Venice, July 9.

THE 6th Instant we received Advice from the *Minea*, that the Doye had sent the Captain of the Ships with six Men of War and 12 Gallies towards *Sapientza*, to secure the Convoys he expected from thence, but that being separated by a Storm, two Gallies commanded by the Noble Venetians *Donari* and *Papa*, fell in with a Squadron of 16 Ships, which they took to be a Convoy, they carrying Venetian Colours; but found them afterwards to be Algerines and other Corsairs of Barbary that were going towards the *Levant*. The Galley of *Donato*, which was the fastest advanced, being environ'd by the Algerines, and her Main Mast cut down with a Chain Shot, was at last forced to yield; but the other, though very much damaged, got away. The Letters from the Venetian Army of the 7th inst. give an account, that they were then Encamped near *Napoi de Romania*; that the Duke de *Guadagne*, General of the Land Forces, arrived there the 5th, and took the same day a Review of the Troops, which were about 16000 Fighting Men.

Strasbourg, July 22. Seven Regiments of the Troops of *Bavaria* and the Circle of *Saxia*, commanded by the Count de *Serin*, advanced the 19 Instant by the way of the Mountains as far as *Newmill*, within a German Mile of the Fort of *Kiel*; from whence they decamped yesterday, and marched back towards *Biel*; their design being only to secure some Cannon; which was ordered to march with two Regiments from the Black Forest through the Valley of *Kinsig*. The Duke of *Dura* continues Encamped with the French Forces under his command near *Newbach*.

Frankfort, July 19. The Saxons having finished their Bridge of Boats over the *Rhine* at *Rudstochm*; most of their Troops have passed it, to join the Imperial Army commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine*, who had his Head Quarters the 14th at *Nider Ingolheim*, and the 15th at *Alzey*; The 16th he advanced with his Cavalry very near to *Mentz*; which he caused to be invested the next day, and three thousand Peasants were commanded to work on the Lines of Circumvallation. The French Horse made a Sally out of the place upon the Imperial advanced Guard, and killed some of their Men. The Saxons that remain on this side are raising a Battery near *Gustavsburg* in order to raine a Redoubt which the French have built on a little Island in the *Rhine*, and are working at the same time to clear the *Moen*, where the French have sunk several Vessels to hinder the passage out of that River into the

Rhine. The Troops of *Hesse* finished their Redoubt over-against *Cassel* on the 14th, and have planted there several pieces of Cannon. The Elector of *Bavaria* has joined the Imperial Army with 9 or 10000 Horse.

Paris, July 30. The Letters from *Germany* tell us, that *Mentz* is Besieged, and *Ben* Bombarded. The first was invested the 17th Instant, and the Trenches were to be opened the 25th. There are, as we are told, in the place above 6000 Foot, and a Regiment of Horse, and another of Dragoons, under the Command of the Marquis de *Wexler*. The Advices from *Flanders* say, the Marechal d'*Humieres* was on the 24th Kill encamped on the *Haine*, but that he would in a day or two remove from thence, and having reinforced his Army with the Troops drawn out of the Neighbouring Garisons, would march towards *Philisville*; which place the Enemy seemed to threaten with a Siege. And that the Marechal having on the 22d detached the *Sieur du Rosel*, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of *Rohan*, with about 100 Horse, towards the Dutch Camp, they met a Party of the Enemies Horse, and had a sharp Skirmish with them; in which several were killed on both sides. We hear from *Rome*, that the Popes Confidants, seeing him very ill, had resolved to persuade him to make a Promotion of Cardinals, but that his recovery had given a stop to their design.

Edinburgh, July 18. We do not yet hear that the Irish, which came from *Carrickfergus*, under the Command, as it is said, of Colonel *Buchann*, are landed any where; But the account we gave you in our last of a Boat being taken with some Horses in the West is not only confirmed, but their number proves to be greater than was at first reported; we being certainly informed, that there are taken 20 Horses and 30 Men. The Troops that are to march with Major General *Mackay* towards the North are to *Rehearse* on Tuesday next at *St. Johnstons*. The Earl of *Argyle* is with his own Regiment, and the Earls of *Argyll* and *Glenarths* Regiments of Foot, and some Horse and Dragoons in *Argyleshire*. And six Companies out of each Regiment lying here marched yesterday towards the Western Shires. The Parliament met again yesterday, and had some Debate about setting the Church Government, but Adjourned without coming to any determination thereon till Friday. A Committee of the Council sat this afternoon to examine the Viscount *Killicke*, the two Lieutenants *Murray's*, and the Lords of *Elphinston* and *Creighton*, &c. now Prisoners for holding Correspondence with *Danvers*. They will be brought to their Tryal the next week.

