AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 17th day of September, 1879.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following part of the Port of Bristol, in the county of Gloucester, as a foreign animals wharf:

All that space within the city and county of Bristol, situate near the Cumberland Tidal Basin, commencing at a point at the water edge of the north side of the New Junction Lock ninety-three feet from the north-east corner of the said Lock, thence in a northerly direction for a distance of thirty-two feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction for a distance of eighty feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in a northerly direction for a distance of seventy-five feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in an easterly direction for a distance of thirty-three feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wall, thence at a right angle in a northerly direction for a distance of two hundred and thirty feet or thereabouts and bounded by the eastern side of a building called the Lairs and by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction for a distance of one hundred and forty-eight feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wall, thence in a generally southerly direction for a distance of two hundred and forty feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wall and by the western wall of another building called the Lairs and by a wall, thence at a right angle in an easterly direction for a distance of one hundred and forty-six feet or thereabouts and bounded by the south wall of a building called the Slaughter-houses, thence at a right angle in a southerly direction for a distance of seventy-five feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction for a distance of eighty feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in a southerly direction for a distance of thirty-two feet or thereabouts and bounded by a wooden fence, thence at a right angle in an easterly direction for

a distance of one hundred and seventy-five feet or thereabouts and bounded by the north wall of the said New Junction Lock to the point aforesaid, all which space is coloured pink on the plan of part of the Bristol Docks deposited for the purposes of this Order at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Bristol.

Civil Service Commission, September 18, 1879.

THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, that an Open Competitive Examination for 49 Men Clerkships in the Lower Division of the Civil Service will be held in London, Edinburgh, Dublin, Bristol, Leeds, Cork, and Belfast, on Monday, the 17th November, 1879, and following days, under the Regulations, dated 22nd May, 1876, and amended by subsequent notice in the London Gazette.

No person will be admitted to one of these Preliminary Examinations from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the tenth day before the day of examination, an "application" in the handwriting of the candidate on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board:—

Regulations for the Metropolitan Infirmary for Children, Margate.

To John Weekly, the Proprietor of the Institution known as the Metropolitan Infirmary for Children, situate at Dane Hill, Margate, in the county of Kent;—

To the Boards of Guardians of the several Unions and separate Parishes in the Metropolis, and of the several other Unions in the counties of Berks, Essex, Kent, Middlesex, and Surrey;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 12th year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for administering the laws for relief of the poor in England, and they are thereby required, from time to time, as they shall see occasion, to make and issue all such rules, orders, and regulations for the management and government of any house or establishment wherein any poor person shall be lodged, boarded, or maintained, for hire or remuneration, under any contract or agreement entered into by the proprietor, manager, or superintendent of such house or establishment, or on his behalf, with any guardians, overseers, or other persons having the ordering or management of the poor in any Union or Parish, or for the education of any poor children therein, in like manner and to the same extent as the said Commissioners are by law empowered to do in the case of any Workhouse belonging to any Union or Parish; and that all such rules, orders, and regulations shall have the like effect as other rules, orders, and regulations of the said Commissioners, and shall be obeyed accordingly, with the like penalties on any neglect or disobedience thereof, to be enforced upon summary conviction, as penalties under the Act of the fifth year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the amendment and better administration of the Laws relating to the Poor in England and Wales," may now be enforced;

And whereas it is by the said Act also enacted that the said Commissioners may, from time to time, issue any order which they may deem necessary for regulating the mode in which any contract shall be entered into for the lodging, boarding, or maintenance of any poor person with the proprietor, manager, or superintendent of such house or establishment as aforesaid, or the terms or the duration of any such contract; and if, after the issuing of any such order, any contract or agreement be entered into with such proprietor, manager, or superintendent, or any person on his behalf, not in accordance with such order, the same shall be voidable, and if the said Commissioners shall so direct, the same shall be void and of no effect;

And whereas there is an establishment known as the Metropolitan Infirmary for Children, situate at Dane Hill, Margate, in the county of Kent, of which establishment John Weekly is the proprietor, and which is provided for the reception and treatment of pauper children afflicted with scrofulous, cutaneous, or other diseases, and requiring the benefits of residence at the sea-side and sea-bathing;

And whereas the Local Government Board deem it expedient that rules, orders, and regula-

tions should be made for the management and government of the said Establishment.

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to us in that behalf, hereby order and declare that from and after the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, the following rules and regulations shall come into operation and be observed with respect to the said Establishment:—

Contracts.

ART. 1. All contracts or agreements to be entered into by the Proprietor with the Guardians of any Union or Separate Parish for the reception, treatment, and maintenance of children in the Establishment, shall be according to the Form (No. 1.) in the Schedule to this Order; or in some Form to the like effect.

Admission and Discharge.

ART. 2. Every pauper child who shall be admitted into the said Establishment, either upon his first or any subsequent admission, shall be admitted upon an order signed by the Clerk to the Guardians of the Union or Parish from which he is sent according to the Form (No. 2.) in the Schedule to this Order. But no such order shall be given unless a Medical Officer of such Union or Parish has previously examined such child, and signed the certificate at the foot of such Form.

ART. 3. No child shall be admitted from any Union or Parish unless a contract in the Form (No. 1.) prescribed in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect, shall have been entered into between the Proprietor and the Board of Guardians of such Union or Parish for the reception, treatment, and maintenance of children.

ART. 4. The Proprietor shall not admit into the Establishment, or retain therein, a larger number of children than that from time to time fixed by the Local Government Board; and in case such number shall at any time be exceeded, the fact of such excess shall forthwith be reported to the Local Government Board by the Medical Officer of the Establishment.

