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Vienna, July 10.

OUR last Letters from the Imperial Camp near the Palanck of *Babban Hassan*, give an account, That on the 24th past Prince *Louis* of *Baden* received advice, that *Teckley* was marched from *Widin* with a Body of Turks and Tartars towards *Nevoigrad* on the *Danube*, in order to pass that River and relieve *Temeswar*; and that Colonel *Guttenstein* was thereupon sent with a strong Detachment, to visit the Posts on that side, and to reinforce the Garisons, and furnish them with Provisions as he should see occasion. That the same day the Regiment of Cuirassiers, commanded by the Prince of *Hanover*, arrived in the Camp; and that the rest of the Forces that were on their march from *Sclavonia*; *Upper Hungary* and *Transilvania*, would likewise have joined the Army in 7 or 8 days; which would then advance towards the Enemy. That on the 25th they had News, that the Seraskier had sent some Troops towards *Bosnia*, and a Body of Tartars towards *Widin*; and that he had laid several Bridges over the River *Morava*: But that the Vicer was still at *Nissa*, being disappointed of the Succors he expected from *Asia*, by reason of the Troubles that were occasioned there by *Tadic Bassa*, who had defeated the Forces that were sent to suppress him. And that the Sultan, who was come as far as *Philippoli*, was upon advice of some new Disturbances, and that a great Faction was forming at *Constantinople* in favour of the deposed *Mahomet*, returned to *Astrampel*. That on the 26th the Count *de Caselli* arrived at *Semandra* with *Mustapha Aga*, who is sent Express from the Turkish Envoys here to the Port. And that on the 27th, Prince *Louis* received Letters from *Transilvania*, advising, That the *Moscovites* were certainly entered into the *Crimee* or the *Little Tartary*, and that the Han was marched from *Budziacke* or *Besserabia* with what Forces he had with him to oppose them, leaving only 4000 Men for the Guard of the Bridge over the *Danube* at *Zorzi* or *Giorgio*. We are told from *Caschaw* of the 4th Instant, that the Count *Corbelli*, who commands the Blockade of *Great Waradin*, had taken a very advantageous Post, called *Ekeret-Bator*, about 4 Hungarian Miles from *Waradin*, the Turks in Garison there, to the number of 150, surrendering upon condition to be conducted to *Jeno*. This morning arrived here the young Count *de Drasowitz* with 12 Colours lately taken from the Enemy in *Croatia*, which he presented to the Emperor, with an account, That the Turks having passed the River *Unna*, with a design to surprize *Zerin*, the Ban of *Croatia*, who was informed, that they were not above 3000 strong, marched against them with 1200 Croats, but that being come near the Enemy, he understood their number was 8000, in two Bodies; however he resolved to attack them, and the Success was answerable to the Bravery of the Undertaking; for engaging the first Body, he entirely routed them; and then advancing towards the other, likewise put them to flight: Of the Turks; above 2000 were slain, and 300 taken Prisoners, among which, is the *Bassa* that commanded them, and several other Principal Officers; and of those that fled, a great many were drowned in the River *Unna*. They write from *Poland*, That the King was going to his Army, with which he pretends to march along the *Niester*, as far as the Country of *Budziacke*, but in the mean time, we do not hear he has any considerable Forces in the Field; and the Tartars from *Camimec* make continual Incurions into the Polish Territories, and carry away great numbers of miserable People.

Ratisbonne, July 7. The Dyet having agreed to the Project for the putting in execution the Imperial *Association*, the same has been sent to the Emperor for his approbation thereof; after which, they will be published, and very strictly executed through the whole

Empire. The Debate has been resumed in the Dyet, about removing the Imperial Chamber of *Spire* to *Erford*, which the Deputy of the Elector of *Mentz* solicites very earnestly.

