HE Marquis of Salisbury, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Minister at Quito the annexed copy of a note, which has been addressed to him by the Ecuadorian Minister for Foreign Affairs, explanatory of the notice which appeared in the Gazette of the 18th of February, prohibiting the deposit in boud in the Guayaquil Custom-house and transit through the Port of Guayaquil of certain munitions of war.

Department of Foreign Affairs, ENOR MINISTRO, Quito, January 28, 1879. UNDER date of the 25th instant, and in SENOR MINISTRO, Despatch No. 1, the Honourable Minister of State and of Finance states to me as follows :

In Despatch No. 5S, of this date, I communicate to the Governor of the Province of Guáyas, the following:

Not only the Consuls of foreign countries residing in that Port, but also the Diplomatic Agents residing in this capital, have remonstrated against the Circular to which you refer in your official communication of the 18th instant, No. 43, not only on account of the extensive latitude which may be given to the word "transito" employed in the said Circular, but also with regard to the time required in order to communicate with their respective Goverments, so that foreign commerce may be made aware of the prohibition to receive in deposit those goods which are not allowed to be introduced.

For these reasons, and by order of his Excellency charged with the Executive Power, it is decided that the word "transito" refers to the goods which are deposited in the Custom-house under the denomination of "merchandize in transit;" and consequently the prohibition to deposit them does not prevent their being carried by vessels bound to several ports and touching at Guayaquil; and with regard to the said prohibition to deposit in Guayaquil "goods in transit," in order that it may be brought to the knowledge of foreign commerce, so as to regulate its movements thereby, a period of ninety days is conceded. I communicate this to you in reply to your official note above alluded to.

I have much honour in thus addressing you for whatever ends may be required.