ART. 5. When any child, in the opinion of the Medical Officer of the Establishment, is sufficiently recovered to be sent back to the Union or Parish from which he was sent, such Medical Officer shall make a written report of the case to the Proprietor, who shall communicate with the Guardians of such Union or Parish, in order that such child may be sent back accordingly.

Classification.

ART. 6. The children shall be classed, according to the nature of their diseases, or otherwise, as the Proprietor, with the advice of the Medical Officer of the Establishment, shall direct.

Discipline and Diet.

ART. 7. The clothing to be worn by the children shall be made of such materials as shall be approved of by the Medical Officer of the Establishment.

ART. 8. The children shall be dieted in accordance with the directions of the Medical Officer of the Establishment.

ART. 9. Each child shall have a bed to himself.

ART. 10. The children shall, as far as practicable, be regularly instructed in reading, writing, arithmetic, and the principles of the Christian religion, and such other instruction shall be imparted to them as may be calculated to produce in them habits of industry and virtue, and to promote their future usefulness and welfare.

ART. 11. The Proprietor shall make such arrangements as, with the concurrence of the Medical Officer, he may deem expedient for allowing the children to quit the Establishment for the purpose of sea-bathing, or any other purpose, under the care and guidance of some one of the officers or assistants of the Establishment.

ART. 12. Subject to the provisions of the law and the regulations herein contained with respect to the religious visitation and instruction of children in the Establishment, any person may visit any child in the Establishment by permission of the Proprietor, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Medical Officer may prescribe.

ART. 13. Any licensed Minister of the religious persuasion of any child in the Establishment who may at any time in the day enter the Establishment for the purpose of affording him religious assistance, or for the purpose of instructing him in the principles of his religion, shall give such assistance or instruction so as not to interfere with the good order and discipline of the Establishment; and such religious assistance or instruction shall be strictly confined to children who are of the religious persuasion of such Minister, and whom such Minister shall have been lawfully authorized to visit and instruct.

ART. 14. No work, except the necessary household work and cooking, shall be performed on any Sunday, Good Friday, Christmas Day, or any day appointed for a public fast or thanksgiving.

ART. 15. Prayers shall be read before breakfast and after supper every day, and Divine Service shall be performed every Sunday, Good Friday, and Christmas Day in the appointed place in the Establishment, unless the Proprietor, with the consent of the Local Government Board, shall otherwise direct.

ART. 16. It shall also be incumbent upon the Proprietor to discharge the following duties:—

No. 1. To cause the children, upon admission, to be cleansed and properly clothed.

No. 2. To send for the Medical Officer in case any child is taken suddenly ill, and to take care that all sick children are duly attended by the Medical Officer, and are provided with such medicines and attendance, diet and other necessaries, as the Medical Officer may direct, and in the case of dangerous sickness to send for the Minister of the religious persuasion of the child, and to give notice to any relative or friend of the sick child whom he may know to be resident within a reasonable distance.

No. 3. To take care that no child when suffering from severe illness, or at the approach of death, shall be left unattended either during the day or the night.

No. 4. To give immediate information of the death of any child in the Establishment to the Medical Officer, if not present at the death, and to the nearest relations of the deceased who may be known to him, and who may reside within a reasonable distance, and to the Guardians of the Union or Parish from which the child shall have been admitted.

No. 5. When requisite, to cause the death of every child dying in the Establishment to be duly notified to the proper Registrar of Births and Deaths within five days after the day of such death.

No. 6. Once at least in every year, and as often as may be necessary for cleanliness, to cause all the rooms and offices belonging to the Establishment to be limewashed, and at all times to take care that all the rooms and offices, and the furniture and utensils, are kept clean and in good order.

No. 7. To cause the Establishment, and all its furniture and appurtenances, to be kept in good and substantial repair; and from time to time to remedy without delay any such defect in the repair of the Establishment, its drainage, warmth, or ventilation, or in the furniture or fixtures thereof, as may, in the opinion of the Medical Officer, tend to injure the health of the inmates.

No. 8. To provide a Book, to be termed the Visitors' Book, in which Inspectors of the Local Government Board and other persons who may from time to time officially visit the Establishment may make such observations as they may think fit respecting the dietary, accommodation, and treatment of the inmates of the Establishment; also to provide the necessary Books and Forms for the use of the Medical Officer and for other Reports.

ART. 17. The Proprietor shall punctually enter up, and accurately keep, the following Books, according to the Forms and directions in the Schedule to this Order.

No. 1. *The Admission and Discharge Book*, in the Form (No. 4.). In this book shall be kept an account of every child admitted into, and of every child dying in, or discharged from, the Establishment, and such account shall be balanced weekly.

No. 2. The Proprietor shall at the close of each half-year prepare a statement from the *Admission and Discharge Book* of the Establishment, showing the number of children of all classes actually in the Establishment in the course of the previous half-year, and the other particulars according to the Form (No. 9.) in the Schedule to this Order. This statement shall within four weeks after the close of the half-year be transmitted to the Local Government Board.

No. 3. *A Register of the Religious Creed* of the children in the Form (No. 5.) in the Schedule to this Order.

Officers.

ART. 18. The Proprietor shall forthwith, and from time to time hereafter as vacancies occur, appoint a Medical Officer for the Establishment, at such salary or remuneration as the Local Government Board shall approve, and so many fit persons to hold such of the under-mentioned offices as the Local Government Board may deem to be requisite; namely,—

Matron or Superintendent Nurse,
Schoolmaster,
Schoolmistress,

with such assistants as may be necessary for the efficient performance of the duties of the said offices.

ART. 19. All appointments to the offices of Medical Officer, Matron or Superintendent Nurse, Schoolmaster, and Schoolmistress, shall be reported to the Local Government Board as soon as they are made.