Francfort, July 17. The Elector of *Bavaria*, after having put Garisons into several places in *Suabia*, and left a Body of his Troops about *Philipsbourg* to keep in that Garison, has passed the *Neckar* near *Heidelberg* with 12000 Men, and had his head Quarters two days ago at *Landhofen*. These Troops are to pass the *Rhine* on the Bridge which the Saxons are now laying over that River over-against *Oppenheim*, and to join the Imperial Army, which will be on the 19th or 20th Instant before *Mentz*; whither 36 Pieces of Cannon for Battery with 6 Mortars and a great quantity of Ammunition, &c. will be sent from hence. The Elector of *Saxony*, who had been here several days, returned yesterday to his head Quarters at *Ruffelsheim*. The Duke of *Duras* is retired with the French Forces under his Command towards *Landau*.

Cologne, July 17. The Duke of *Lorraine* passed on the 12th Instant the great Forest of *Saon*, and encamped on the River *Nabe*, having sent a Detachment, with several Pieces of Cannon, to attack the Castle of *Ebernburg*. The French, upon the approach of the Imperialists, would have burnt the Town of *Creutzenach*, but they were prevented. The two Bridges over the *Rinne* at *Bingen* and *Effel* are finished. The Elector of *Brandenburg* encamped yesterday with his Forces, and those of *Holland* and *Munster*, within an hour's march of this City; the head Quarters being at *Neel*. We have from a very good hand the following account, of the number of the Imperial and Confederate Forces now employed on the *Rhine*. The Army, commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine*, is composed of 20000 Imperial Foot, and 3000 Horse; 10000 Saxons, 8000 Lunenburgers, and 6000 of *Hesse Cassel*. The Bavarian Army, with the Troops of *Suabia*, 14000, which are joined 8000 Imperialists under *Caprará*. The Forces of *Brandenburg* are reckoned at 32000, and those of *Munster* at 6000; which, with the 3000 *Hollanders* that are in this Country, amount to 115000 Men. The rest of the Dutch Troops that were advanced to the *Rhine*, to the number of about 6000, are gone back towards the *Meuse*.

Cologne, July 19. The *Brandenburg*, Dutch, and *Munster* Forces, decamped this day from *Neel*, and marched to *Bornheim*; and to morrow they will be before *Bonn*, where the Cavalry that marched the 15th from *Kerpen* by the way of *Lecknich*, is supposed to be already arrived. The Cannon for Battery, and Mortars, with the necessary Ammunition, are sent thither by Water. The Duke of *Lorraine* has sent Colonel *Erb* to confer with the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and to acquaint him with his Designs. The Imperial Army was, according to our last Advice, encamped between *Alzey* and *Creutzenach*, about 6 Leagues from *Mentz*, where they would make a halt, till they were Masters of the Castle of *Ebernburg*; which the Imperialists began to attack on the 16th with their Cannon and Mortars. This Castle is very advantageously situated, and of difficult access, and has been fortified by the French, with several Outworks. There is in it a Garison of about 300 Men. Some days ago a small Party of 7 Men belonging to *Trier*, took a French Lieutenant and two Dragons, who were going from *Mont-royal* with a Packet of Letters from *Monieur de Louvois* to the *Marquis d'Uxelles* Governor of *Mentz*. The Letters were sent to the Duke of *Lorraine*, containing, among other things, That the King had sent the *Arrierman* towards the Coasts; and that by reason of some Disappointments, he must not expect very powerful Succors, for that there was every where too great occasion for their Troops, the Enemy having never had such numerous Forces in the

Field as at present. The Garrison at *Mentz*, is said to consist in 12 Battalions, and 4 Squadrons of Horse, and 2 of Dragoons.

