AT the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Stafford, in and for the said county of Stafford, upon Monday in the first week after the thirty-first day of March, to wit, the seventh day of April, in the forty-second year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, before Thomas Fletcher Twemlow, Esq., Chairman, the Right Honourable Arthur, Baron Wrottesley, the Honourable and Reverend Arthur Chetwynd Talbot, John Hartley, William Thomas Locker, Esquires, and others their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the county aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors committed in the same county.

Wolstanton and Burslem Highway District.
Whereas Enoch Wedgwood, William Adams, Thomas Hughes, Joseph Alcock, William Woodall,

and Joseph Edge, Esqrs., being six of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting in and for the county of Stafford, of whom the said Enoch Wedgwood and William Adams are resident in the Petty Sessional Division of Pirehill North, in which the Highway District hereinafter mentioned or some part thereof is situate, did, on the 13th day of March, 1879, by writing under their hands, require the Clerk of the Peace of the said county to add to or send with the notice required by law to be given of the holding of the then next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace in and for the said county, a notice in the form marked "A" in the Schedule to a certain Act made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the 25th and 26th years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act for the better management of Highways in England," or as near thereto as circumstances would admit, that at such Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be holden in and for the said county of Stafford, a proposal would be made to the Justices of the Peace for the said county then and there assembled to constitute the parishes, townships, tithings, hamlets, and places next hereinafter mentioned, and now separately maintaining their own highways respectively, a Highway District, to be called the "Wolstanton and Burslem Highway District," that was to say, so much of the townships of Brieryhurst and Ranscliffe as is not included in the district of the Kidsgrove Local Board of Health, the townships of Stadmoreslow, Thursfield, Wedgwood, Oldcott, Chell, Chatterley, Wolstanton, Chesterton, Knutton, all in the Poor Law Parish of Wolstanton, and the Lordship of Abbey Hulton, in the Poor Law Parish of Burslem, and all other parishes, townships, and places within the district of the Wolstanton and Burslem Union, in the county of Stafford.

And whereas the said Clerk of the Peace did duly comply with the said requisition in every particular.

Now at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen holden in and for the county of Stafford, at Stafford, on Monday, the 7th day of April, in the year of our Lord 1879, the Justices of the Peace for the said county now here assembled upon a due consideration of the premises, and upon being satisfied that the said requisition has been duly complied with, and that all proper notices have been given in the manner and to the persons as required by the first mentioned Act or otherwise, do entertain the said proposal, and under and by virtue of the first-mentioned Act, and of all other Acts enabling them in this behalf, do hereby provisionally order, that the several parishes, townships, tithings, hamlets, and places hereinbefore mentioned shall constitute and become a highway district, to be called "The Wolstanton and Burslem Highway District."

And it is further provisionally ordered, that the number of Waywardens to be annually elected for each township or highway parish hereinbefore mentioned shall be one.

And it is further provisionally ordered, that the confirmation of this Order by a Final Order will be taken into consideration at the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be holden at Stafford, in and for the county of Stafford, on Monday, the 30th day of June, 1879, at one o'clock in the afternoon.
