

2780, and the population of the said parish of Moseley 1500, and that since that date the new parish of Saint Anne Moseley, has been taken from Moseley parish.

"That in the event of the separation of the said portion of land from the parish of Yardley, and its annexation to the parish of Moseley for ecclesiastical purposes, it is proposed to erect a building to serve as a chapel of ease to the parish church of Moseley, whereby sufficient accommodation will be provided for Divine service for the people of the parish.

"That a suitable site has been offered for such building, and a considerable sum of money has been provided for the purpose.

"That in view of all these circumstances, it appears to me desirable that the said portion of land should under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament 1 and 2 Vic. c. 106, and 2 and 3 Vic. c. 49, be separated from the said parish of Yardley, and be annexed to the said parish of Moseley for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament, I have drawn up a scheme in writing, appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, fees and other payments, and rights to pews or seats may be made with justice to all parties interested; and I beg leave to submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Reverend Joseph Dodd, patron of the benefice of Yardley, of the Reverend George William Murray, patron of the benefice of Moseley, of the Reverend Frederic Sutton Dodd, vicar of Yardley, and of the Reverend William Harrison Colmore, vicar of Moseley.

"Given under my hand at Hartlebury this 24th day of April, 1879. "H. Worcester."

And whereas the scheme and consents mentioned in the said representation are in the words following:—

#### "SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the portion of land described in the foregoing representation from the parish of Yardley to which it now belongs, and to annex it to the parish of Moseley for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the vicar of Moseley shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said portion.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said portion of land in the church of the said parish of Moseley, and that the fees for all such offices shall belong to the vicar of Moseley.

"That the inhabitants of the said portion of land shall not be entitled to accommodation in the church of the said parish of Yardley, except any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or seats therein, and who may not be willing to give up the same." #### "CONSENTS.

"I, Joseph Dodd, Clerk, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Yardley, in case the same were now vacant, and I, George William Murray, Clerk, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Moseley, in case the same were now vacant, and I, Frederic Sutton Dodd, vicar of Yardley, and I, William

Harrison Colmore, vicar of Moseley, do hereby signify our consent to the scheme above proposed.

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Worcester hath transmitted the said scheme to the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury together with the said consents.

And whereas the said Lord Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme hath certified the same and such consents as aforesaid by his report to Her Majesty in Council, which report is dated the 6th day of May, 1879, and is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent in Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Henry Lord Bishop of Worcester has represented unto us (amongst other things):

"That the parish of Yardley in the county and diocese of Worcester comprises amongst other places a portion of land bounded on the south by the new parish of Yardley Wood on the west by the new parish of King's Heath on north by the new parish of Moseley and separated from the remaining part of the parish of Yardley on the east by that part of Stony-lane which lies to the south of the point where Belle-walk enters into the said lane to where the said lane crosses the Wake Green-road thence by that part of the Wake Green-road which lies between the said Stony-lane and Sarehole at which place the said road enters into the adjoining new parish of Yardley Wood.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said portion of land may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Yardley and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Moseley.

"That the said Lord Bishop has pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 drawn up a scheme in writing appended to the said representation describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction fees and other payments and rights to pews or seats may be made with Justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the said benefices to be affected has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.
