

Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz. :—

ASHDON.—Forthwith wholly in Ashdon Church and Churchyard.

ASHTON-ON-RIBBLE.—Forthwith wholly in Ashton-on-Ribble Church, in the county of Lancaster; and in the churchyard, except in graves not less than four feet deep, no coffin to be placed in water or within a foot of the coffin beneath it, and that every coffin buried in a vault or walled grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WEST HACKNEY.—Forthwith wholly in West Hackney Church and Churchyard, in the county of Middlesex.

BICTON, SHREWSBURY.—Forthwith wholly in Bicton Church, Shrewsbury, in the county of Salop; and in the churchyard after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, except in vaults and walled graves which are free from water, and in which every coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

STIDD.—Forthwith wholly in Stidd Church, and in the churchyard, in the county of Lancaster.

LANGLEY.—Forthwith wholly in Langley Church, in the county of Worcester, and in the churchyard.

STAPLEFORD.—Forthwith wholly in Stapleford Church, in the county of Cambridge; and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of offensive remains.

POTTON.—Forthwith wholly in Potton Church, in the county of Bedford; and in the old part of the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

TUTBURY.—Forthwith wholly in Tutbury Church, in the county of Stafford; and in the part of the churchyard to the west and south of the church, except in vaults and walled graves. *C. L. Peel.*