ART. 20. No person shall hold the office of Medical Officer under this Order unless he be duly registered under "The Medical Act of 1858," or other authority of law in that behalf, and be qualified by law to practise both Medicine and Surgery in England and Wales, such qualification being established by the production of a Diploma, Certificate of a Degree, Licence or other Instrument granted or issued by competent legal authority in Great Britain or Ireland, testifying to the medical or surgical, or medical and surgical, qualification or qualifications of the candidate for such office.

Duties of the Medical Officer.

ART. 21. The following shall be the duties of the Medical Officer:—

No. 1. To attend at the Establishment daily, and also when sent for by the Proprietor.

No. 2. To attend duly and punctually upon the children in the Establishment according to the necessities of their cases, and to give the requisite directions as to their treatment, nursing, diet, and clothing, and the ventilation and condition of the rooms in which they are placed, and in accordance with such agreement as he may make with the Proprietor, to supply the requisite medicines, exclusive of cod liver oil, to the children.

No. 3. To examine the state of each child on his admission into the Establishment, and make a record of the same in the *Case Book*, and to give the requisite directions to the Proprietor.

No. 4. To give directions from time to time as to the diet, classification, and treatment of the children, and to make any suggestions to the Proprietor which he may deem requisite with reference to the health of the children in general.

Provided that if the Medical Officer be of opinion that any child is not fit to be retained in the Establishment, he shall make a written report of the case to the Proprietor.

No. 5. To make the written reports to the Proprietor required by Art. 5 of this Order.

No. 6. To keep a *Case Book*, according to the Form (No. 7) in the Schedule to this Order, and to insert therein the particulars required by such Form with respect to every child in the Establishment, employing therein, so far as is practicable, the terms used or recommended in the regulations and statistical nosology issued by the Registrar General.

No. 7. To prescribe the dietary for the children in so many different scales as he shall deem expedient; and to enter the same at the commencement of *The Admission and Discharge Book*, according to the Form (No. 3.) in the Schedule to this Order, or some Form to the like effect.

No. 8. To keep a book, to be termed *The Medical Officer's Report Book*, in the Form (No. 8.) in the Schedule to this Order, in which he shall enter in writing, duly and punctually and under the correct dates, such Reports as he may think it necessary from time to time to make to the Proprietor as to defects in the diet, drainage, ventilation,

warmth, and other arrangements of the Establishment; as to any excess in the number of any class of inmates which he may deem to be detrimental to health; as to every defect which he may observe in the arrangements of the rooms, and in the performance of their duties by the Nurses; and, further, a report of any other matter which, in the discharge of the duties of his office, he shall consider to require the attention of the Proprietor; and also such recommendations relating to any of the matters aforesaid as he may think it right to submit to the Proprietor or to the Local Government Board.

No. 9. To allow any Visitor appointed by the Local Government Board access to the *Case Book*, and the *Medical Officer's Report Book* at all times that he may require to see it, and to produce it also to the Inspectors of the Local Government Board, whenever duly required to do so.

No. 10. To report specially to the Local Government Board on or about the first day of January and the first day of July in every year upon the several matters set forth in the Statement contained in Form (No. 6.) in the Schedule to this Order.

No. 11. To enter on a card in respect of each patient upon whom he shall be in attendance, the diet, extras, and medical treatment ordered by him.

No. 12. To report in writing to the Local Government Board the case of every sudden and every accidental death which may occur in the Establishment within twenty-four hours after he shall receive information of the same, and the cause of the death so far as he is able to explain it.

No. 13. To report to the Local Government Board, fortnightly, upon the Establishment, in such Form as they shall from time to time direct.

Duties of the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress.

ART. 22. The following shall be the duties of the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress respectively:—

No. 1. To instruct the children in accordance with the directions in Art. 10.

No. 2. To accompany the children when they quit the School for exercise or sea-bathing, according to such directions as the Proprietor may give.

No. 3. To inspect the children every morning to see that they are clean in their persons, and to report to the Proprietor every instance of a child who on such inspection shall appear to be not clean in his person, or not clean and neat in his clothing.

No. 4. To keep the children punctual, orderly, and decorous in their conduct, by enforcing proper discipline among them; to assist the Proprietor in maintaining due subordination, discipline, and propriety of behaviour at all times; and to report in writing to the Proprietor every occurrence in their opinion unfavourable to the welfare of the children and the general efficiency and prosperity of the Establishment.

Visitor.

ART. 23. If a Visitor be at any time appointed by the Local Government Board under the

authority of Section VII. of the above-recited Act, the Proprietor shall allow him free access to every part of the Establishment.

Interpretation of Terms.

ART. 24. In this Order,—

All words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular to include the plural and the plural the singular, unless the contrary as to gender or number is expressly provided.

Whenever in this Order any Article is referred to by its number, the Article of this Order bearing that number shall be taken to be signified thereby.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT made the day of 18, between John Weekly, the Proprietor of the Metropolitan Infirmary, situate at Dane Hill, Margate, in the county of Kent, of the one part, and the Guardians of the Poor of the _____, in the county of _____, of the other part.

WHEREAS the said John Weekly, herein-after termed the Proprietor, has opened an Establishment at Dane Hill, Margate, in the county of Kent, for the reception, maintenance, and treatment of poor children suffering from scrofula, cutaneous and other diseases, and requiring the benefits of residence at the sea-side and sea-bathing.

And whereas the Guardians of the Poor of the said _____, herein-after termed the Guardians, have applied to the said Proprietor to receive into and maintain and instruct, and also to provide with medical attendance and medicines whilst so maintained, in the said Establishment, a certain number of poor children under the age of sixteen* years chargeable to the said _____.

