funk, and two taken; and it is confidently reported, that the biggeft of the French Ships was blown up during the Fight. We have an account by Letters of the 27th of May from Surinam, That the French (who came thither in 10 Ships) had made an attempt upon the Fort the Dutch have there, but that after an attack of feveral days, they had been beaten off with great lois.

Paris, August 6. This week was published here an Ordonnance, by which, all the French King's Subjects, whole Fathers, Children, or Brothers are in the Service of his Enemies, and even the Women, whole Husbands are in the faid Service, are commanded to depart this Kingdom within the space of a Month. We have an account from Breft, That the Squadron from Toulon, commanded by the Chevalier de Tourville, arrived there the 30th of the last Month. The Mareschal d' Humieres decamped the 25th past from Hame St. Pierre, and marched to Ettines, where he took his Head Quarters.

Edinburgh, July 23. The Irish that came from Carrick-fergus are landed in the Ille of Mull, not exceeding 300 Men in all.
