of the parish of Whalley aforesaid, and upon all other sides, that is to say on the southwest and on the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Holme, from the new parish of Saint Paul, Lane Bridge aforesaid, at the point where the stream flowing from Copy Wood through Everage Clough in Towneley Demesne, into the River Calder, is crossed by the line of the Burnley Branch of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, such point being near to the mile post on the said branch line of railway indicating a distance of twenty-six and a half miles from Manchester and extending thence, that is from the said boundary north-westward along the middle of the same branch line of railway for a distance of sixty-five chains or thereabouts (thereby following in part on the surface of the ground the course of Towneley Tunnel) to the point on the south-eastern side of the Towneley Railway Station, where the said branch line of railway crosses 'Huffling Hall-road,' and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Rochdale and Burnley Trust-road and with Oxford-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts (thereby passing to the west of the church of Saint Stephen Burnley) to the north-western end of the same road on the southern bank of the River Calder aforesaid, and continuing thence still northwestward to the boundary in the middle of the said river, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Paul, Lane Bridge, from the parochial chapelry of Burnley aforesaid and also all that contiguous portion of the said parochial chapelry of Burnley which is bounded on the south-east by the new parish of Saint John Holme aforesaid on the south-west partly by the hereinbefore mentioned portion of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Lane Bridge, and partly by the remaining portion of the same new parish, and upon all other sides that is to say on the west, on the north and on the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul, Lane Bridge, from the parochial chapelry of Burnley aforesaid at the centre of the arch or culvert which carries the Leeds and Liverpool Canal over the River Calder aforesaid and extending thence northward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of sixteen and a half chains or thereabouts to the centre of the aqueduct which carries the same canal over Yorkshire-street and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of ten and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Brunshaw-road and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of one mile and forty-three chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the northeastern side of Towneley Demesne aforesaid) to the boundary which divides the said parochial chapelry of Burnley from the new parish of Saint John Holme aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to raify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her

Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners

for England have, in pursuance of the

for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the tenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, in the words following;

that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and 'now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Nelson within the limits of the new parish of Little Marsden in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary situate at Nelson as afore-

said.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, hambly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Little Marsden which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Mary situate at Nelson as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary Nelson-in-Little Marsden.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Mary situate at Nelson as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any