Now therefore, the Proprietor, with the consent of the Local Government Board, testified by their Official Seal being hereunto affixed, does hereby (in consideration of the payments herein-after mentioned to be made) contract and covenant with Guardians that he, the Proprietor, will receive into the said Establishment, and maintain, instruct, and provide with medical attendance and medicines whilst in such Establishment, a certain number not exceeding _____ poor children under the age of sixteen* years chargeable to the said _____, being orphans or deserted by their parents, or whose parents or surviving parent shall consent to their being received into such Establishment, and that such children while in the said Establishment shall be maintained, instructed, and provided with medical attendance and medicines, in the same manner in all respects as required by the Regulations of the Local Government Board, at the following rate of charge, namely, the sum of _____ per week, and after the same rate for any less time than a week for each child, each week to commence on the day of admission into the said Establishment.

Provided, that the limit herein-before prescribed, for the number of children to be admitted into the

* Or between the ages of _____ and sixteen years.

said Establishment may be increased or diminished by the parties hereto with the consent of the Local Government Board previously obtained.

And the Guardians do hereby covenant with the said Proprietor to pay to him, his executors or administrators, within one calendar month after Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, and Christmas Day respectively, during the subsistence of this Contract, and within one month after its termination, the said sum of _____

per week, and after the same rate for less time than a week, for each of the children so received into the said Establishment, so long as such child shall remain an inmate thereof.

And it is hereby mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto, that no child from the said _____ shall be admitted into the said Establishment without a certificate from a Medical Officer of the said _____.

Also, that no child who is imbecile shall be admitted into the said Establishment.

Also, that the Guardians will not remove any child from the said Establishment without a request in writing addressed to the Proprietor, and signed by their Clerk, and forwarded two weeks before the day when the removal is to take place.

Also, that if the Guardians should appoint a Committee from their own body, not exceeding three Guardians with their Clerk or other officer, to visit the children in the said Establishment, such Committee shall be admitted into the said Establishment at all reasonable times to visit therein the children belonging to the said _____.

And lastly, it is hereby covenanted and agreed, that if either of the said parties hereto shall be desirous of putting an end to this contract, the party so desirous shall give three calendar months' notice thereof in writing to the other of them.

I, THE Right Honourable John James Robert Manners, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, given under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, whose names are hereunder signed and written, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Telegraph Act, 1868, and of every other power enabling me in this behalf, do hereby make the following Regulations for fixing the sums to be from time to time paid for the transmission of Telegrams within the United Kingdom, and for services rendered in connection therewith, and for the general conduct of telegraphic business:—

Payment in Stamps.

1. All charges for the transmission, delivery, repetition, and redirection of Telegrams, and for replies to or extra copies of Telegrams, and for all other services rendered in connection with Telegrams, are to be paid by means of Telegraph Stamps.

Denominations of Stamps.

2. Postage stamps are not available for the payment of any charges connected with Telegrams, and Telegraph Stamps are not available for the payment of postage.

Charge for Transmission.

3. The charge for the transmission of a Telegram originating and intended to be delivered within the United Kingdom (hereinafter called an Inland Telegram) is as follows, that is to say:—

- (1.) If the length of the Telegram does not exceed 20 words, one shilling.
- (2.) If the length of the Telegram exceeds 20 words one shilling for the first 20 words, and 3 pence for every additional 5 words, or for any fractional part of 5 words.

Names, &c., not Charged.

4. The names and addresses of the senders and addressees of Inland Telegrams are not counted as part of the words for which payment is required.

Free Delivery within certain Limits.

5. The sum charged for the transmission of a Telegram covers the cost of delivery by special foot messenger at any address within the limit of one mile from the Terminal Telegraph Office, and (if the Terminal Telegraph Office is a Head Post Office) within the limits of the district served by the Letter Carriers starting from such Head Office whatever may be extent of such district.

Direction for Delivery by Post.

6. If the sender desires his Telegram to be forwarded by post from the Terminal Telegraph Office, he may write the words "by post" at the end of the address of the person to whom it is to be delivered, and in that case no charge is made for delivery, and the words "by post" are not charged for as part of the message.

Charges for Delivery to be paid by Sender.

7. The sender of a Telegram is responsible for all charges incurred in or about the delivery thereof.

Delivery by Messenger.

8. When the address of delivery of a Telegram is not within the limit of free delivery from the Terminal Telegraph Office, and the sender does not write the words "by post" at the end of the address, the Telegram is in the absence of some other special arrangement with either the sender or the addressee, delivered at distances less than 3 miles from the Terminal Telegraph Office by special foot messenger, and at distances beyond that limit by mounted messenger.

Charge for Delivery by Foot Messenger.

9. The charge for delivery of a Telegram by special foot messenger is at the rate of 6d. for each mile or part of a mile, reckoned from the boundary of the district of free delivery to the address of delivery.

Charge for Delivery by Mounted Messenger.

10. The charge for delivery of a Telegram by mounted messenger is at the rate of 1s. for each mile or part of a mile, reckoned from the Terminal Telegraph Office to the address of delivery, except in some parts of Ireland where the charge is at the rate of 8d. for each mile or part of a mile, reckoned from the Terminal Telegraph Office to the address of delivery.

Charge for Delivery to be Prepaid.

11. When the address of delivery is not within the limit of free delivery from the Terminal Telegraph Office, the sender must, when practicable, state its distance from such office, and prepay the charge for delivery.

Delivery by Public Conveyance.

12. If the sender of a Telegram desires to have it delivered by a public conveyance he must deposit one shilling to cover the cost of conveyance, and any unexpended balance of the sum deposited will be refunded on application being made to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within three calendar months.

Delivery on board Ship not alongside a Wharf, &c.

13. The sender of a Telegram addressed to a person on board a vessel not alongside a wharf, pier, or jetty must deposit the following sums to cover the cost of boat hire:—

- (1.) If the vessel be in the Thames off Gravesend; in the Mersey off Liverpool; or in any similar situation, 5s.
- (2.) If the vessel be in the Pool, London, 1s.
- (3.) If the vessel be in any situation not included in either of the preceding classes such reasonable sum as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time direct.

