##### "BURSLEM WAKES" FAIR.

WHEREAS a representation has been duly made to me, as Secretary of State for the Home Department, by the Town Council of Burslem, as owners, that a Fair, commonly called "Burslem Wakes" has been annually held on the Saturday before the first Sunday after the 24th June, and continuing on the Monday and Tuesday next following, in the borough of Burslem, Staffordshire, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should be abolished:

And whereas notice of the said representation, and of the time when I should take the same into consideration, has been duly published in pursuance of "The Fairs Act, 1871:"

And whereas, on such representation and consideration, it appears to me that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should be abolished:

Now, therefore, I, as the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Fairs Act, 1871," do hereby order that the Fair which has been annually held on the Saturday before the first Sunday after the 24th June, and continuing on the Monday and Tuesday next following, in the borough of Burslem, Staffordshire, shall be abolished as from the date of this Order.

WHEREAS by certain Orders, addressed by the Poor Law Commissioners, the Poor Law Board, and the Local Government Board, respectively, to the Guardians of the Poor of each of the Unions and Separate Parishes named in the Schedule to this Order, provision is made for the appointment by such Guardians, from time to time, of persons to hold certain offices, and amongst them the following; namely,—

and the following regulations, or regulations to the like effect, are contained in or made applicable by the said Orders, with respect to the continuance in office of such Officers:
