing about reducing Figure Baffa, Sciasipier of Hungary, and it was resolved to make a new Serasipier, to which Place one Arab Rageb Basia was preferred, and the Neti-

riam or Arrierban was ordered to be railed, and some Tar-rars commanded by the Han to join them. The Nephew riam or Arrieroan was ornered to be ranca, and hong rar-tars commanded by the Han to join them. The Nephews of Teighen, a Youth of 18 years old, who was going to him with about 40 Men, was not long after taken at Phi-lipoli, and their Heads brought to Adrianople. The Head of lipali, and their Heads brought to Adrianaple. The Head of the Basia of Silistria, who had been Taghen's Kia, was likewise brought to Adrianaple. On the 13th of February the Tartar Han had his Andjence of Leave of the Grand Signior; He was vested with a Sables Vest, and Girt with a Scimitar, Bow and Quiver, set with Jewels, and presented a Horse with Imperial Furniture: At his return from Audience he alighted at the Visier's Palace, where was held a great Council, the Musti, two Cadileskers, and Janizar Aga, and all the Chief Officers of the Januaries, and the two Aga's of the Spahi assisting thereat; The Consult beam gended, all went away but the Musti, who staid with the Han and Viser till Evening; and the next day the Visier accompanied the Han out of Town, as at his first Entrance.

On the 9th of March the Heads of Nighen and 16 of his Chief Officers were brought to Advanable; He went with abour 3800 Men into Albania to one Mahmur Beg, who, commanding 4000 Men in those Mountains, received him at first very kindly, but afterwards betray'd him. This Nighen, from a Robber in Asia, made himself General of the Turkish Army, and for 18 months did what he pleased. The Port was much rejoyced at his Death, which put an end to the Rebellion in Europe; But in Natolia is succeeds not so well, for Gedic Bassa of Sivas, an old Companion of Nighen's, having got together 4500 Men, and being joined by the 800, that went from Seutari, near Bruta, sell upon the Testish Bassa, who had taised the Arrierban, routed there, and kill'd the Testish Bassa upon the place: He makes the Cities and great Towns pay Contributions, and burns the Villages that will not turnish him with Provisions. This gives great Dissi hance to the Port, it hindering any Succours coming from Alia to the Was. The Visiar prepares to go into the circle, and will cash the Grand Signior with him; The Design is, (if Peace be not made,) that the Turkish Army shall pass the Danube, and march towards Tennswaer; And that the Tartars shall enter Transsorman, and make Teckeley Prince of that Country; And the Han, having done this, is to succour Waradar Ginla, and the other Places the Turks are still Matters of in Upper-living any Buttheir Forces are very weak and Provisions mean; And the want of Moncy is great, for they coyn Ginla, and the other Places the Turks are still Masters of in Upper Flougary.