Any unexpended balance of the sum deposited will be returned on application to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within three calendar months.

Deposit of Telegrams in Letter Boxes.

14. Telegrams deposited with Telegraph Stamps attached thereto in wall or pillar boxes, or in letter boxes of ordinary Receiving Offices or Post Offices, not being Telegraph Offices, are taken to the nearest Telegraph Office on the first collection of letters from the place of deposit, and are forwarded thence in due course by Telegraph.

Deposit of Telegrams with Insufficient Stamps.

15. A Telegram so deposited without any Telegraph Stamp attached thereto will not be forwarded, but a Telegram so deposited with a Telegraph Stamp attached will be forwarded although insufficiently prepaid, and the deficiency, if not collected from the addressee, is to be paid by the sender.

Repetition by Sender.

16. The sender of a Telegram may have it repeated back station by station, but no copy of the Telegram is in any such case given to the sender.

Repetition by Receiver.

17. The addressee of a Telegram may have it repeated from the office of origin.

Charge for Repetition.

18. The charge for repetition, whether requested by the sender or the addressee, is one-half of the

charge for transmission, any fraction of 3 pence being charged as 2 pence.

Illustration.

If the charge for the transmission of a Telegram is 1 shilling and 3 pence, the charge for repetition is 8d.

Sender must pay before hand for Repetition.

19. In the case of repetition from station to station, at the request of the sender, the charge for repetition is to be prepaid at the same time as the charge for the transmission of the Telegram.

20. In the case of repetition at the request of the addressee, the charge for repetition is to be paid when the request for repetition is made; and if, on such repetition, the original Telegram is found not to have been accurately transmitted, the amount paid for repetition is returned.

Prepayment for Reply.

21. The sender of a Telegram may pay for the transmission of a reply to it any sum not less than 1s., and not exceeding 2s. The charge for a reply so paid for is the same as the charge for an ordinary Telegram of the same length.

Pass for Reply.

22. When a reply to a Telegram has been paid for a pass is delivered to the addressee, which will enable him, or any person to whom he may deliver the same, to send from any Telegraph Office a Telegram not exceeding in length the number of words stated on the pass, whether in reply to the original Telegram or not, and whether addressed to the sender of the original Telegram or not, at any time within two calendar months after the date indicated by the office-stamp on the pass.

Unused Pass.

23. If the pass be not used, the sum prepaid for it will be repaid on application to the Secretary of the Post Office, at any time within two calendar months after the date indicated by the office-stamp on the pass. The pass must be forwarded, together with the application, and the sum prepaid will be paid to the applicant, whether such applicant be the sender or not.

Telegrams to several Addresses.

24. The sender of a Telegram may have copies of it delivered to several persons in the limits of free delivery from any Telegraph Office at an additional charge of three pence for each copy, and for the purposes of this provision any address within one of the postal districts of London is to be deemed to be within the free delivery from the head office in that district. The charge for Telegrams of which copies are to be delivered in more than one of the postal districts of London is at the full rate of an original Telegram for the initial copy for each district, and at the rate of three pence for each additional copy for that district.

Telegrams tendered out of Office Hours.

25. Postmasters are at liberty, on the request of any person, to keep open their offices for the acceptance of Telegrams after the ordinary business hours at such offices respectively, and for the transmission of such Telegrams to any Postal Telegraph Office which is open at the time, or the

attention of which (if the office be closed) can be gained, and the postmaster of each office so kept open is authorized to accept (in addition to the ordinary Telegram charges) and to retain for his own use and the use of his clerks the following fees, in manner and subject to the provisions hereinafter mentioned, by way of remuneration for such special service, that is to say:—

(1.) For each Telegram—

(a.) If the office is not open for either Postal or Telegraph business, 1s. for the Postmaster, 1s. for the Telegraph Clerk, 1s. for a Messenger, if one be required to call the Clerk.

(b.) If the office is open for ordinary Postal business but not for Telegraph business, 1s. for the Telegraph Clerk, 6d. for a Messenger if one be required to call the Clerk.

(c.) If the office is opened for the receipt of Press News, but not for other Telegraph business, or for ordinary Postal business, 6d. for the Postmaster, 6d. for the Telegraph Clerk.

(2.) Separate fees are payable for each Telegram tendered.

(3.) If a Postmaster or Clerk be specially disturbed to send off a Telegram, and it subsequently appears that the Telegram cannot be despatched, the person desiring to send it must nevertheless pay the same fees as he would have done if the Telegram had been despatched.

(4.) When Telegrams are handed in to be transmitted to an office at an hour when that office (hereinafter called the terminal office), is closed for Telegraph business, the following fees for the Clerk and Messenger at the terminal office if the Telegram be delivered are to be paid by the sender of the Telegram, that is to say:—

(a.) If the terminal office is not open for either Postal or Telegraph business 1s. for the Telegraph Clerk, 1s. for the Messenger, 6d. an hour for the Clerk if he has to wait at the office for a reply.

(b.) If the terminal office is open for ordinary Postal business, but not for Telegraph business 1s. for the Telegraph Clerk, no fee for the Messenger.

26. When the terminal office for any Telegram is a sub-office, branch office, or receiving office, and such terminal office is closed at night or on Sundays, the Telegram may be delivered from the Head Office in the same town or place, but in that case exemption from portorage is allowed for a distance of one mile only from the Head Office, and the rates of portorage chargeable under the preceding Regulations are charged for all distances beyond one mile even though the address of the Telegram is within the limits of the districts served by the Letter Carriers starting from such Head Office.

Language of Telegrams.—Code Telegrams.

