Venice, July 2.

He 26th past, a Vessel arrived here from the Morea, with advice, That all things were ready for the opening of the Campagne, by the Forces of this State, who were to Rendezvous at Porto Por-

ro; And that the Doge had granted the Greeks of the Morea an exemption from all manner of Taxes for 10 years, whereby he had engaged a great number of them, to take up Arms for the Service of the Republick. That the Proveditore-General Cornaro continued with the Mainottes, and the Militia of the Country, to block up very closely, the Fortress of Napoli di Malvafia; and at the fame time, feveral Galiots and other Veffels were employ'd to cruize on that Coaft, to hinder the fending thither any Succors by Sea. That the Turks made great preparations for the defence of Negropont, having not only repaired the old Forti-fications, but raifed leveral new Works, and particularly, before the Fort of Carambaba. But that their measures for maintaining the War, were very much broken, by the troubles in Afia, where Yedic Baffa gathers ftrength daily, and has already withdrawn whole Provinces from their Obedience to the Port. They write from Dalmatia, that General Molino had been for forne time at Spalatro, where he had taken a great many Morlaques into the fervice of the Republick ; and that he had fent out a strong detachement, to fall upon a Body of Turks, which he had advice were on their march to-Venetian Frontiers. We hear wards the from Zant, that the squadron of Malta, confisting of 8 Gallies, and several Tartanes had been feen off of that Island, taking their courfe towards the Levant, to joyn the Venetian Fleer.

Warfaw, June 22. The King of Poland will begin his journey to Morrow towards Ruffia ; from whence he will go to his Army, which is to Rendezvous about the middle of the next The Tartars that are encamped under Month. the Walls of Caminice, made lately an incursion into the Polish Territories, and defeated two Troops of Horse, who advanced too far. That Knees Galities, General of the Czars Forces, having detached 20000 Molcovite Horle, and as many Coffacks, to observe the Forces of the Tartars, and what care they had taken to fecure the Pattes into their Country, they met a great Body of Tartars, with whom they had a fharp difpute; that the victory at last inclined to the Moleovites . when the Coffacks abandoned them, and gave an opportunity to the Tartars, who ware retiring in great confusion, o rally and to renew the Fight; which the Molcovites maintained for fonce time, but were, through the Treachery of the Collacks, to inferior in number to the Enemy, that they must have been entirely cut off, had they not been timly affisted by a freih supply from the Moscovite Army, which giving them new Courage, they prefied upon the Tartars and Coffacks with that vigor, that they put them to flight; above 30000 being flain upon the place, and all their Bagage taken, with a great many priloners; after which, the Molcovites entred with all their Forces into the Crimee, and took the chief City Pericop. We are expecting the confirmation of these particulars, with an account of the farther progress of the Mofcovites.

Vienna, July 10. Notice has been given to the Ambaffadors, and other Foreign Minifters refiding here, of the Emperor's intended journey to Ausbrurg; which he will begin on the 27th Inftant. His Imperial Majesty will go first with the King of Hungary, to Neubourg, to affift at the Ceremonies of the Queen of Spains Marriage; and from thence to Ausbourg, where he will ftay and from thence to wanson g, where he will hay till the arrival of the Electors, who are, as we are told, to meet here about the beginning of October, to choose King of the Romans. The last Letters from Lelgrade faid, that the Count de Veterani with the Troops from Transfloania, and the Count a Piccolomini with those from Sclavonia, would few days have joyned the Imperial Army: Commanded by Prince Louis of Baden; which in the mean time continued Encamped near the Palanque of Babba Haffan. That the Turks had laid two Bridges over the Moraua, and that fome of their Troops had begun to pals that River ; as for their number, are Letters from the Frontiers, which give this the Reports were very various; The Vizier

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was still at Niffa : And the Grand Signior, as twas confidently faid, was returned to Adria-The, Envoy that is here from the Czars, nople. of Molcour, does affure this Court, that their Forces will give the Turks a very powerful diversion_this Summet,

Copenhagen, July 12. The King of Denmark ter turned hither this Evening from Holftein. The French Ambaffador uses great Endeavours to induce him to embrace a Neutrality; but there feems little appearance of his fucceeding there-On the contrary we are affured, that his in. Majesty does offer to affist the Confederate Princes both with Men and Ships.

Francford; July 17. The Elector of Saxony, who has now his Head Quarters at Ruffelheim, will pais the Rhine with his Forces on the 19th or 20th Inftant, near Oppenheim, where he has laid a Bridge over that River. The Imperial Army is' Encamped on the' River Nabe, within fix Leagues of Mentz.

Cadiz; July 4. The 29th paft, the French Fleet from Toulon, compoled of about 20 Mer of War patied the Streights, and took their course, as we are informed, to the Northward. Our Flota for New Spain, being two Men of War, a Petach, and fix Merchants Ships, commanded by the Cende de Villanneba, is come down from Puntal to this Bay, where they are now lading in all hafte ; intending to depart in 10 or 12 days. The 1st Instant arrived here from the Havana, 3 Spanish men of War, and a Flyboat, who were feparated by bad weather from their Admiral, 45 days fince, in the Bay of Bahama; Thefe men of War went from hence to convoy our laft Quickfilver Ships. There are now in this Port, the John, Capt. Clare; the Mauritania, Capt. Morley; the Hopowel, Capt! Ravens ; the Merchant Adventure, Capt. Funel; the Laurence , Capt. Willis; the, Popley Capt. Wilmit ; the Welcome, Capt. Freeke ; the John and Samue', Capt. Mitchell; and Swan Capt. Hobman ; who are upon the their departure, with the Oflend Convoy for England.

Faris, July 27. The Popes Nuncio parted from hence yefferday, on his return to Italy, with more company than he defired, having with him an Officer, who is appointed by the Court, to accompany him to the Frontiers of this Kingdoin. The great Heats have obliged the French Troops in Catalonia to retire into Quarters; They have had feveral rencounters with the Spaniards ; But we do not hear the particulars, which makes us think they are not to our advamage. Several Gentlemen of the Lower Poston, of Perigort, and In Marche have been taken up, for being concerned in fome Matters with the Duke de la Force, that are not made publick. We have yet no, certain advice that Montz is belieged.

Edinburgh, July 15. It is confirmed that the number of Mon shipt at Carrick fergus, were 700

Foot and 60 Horfe, in three fmall Frigats, with fome other Veffels: They were feen be-yond Kympre going Northward, fo that it's believed they are gone towards Lochaber, to joyn with Dundee. We have an account that an Irish Boat, with some Horses, was put into Ctyd, and there feized. Major-General Mackay and the Earl of Levin, will leave this place on Monday

next, in order to march towards the North. Leverpoole, July 18. There are come into this River, and into Highlake a great many Veffels, which are taken into their Majefties Service, to transport the Forces for Ireland. We have an account by a Perfon who came from Dublin on the 1 oth Inftant, That the Protestants of Infskilling had taken 15 Waggons that were going towards the North, with Arms and Provisions, and two Firkins full of Money, having cut off 400 Men that were fent to Conyoy them. And that the Befieged in Londonderry, continued to make a very brave and vigorous Defence and greatly to annoy the Enemy with their frequent Sallies.
