Venice; July 9: vice from the Morea, that the Doge had fent the Caprain of the Ships with fix Men of War and 12 Gatleys towards Sapienza, to lecute the Convoys he expected from hence; but that being separated by a Storm; two Galleys com-manded by the Noble Venetians Donan and Papar fells in with a Squadron of 16 Ships, which they took to be a Convoya they carrying Venetian Colours, but found them afterwards to be Algerines and other Corfairs of Barbary that were going towards the Levant. The Galler of Dinato, which was the farthest advanced; being environd by the Afgerines, and her Main Mint cur down with a Chain Shor, was as laft forced to yield; but the other, though very much dannified, got away. The Letters from. the Venerian Army of the 7th path give an account, that they were then Encamped near Napoli de Rumania; that the Duke de Guadagne, General of the Land Forces, arrived there the 5th, and took the fame day a Review of the Froms, which were about 16000 Fighting, Men.

Straibungly July 22. Seven Regiments of the Troops of Bavaria and the Circle of Shabia, commanded by the Count de Serim, advanced the ro hillandby the way of the Mountains as far as Newmull, within a German Mile of the Fort of Kiel i from whence they decamped yesterday, and marched back towards Bief; their defign being only to fecure fome Camon, which was ordered to march with two Registents from the Black Forest through the Valley of Kinthin The Duke of Dura continues Encamped with the French Forces under his command near Neuftade.

Francfore, July 19. The Saxons having fi-nished their Bridge of Boars over the Rhine at Rudefooin; most of their Troops have passed it, to join the Imperial Army commanded by the Die of Lorraine, who had his Hend Quarters the 14th at Nider Ingellseim, and the 15th at Altzey; The 16th he advanced with his Cavalry very near to Ments; which he cattled to be invelted the next day, and three thousand Peasants were contribuded to work on the Lines of Circumvallation. The French Horse made a Sally out of the place upon the Imperial advanced Guard, and killed fome of their Men. The Saxons that remain on this fide are raising a Battery hear Gustavasburg in order to ruine a Redoubt which the French have built on a little Island in the Rhine, and are working at the same time to clear the Mein, where the French have link feveral Vellels to hinder the passinge our of that River into the Rine. The Troops of Hills finished their Redoubt over against Caffel on the 14th, and have planted there leveral pieces of Cannon.