27. Telegrams written in any modern European language and in English characters are counted and charged for in the same way as Telegrams written in the English language, but all words not forming part of any modern European language, and all unintelligible combinations of letters are counted and charged for at the rate of 5 letters to a word.

Telegrams must be in English Characters.

28. Telegrams not written in English characters cannot be forwarded or accepted.

Mode of Counting.

29. A combination of two or more words is counted and charged for according to the number

of separate words contained in it, except that the combination is counted and charged for as a single word when so written, and where, according to ordinary usage, the separate words may be written as one word, or be connected by an apostrophe or hyphen.

Illustrations.

(a.) The following combinations are counted and charged for as one word when so written :—mid-day, to-day, to-night, to-morrow, se'night, half-penny, two-pence, cannot, mother-in-law, alms-house, O'Neil, Mc Donald, De Morgan, Newcastle-on-Tyne.

(b.) The following combinations are counted and charged for as separate words :—Malvern Wells, Park Lane, New Orleans, City of Brooklyn (the name of a ship).

30. The prefix "St." is counted and charged for as part of the following word.

Illustrations.

St. Albans, St. Asaph, St. Pancras, St. Petersburg are each counted as one word.

31. Abbreviations of combinations of words indicated by apostrophes are counted and charged for as single words.

Illustrations.

Can't, won't, don't, I'll, o'clock are each counted as one word.

32. All initial capital letters, including the initial letters denoting the several London Postal Districts, when written in capital letters, are charged for separately as one word each, whether a full stop follow them or not.

Illustration.

"G.W.," "S.W.," "E.C.," are counted as two words each. The name "J. T. Smith" is counted as three words. Such a combination of letters as "N.E.R.," if written in capitals, is counted as three words, but if written together in small letters the same combination of letters is counted as one word in accordance with Regulation 27.

33. If words are intended to be underlined or placed in a parenthesis, or within inverted commas, in the transcript of the message to be made at the Terminal Telegraph Office, two additional words are counted and charged for in respect of each underline, or parenthesis, or set of inverted commas.

34. No charge is made for the words "to be called for" appended to an address.

35. When the sender of a Telegram desires that special instructions, such as "private," "confidential," "to be opened at once," or the like shall be written on the envelope containing the transcript of the Telegram which is to be delivered to the addressee, he must write the instructions on the Telegram form immediately after the address, and such instructions are counted and charged for as part of the Telegram.

36. Numbers expressed in figures are counted and charged for at the rate of one word for each figure.

Illustrations.

7 is counted as one word.
12 " two words.
385 " three words.

37. Ordinal numbers expressed in figures are counted and charged for according to the last regulation, and an additional word is counted and charged for in each case for the affixes st, nd, rd, th.

Illustrations.

1st is counted as two words.

Illustrations.

$\frac{1}{2}$ is counted as three words.

9 $\frac{1}{4}$ ths " six words.

40. In groups of letters and figures which express time the bar or other division (if any), which separates hours and minutes, is counted and charged for as one word, and the letters "a.m." and "p.m." are each counted and charged for as one word.

Illustrations.

12-35 is counted as five words.
1235 " four words.
10.37 a.m. " six words.

41. Sums of money expressed in figures combined with letters and bars or other symbols are counted and charged for at the rate of one word for each figure, letter, or symbol.

Illustrations.

$\frac{7}{6}$ is counted as three words.
7s. 6d. " four words.
£10/19/5 " eight words.

42. The symbols "%", meaning per cent. are counted and charged for as three words. The same expression when written in words is counted as two words.

43. When sums are expressed partly in words and partly in figures each figure is counted and charged for as a separate word.

Illustrations.

7 pence two words.
18 pence three words.
10 pounds 17 shillings six words.

Cancellation.

44. The sender of a Telegram may cancel it before delivery to the addressee, subject to the following provisions :—

(1.) If the application be made before the commencement of the transmission of the Telegram from the office of origin the sum prepaid for transmission and the sum (if any) prepaid for delivery will be returned on application to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within three calendar months.

(2.) If the application be made after the commencement, but before the completion of the transmission of the Telegram from the office of origin, no part of the sum prepaid for transmission will be returned, but the sum (if any) prepaid for delivery will be returned on application to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within three calendar months.

(3.) If the application be made after the transmission of the Telegram from the office of origin has been completed it may still be cancelled if practicable by means of a service message addressed to the Postmaster of the office of delivery which is to be prepaid by the sender as an ordinary Telegram. In this case no part of the sums paid by the sender will be returned, but if the service message should arrive too late to prevent the despatch of the Telegram from the office of delivery the sender will, if practicable, be

into by the Postmaster-General by virtue of the powers conferred by the 16th section of the Telegraph Act, 1868.

2. Any person or persons or Company with whom a contract, agreement, or arrangement under the provisions of the 16th section of the said Act is subsisting, is and are hereinafter included in the term "contractor" or "contractors."

3. These regulations until revoked or altered apply to all Telegrams tendered for transmission as Press Messages.

4. Subject to the following proviso a Press Message may contain any of the following particulars, if intended for immediate publication in a newspaper, or for immediate exhibition in a news room, club, or exchange-room, that is to say:—

- (1.) Narratives, statements, information, or comments of, as to, or upon matters of public interest for the time being.
- (2.) Reports of public speeches, lectures, sermons, proceedings in Courts of Justice, or other public proceedings.

5. Provided always, that a Press Message must not consist of or contain any of the following particulars, that is to say:—

- (1.) Letters to the editor of a newspaper.
- (2.) Sporting prophecies.
- (3.) Anything for the publication of which in a newspaper a money payment is usually required from the person requesting such publication.
- (4.) Anything written wholly or in part in cypher or in a foreign language.
- (5.) Anything not intended for immediate publication in the newspaper to which it is addressed, or for immediate exhibition in the news-room, club, or exchange-room to which it is addressed.
- (6.) Any other matter, whether of a like kind with any of the aforesaid particulars or not, in respect of which the privilege of transmission at the special rates of charge hereinafter mentioned, would, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General be liable to be abused or be attended with inconvenience to the public service.

