Venice, July 2.

THe 26th past, a Vessel arrived here from the *Morea*, with advice, That all things were ready for the opening of the Campaign, by the Forces of this State, who were to Rendezvous at *Porto Porro*; And that the Doge had granted the Greeks of the *Morea* an exemption from all manner of Taxes for 10 years, whereby he had engaged a great number of them, to take up Arms for the Service of the Republick. That the *Proveditore-General Cornaro* continued with the *Mainottes*, and the Militia of the Country, to block up very closely, the Fortreils of *Napoli di Malvasia*; and at the same time, several Gallies and other Vessels were employ'd to cruize on that Coast, to hinder the sending thither any Succors by Sea. That the Turks made great preparations for the defence of *Negropont*, having not only repaired the old Fortifications, but raised several new Works, and particularly, before the Fort of *Carrababa*. But that their measures for maintaining the War, were very much broken, by the troubles in *Asia*, where *Yedic Bassa* gathers strength daily, and has already withdrawn whole Provinces from their Obedience to the Port. They write from *Dalmatia*, that General *Molino* had been for some time at *Spalatro*, where he had taken a great many Morlaques into the service of the Republick; and that he had sent out a strong detachment, to fall upon a Body of Turks, which he had advice were on their march towards the Venetian Frontiers. We hear from *Zant*, that the Squadron of *Malta*, consisting of 8 Gallies, and several Tartanes had been seen off of that Island, taking their course towards the *Levant*, to joyn the Venetian Fleet.

Warsaw, June 22. The King of Poland will begin his journey to Morrow towards *Russia*; from whence he will go to his Army, which is to Rendezvous about the middle of the next Month. The Tartars that are encamped under the Walls of *Caminice*, made lately an incursion into the Polish Territories, and defeated two Troops of Horse, who advanced too far. There are Letters from the Frontiers, which give this

account of the late Action between the Moscovites and the Tartars. That *Knees Galitzy*, General of the Czars Forces, having detached 20000 Moscovite Horse, and as many Cossacks, to observe the Forces of the Tartars, and what care they had taken to secure the Passes into their Country, they met a great Body of Tartars, with whom they had a sharp dispute; that the victory at last inclined to the Moscovites; when the Cossacks abandoned them, and gave an opportunity to the Tartars, who were retiring in great confusion, to rally and to renew the Fight; which the Moscovites maintained for some time, but were, through the Treachery of the Cossacks, so inferior in number to the Enemy, that they must have been entirely cut off, had they not been timely assisted by a fresh supply from the Moscovite Army, which giving them new Courage, they pressed upon the Tartars and Cossacks with that vigor, that they put them to flight; above 30000 being slain upon the place, and all their Bagage taken, with a great many prisoners; after which, the Moscovites entred with all their Forces into the *Crimee*, and took the chief City *Pericop*. We are expecting the confirmation of these particulars, with an account of the farther progress of the Moscovites.

Vienna, July 10. Notice has been given to the Ambassadors, and other Foreign Ministers residing here, of the Emperor's intended journey to *Ausbrugg*; which he will begin on the 27th Instant. His Imperial Majesty will go first with the King of *Hungary*, to *Neubourg*, to assist at the Ceremonies of the Queen of *Spain's* Marriage; and from thence to *Ausbrugg*, where he will stay till the arrival of the Electors, who are, as we are told, to meet here about the beginning of *October*, to choose a King of the *Romans*. The last Letters from *Belgrade* said, that the Count *de Veterani* with the Troops from *Transylvania*, and the Count *de Piccolomini* with those from *Scalavonia*, would in few days have joyned the Imperial Army. Commanded by Prince *Louis* of *Baden*; which in the mean time continued Encamped near the Palanque of *Babba Hassan*. That the Turks had laid two Bridges over the *Morava*, and that some of their Troops had begun to pass that River; as for their number, the Reports were very various; The Vizier

was still at *Nissa*: And the Grand Signior, as 'twas confidently said, was returned to *Adriano-ple*. The Envoy that is here from the Czars of *Moscow*, does assure this Court, that their Forces will give the Turks a very powerful diversion this Summer.

Copenhagen, July 12. The King of *Denmark* returned hither this Evening from *Holstein*. The French Ambassador uses great Endeavours to induce him to embrace a Neutrality; but there seems little appearance of his succeeding therein. On the contrary we are assured, that his Majesty does offer to assist the Confederate Princes both with Men and Ships.

Frankfort, July 17. The Elector of *Saxony*, who has now his Head Quarters at *Russelheim*, will pass the *Rhine* with his Forces on the 19th or 20th Instant, near *Oppenheim*, where he has laid a Bridge over that River. The Imperial Army is Encamped on the River *Nabe*, within six Leagues of *Mentz*.

Cádiz, July 4. The 29th past, the French Fleet from *Toulon*, composed of about 20 Men of War passed the *Streights*, and took their course, as we are informed, to the Northward. Our Flota for *New Spain*, being two Men of War, a Petach, and six Merchants Ships, commanded by the *Conde de Villanueva*, is come down from *Punta* to this Bay, where they are now lading in all haste; intending to depart in 10 or 12 days. The 1st Instant arrived here from the *Havana*, 3 Spanish men of War, and a Flyboat, who were separated by bad weather from their Admiral, 45 days since, in the Bay of *Bahama*; These men of War went from hence to convoy our last Quicksilver Ships. There are now in this Port, the *John*, Capt. *Clare*; the *Mauritania*, Capt. *Morley*; the *Hopewell*, Capt. *Rayons*; the Merchant *Adventure*, Capt. *Femel*; the *Lawrence*, Capt. *Willis*; the *Popley*, Capt. *Wilmot*; the *Welcome*, Capt. *Frecke*; the *John and Samuel*, Capt. *Mitchell*; and the *Swan*, Capt. *Hobmar*; who are upon their departure, with the *Ossend* Convoy for *England*.

Paris, July 27. The Popes Nuncio parted from hence yesterday, on his return to *Italy*, with more company than he desired, having with him an Officer, who is appointed by the Court, to accompany him to the Frontiers of this Kingdom. The great Heats have obliged the French Troops in *Catalonia* to retire into Quarters; They have had several rencounters with the Spaniards; But we do not hear the particulars, which makes us think they are not to our advantage. Several Gentlemen of the Lower *Poitou*, of *Perigot*, and *la Marche* have been taken up, for being concerned in some Matters with the Duke de *la Force*, that are not made publick. We have yet no certain advice that *Mentz* is besieged.

Edinburgh, July 15. It is confirmed that the number of Men shipped at *Carrickfergus*, were 700

Foot and 60 Horse, in three small Frigates, with some other Vessels: They were seen beyond *Kynyre* going Northward, so that it's believed they are gone towards *Lochaber*, to joyn with *Dundee*. We have an account that an Irish Boat, with some Horles, was put into *Clyde*; and there seized. Major-General *Mackay* and the Earl of *Levin*, will leave this place on Monday next, in order to march towards the North.

Liverpool, July 18. There are come into this River, and into *Highbake* a great many Vessels, which are taken into their Majesties Service, to transport the Forces for *Ireland*. We have an account by a Person who came from *Dublin* on the 10th Instant, That the Protestants of *Dist-skieling* had taken 15 Waggons that were going towards the North, with Arms and Provisions, and two Firkins full of Money, having cut off 400 Men that were sent to Convooy them. And that the Besieged in *Londonderry* continued to make a very brave and vigorous Defence, and greatly to annoy the Enemy with their frequent Sallies.