Chester, July 22. His Grace the Duke of *Schomberg*, General of His Majesties Forces, arrived here the 20th Instant late in the Evening, being received by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Scarlets, and the 24 Companies in their Gowns, with Ringing of Bells, and all other Demonstrations of Respect which the short warning of his coming would permit; and the next day his Grace went to view the Ground where the Forces are to Encamp. A Regiment came in here last Saturday, and Encamped the same day.

Plimouth, July 19. This day came in here the *Kings Fisher*, with some other Vessels from

the Fleet; which they left on Wednesday last off of *Ushant*, and bring an account, That the Admiral, the Earl of *Torrington*, had sent Sir *Francis Woecker* with 12 Men of War towards *Brest*, to observe the French Fleet in that Port. And that they had taken a small French Man of War which came with Letters from *Ireland*; and another Vessel that was going thither with several Officers from *France*. There were brought in with the *Kings Fisher* 25 Ships laden with Wine, Brandy, and other French Commodities, which have been all taken as Prizes.

Portsmouth, July 23. The Ships laden with Artillery, Ammunition, Provisions, &c. which were put back by contrary Winds, sailed again yesterday. There are now at *Spithead* the *Berkeley Castle*, and the *Success*. On Sunday was brought into this Harbor a French Man of War of 18 Guns, which coming from *Ireland* fell in with our Fleet in the night, and was taken the next morning by the *Fersey*. She carried 34 Guns when she came from *France*, but had left 16 of them in *Ireland*, to be made use of in some Fort there.

Whitehall, July 23. This Afternoon *Don Pedro de Ronquillo*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*, had his Publick Audience of their Majesties, to which he was conducted in the following manner. His Excellency was received at *Rotberbith* by the Earl of *Bedford*, Sir *Charles Cottrell* Master of the Ceremonies, and six Gentlemen of His Majesties Privy-Chamber, and brought by Water in the Kings Barge to the *Tower*; where at his Landing he was Complimented by the Lord *Lucas*, Governor thereof, and saluted with the usual Discharge of the Cannon; From thence, the Gentleman of his Horse, with his Pages, marching on Horseback, he was Conducted to *Whitehall* in His Majesties Coach, followed by three Coaches of his own, and between 40 and 50 Noblemens Coaches with six Horse apiece, and several others belonging to the Spanish Merchants: All his Excellencies Retinue, as likewise his Coaches, being in Close Mourning for the Queen of *Spain*. At the Gate of *Whitehall* Sir *Edward Villers*, Knight Marshal, received his Excellency, and Conducted him to the Council Chamber: The Guards were drawn up in the Court; and the Officers saluted his Excellency with their Pikes. From the Council-Chamber he was accompanied by Sir *Thomas Duppa*, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to the Stairs of the *Banqueting-house*, and led up by the Earl of *Manchester*, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, and at the Door of the *Banqueting-house* was received by the Earl of *Dorset* Lord Chamberlain of his Majesties Household, and the Marquis of *Winchester* Lord Chamberlain to the Queen, the Gentlemen Pensioners making a Lane to the Throne. His Excellency presented first his Credentials, and then a Letter to the King, and another to the Queen, from the King his Master, Congratulating their Majesties happy Accession to the Crown. After which he was re-conducted in the same manner to his House in the *Pall-Mall*.

Hamp-on-Court, July 24. This morning about Four a Clock, her Royal Highness the Princess *Anne* of *Denmark* was safely delivered of a Son: The Queen was present the whole time of her Labour, which lasted about 3 hours, and the King with most of the Persons of Quality about

the Court, came into her Royal Highness's Bed-chamber before she was delivered. Her Royal Highness and the young Prince are very well; to the great satisfaction of Their Majesties, and the Joy of the whole Court; as it will doubtless be of the whole Kingdom.

Whitehall, July 24. This afternoon arrived an Express with Letters from Major General *Kirke* of the 15th Instant; giving an account, that *Londonderry* held out with the greatest bravery that can be imagined, and continued to repulse the Enemy in all their Attempts. That Colonel *Stewart* had posted himself with 500 Men on the Island of *Inche*, and had sent out a Party, who had taken 200 Head of Cattle. That he had a free Communication with the Protestants at *Iniskilling*; who made a considerable Body of Horse and Foot; and that many Protestants daily resorted to him, desiring Arms, and to be employed against the Irish, and that he had sent divers of their Wives and Children, who were not able to subsist, over to *Scotland*.