Illustration to Regulations 4 and 5.

Advertisements, election addresses, and ordinary notices of births, deaths, and marriages are not usually published gratuitously and cannot be transmitted as Press Messages.

6. In the absence of special arrangements to the contrary the only places at which Press Messages can be delivered, are—

- (1.) The publishing or printing offices of newspapers registered for inland transmission under the Post Office Act, 1870, with the proprietors or publishers of which the Postmaster-General has entered into contracts, agreements, or arrangements in pursuance of the 16th section of the Telegraph Act, 1868.
- (2.) News-rooms, clubs, or exchange-rooms, with the proprietors or occupiers of which the Postmaster-General has entered into contracts, agreements, or arrangements in pursuance of the same section.
- (3.) The offices of any Company or firm, or person, for the time being authorised by the Postmaster-General to act as agents or agent for any such newspapers, news-rooms, clubs, or exchange-rooms, or the proprietors, publishers, or occupiers thereof respectively, and which Companies, firms, and persons are hereinafter designated news agencies.

7. No office can be recognised as an office at which Press Messages can be delivered until it has

been accepted and registered as such by the Postmaster-General.

8. The only address on a Press Message must be the name of the newspaper, news-room, club, exchange-room, or news agency to the office of which it is to be transmitted, and the name of the city, town, or place in which such office is situated.

Illustrations.

- (a.) A Telegram addressed to any person by name or title is not a Press Message.
- (b.) A Telegram addressed to the Editor of the Times is not a Press Message. It should be addressed to the "Times, London."
- (c.) A Telegram addressed to the Secretary of the Athenæum Club, Pall Mall, is not a Press Message. It should be addressed to the "Athenæum Club, London."

9. In the absence of some special arrangement to the contrary, the list of addresses to which a Press Message is to be delivered must be written at the head of the message when tendered.

10. The rates of charge for the transmission of a Press Message tendered for transmission to one or more addresses at 6 P.M., or between 6 P.M. and 9 A.M. (hereinafter called the Night Rates), are as follows, that is to say:—

- (1.) One shilling for every one hundred words, or for any fractional part of one hundred words, and also
- (2.) If intended to be delivered at more than one address an additional sum of two pence for every one hundred words, or for any fractional part of one hundred words (hereinafter referred to as the Night Copy Rate), in respect of every address except one at which the same is to be delivered.

11. The rates of charge for the transmission of a Press Message tendered for transmission to one or more addresses at 9 A.M., or between 9 A.M. and 6 P.M. (hereinafter called the Day Rates) are as follows, that is to say:—

- (1.) One shilling for every seventy-five words, or for any fractional part of seventy-five words, and also
- (2.) If intended to be delivered at more than one address an additional sum of two pence for every seventy-five words, or for any fractional part of seventy-five words (hereinafter called the Day Copy Rate), in respect of every address, except one at which the same is to be delivered.

Illustrations to Regulations 10 and 11.

- (a.) A message of 70 words addressed to a newspaper at York is charged one shilling.
- (b.) If the same message be addressed to two newspapers, one at York and one at Bath, the charge is one shilling and two pence.
- (c.) If the last-mentioned message contains 101 words the charge is two shillings and four pence.

12. If after the transmission of a Press Message the sender desires to have it transmitted to an address not included in the original list of addresses, but in a town to which it has been transmitted, the additional charge for such additional transmission shall be at the Day or Night Copy Rate as the case may be, but if the additional address is in a town to which the message has not been transmitted, the message is, for the purposes of such additional transmission, to be treated as a new message.

13. The charge for the transmission of a Press Message includes the charge for delivery by special foot messenger within the limit of one mile from the Terminal Telegraph Office, or within the limit

of the town postal delivery of that office, when it is a head post office and the town postal delivery extends for more than a mile from it, but if the place of delivery be beyond such limit the same charge is payable for portage (in addition to the charge for transmission) as in the case of an ordinary Postal Telegram.

14. A pass is a certificate signed by the sender of a Press Message, on a printed form issued by the Postmaster-General, and intended to be attached to the message tendered for transmission, and is to contain the address of the message and a short statement of its nature and purpose, and such other particulars as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time direct.

15. Printed forms of passes are issued by the Postmaster-General to "Contractors," and no form of pass not so issued, and no pass which has been defaced or altered, is available.

16. Every Press Message tendered for transmission to a news-room, club, or exchange-room must have a pass attached thereto, except in cases where this regulation is dispensed with by special permission of the Postmaster-General.

17. The charge for the transmission, and the charge (if any) for the delivery of a Press Message, must be paid at the time of tender, except in the case of any message to which a pass is attached, entitling the message to be accepted for transmission without prepayment.

18. A pass duly attached to a message franks the message so far as payment by the immediate sender is concerned, and any such message is to be paid for at such of the aforesaid rates as shall be applicable, by the contractor or contractors to whom the attached pass was issued, and in accordance with the terms of the special contract entered into by such contractor or contractors.

19. No pass is to contain more than one address and no message to which a pass is attached is to be sent to any address except the single address on the pass, and every such message is chargeable at the full day or night rate as the case may be, provided always that this regulation is not to apply to passes issued to news agencies, or messages attached to such passes.

20. If a message is to be sent to several addresses and is franked as to one or more of such addresses by appropriate passes, the message, so far as regards the transmission to any address or addresses not so franked is to be treated as a new or separate message, and accordingly the charge for the transmission of the message to any address or addresses not so franked is to be at the full day or night rate as the case may be, for the transmission of the address or one of the addresses not so franked, and at the Copy Day or Night Rate as the case may be, for the transmission of all except one of the addresses not so franked.