Brassels, July 22. The Dutch Army, composed of 50 Battalions and 98 Squadrons, making in all about 37000 Men, was encamped the 20th Instant at *Mafly*, about a League from the *Sambre*, and two from *Namur*; from whence they were to decamp yesterday, and to march towards the Enemy, commanded by the *Marschal d'Humieres*, who have, its said, quitted their Camp near *Brinch*, and are retired towards *Mauberge*. Our Governor-General (who went the 18th Instant, very early in the morning, to visit the Prince of *Waldecke* in his Camp; and returned at night) is preparing to take the Field, and in the mean time our Forces continue at *Devins*, under the Command of the Prince of *Vaudemont*. The Prince of *Leige* is forming a Camp of his own Troops, with which is to join a Detachment of the Garrison of *Maerbrück*, and they will make together a Body of 8 or 9000 Men. The Cities of *Mentz*, and *Bonne* are by this time formally attacked. There are Letters which say, That the Conduct of the Siege of *Mentz* will be left to the Elector of *Saxony*, and the Landgrave of *Hesse*: That the Elector of *Bavaria* will send thither 10000 Men; and that the Duke of *Lorraine* will enter with the rest of the Forces into *Lorraine*.

Paris, July 23. The Letters from *Germany* tell us, that *Mentz* is besieged. The Duke de *Duras* was encamped the 12th Instant near *Neufat*; and the *Marschal d'Humieres* on the 15th near the River *Haine*. The *Marquis de Lavardin*, late Ambassador at *Rome*, returned hither this week.

Edinburgh, July 13. On the 9th Instant His Majesty's Commissioner acquainted the Parliament, That a Letter had been brought to him from an unknown hand, discovering, that several persons in and about *Edinburgh* were entered into a Conspiracy against the Government, which they were ready to put in execution; and that his Grace, and the Lords of the Council, had thereupon caused several persons to be secured. It was then moved, that the Parliament would consider, if it were fit to put some of them to the Torture, and an Act was drawn up, and approved, authorizing the Privy-Council, to put such of the said Persons to the Torture as they should think fit, for the making a farther discovery of the said Conspiracy: The Prisoners, to wit *Lieut. Col. Wilson*, *Lieut. Col. Middleton*, *Capt. Ramsay*, *Captain Douglas*, *Captain Butler*, and divers others, have been since examined; and it appears, that they had entered into an Association to join with *Dundee*. Last Night Major-General *MacKay* returned hither, having left good Garrisons at *Inverness*, and other places on that side; and sent several Troops after *Dundee*, who continues with a very small Party in *Loquabris*. This morning we had an account, that 7 or 800 Irish were landed in *Argyllshire*, having been transported by three French Men of War, and several other Vessels, from *Carrickfergus*. But it is not doubted, the Earl of *Argyl*, the Earl of *Glencaigne*, and the Earl of *Argyll*, who are ordered to march westward with a considerable Body of Men, will very quickly give a good account of them. It is said, that the two little Store-Frigates, that were cruising, happening to meet the said French Ships, were taken by them, after having made the best defence they could.

Yarmouth, July 15. There are now in our Road the *Shirna* Merchant, and the *Comarion*, both Convoys to a light Fleet bound to the northwards: And this afternoon came in the *Candida*, and the *Constant Warwick*, with the Ships under their Convoy, from the northward. The *Link* Frigate is likewise come into this Road.

Plymouth, July 14. On the 12th Instant two Vessels came in here from the Fleet, which they left on Wednesday last before *Brest*, composed of about 70 English and Dutch Men of War, besides Fire-Ships and Tenders, divided in three Squadrons. They had taken above 20 small Prizes. Yesterday arrived here from the outward Vice-Admiral *Kathleen* in Their Majesties Ship the *Kent*, who will sail again to-morrow towards the Fleet.

Portsmouth, July 16. There are now at *Spit-head* about 100 Sail of Ships laden with Ammunition, and all sorts of Provision and Ammunition of War, which will sail with the first fair Wind, under the Convoy of the *Forefight*, *Charles* and *Mary Gallies*, the *Perle*, *Soldados*, &c. The Dutch Vice-Admiral *Brackell*, who came some time since into this Harbor to refit, is now ready to Sail.

Deale, July 14. The *English Tyger* has brought 3 Prizes into the Downs. The *Sallee Rose* is gone out this morning.

Whitehall, July 16. His Majesty has been graciously pleased to appoint *Robert Scoble* Esq. to be his Consul at *Leghorn*.

Whitehall, July 17. His Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* parted from hence this morning towards *Chester*, to command Their Majesties Forces designed for the Relief of *Ireland*.