Illustration.

If a reporter tenders a message of 50 words for transmission to the "Times," the "Standard," the "Daily News," and the "Daily Telegraph," and is supplied with passes for the "Times" and "Standard" only, the messages for the last-named newspapers are to be accepted without prepayment as messages franked by the passes, and the charge for the transmission of the messages to the "Daily News" and the "Daily Telegraph" will be one shilling and two pence.

21. On the delivery of a Press Message at any office of destination, the contractor or contractors, or his or their agents may have any portion thereof repeated on payment of one half of the charge for such portion, calculated at the full day or night

rate (as the case may be), applicable at the time when the request for repetition is made, and if on repetition it appears that the portion repeated was in the first instance incorrectly transmitted, the amount so paid is to be repaid.

22. The expression "a continuous message," means a series of Press Messages tendered for transmission at different times, but forming a continuous communication relating to one matter complete in itself, and such that the several Press Messages of which the continuous message consists, must be read consecutively in the order in which they are tendered, in order to render the communication intelligible.

23. For the purpose of ascertaining the charge to be made for the transmission of a continuous message, all or any two or more consecutive Telegrams of the series of which the continuous message consists, are to be counted together and charged for as parts of one and the same Telegram, if the following conditions are complied with, that is to say:—

(1.) No Telegram tendered for transmission between 9 A.M. and 6 P.M. can be counted together with a Telegram tendered between 6 P.M. and 9 A.M.

(2.) All such Telegrams forming part of a continuous message must be sent to the same address or the same set of addresses.

(3.) No such Telegram is to be counted as less than 75 words if chargeable at the day rate, or as less than 100 words if chargeable at the night rate, although the actual number of words may be less than 75 words or 100 words as the case may be.

(4.) In the case of all continuous messages, except reports of speeches, the Telegrams to be counted together must be tendered at intervals not exceeding one hour between the hours of 6 P.M. and 9 A.M., and at intervals not exceeding half an hour between the hours of 9 A.M. and 6 P.M.

(5.) In the case of reports of speeches the Telegrams to be counted together must be tendered consecutively at intervals sufficiently short to keep the sending clerks fully employed.

24. Every Telegram or series of Telegrams forming part of a continuous message, with respect to which the conditions specified in the preceding regulation are not complied with, must be counted and charged for as a separate message.

25. For the purpose of ascertaining the amount payable for the delivery of a continuous message at a place beyond the limits of free delivery, each Telegram of the series of which the message consists, which is separately delivered, is to be deemed to be a separate and distinct Telegram.

26. If any words which are not transmissible as a Press Message, or part thereof, are included in or added to a Press Message, such words are not to be counted or charged for as part of the Press Message. They are to be charged and paid for at the full rate of charge authorised by the 15th sec. of the Telegraph Acts, 1868, as a separate Telegram, but this regulation is subject to the following exception:—

27. In the case of a Telegram which forms part of a continuous message, the following words may be transmitted by way of instructions to the Telegraph Clerks free of charge:—

The words "more to follow," when written at the end of a Telegram which forms part of a continuous message.

The words "continuation of message," when written at the commencement of any such Telegram.

The words "end of message," when written at the end of the last Telegram of the series of which the continuous message consists.

28. A combination of two or more words is counted and charged for according to the number of separate words contained in it, except that the combination is counted and charged for as a single word, when so written, where, according to ordinary usage, the separate words may be written as one word, or be connected by an apostrophe or a hyphen.

Illustrations.

(a.) The following combinations are counted and charged for as one word when so written :

—Mid-day, to-day, to-night, to-morrow, se'nnight, halfpenny, twopence, cannot, mother-in-law, alms-house, O'Neil, Mac Donald, De Morgan, Newcastle-on-Tyne.

(b.) The following combinations are counted and charged for as separate words:—Malvern Wells, Park Lane, New Orleans, City of Brooklyn (the name of a ship).

29. The prefix St. is counted and charged for as part of the following word.

Illustrations.

St. Albans, St. Asaph, St. Pancras, St. Petersburg are each counted as one word.

30. Abbreviations of combinations of words indicated by apostrophes are counted and charged for as a single word.

Illustrations.

Can't, won't, don't, I'll, o'clock are each counted as one word.

31. If words are intended to be underlined or placed in a parenthesis or within inverted commas in the transcript of the message to be made at the Terminal Telegraph Office, two additional words are counted and charged for in respect of each underline or parenthesis or set of inverted commas.

32. Numbers expressed in figures are counted and charged for at the rate of one word for each figure.

Illustrations.

7 is counted as one word.
12 " two words.
385 " three words.

33. Ordinal numbers expressed in figures are counted and charged for according to the last regulation, and an additional word is counted and charged for in each case for the affixes st, nd, rd, th.

Illustrations.

1st is counted as two words.
13th " three words.
122nd " four words.

34. Where a group of figures is followed by a letter of the alphabet the letter is counted and charged for as a word.

Illustration.

104A is counted as four words.

35. Fractions expressed in figures are counted and charged for at the rate of one word for each figure, with an additional word for the bar used to indicate the fraction, and an additional word for any affix that may be used.

Illustrations.

36. In groups of letters and figures which express time the bar or other division (if any) which separates hours and minutes is counted and charged for as one word, and the letters A.M. and P.M. are each counted and charged for as one word.

Illustrations.

12-35 is counted as five words.
1235 " four words.
10-37 a.m. " six words.

37. Sums of money expressed in figures combined with letters and bars, or other symbols, are counted and charged for at the rate of one word for each figure, letter, or symbol.

Illustrations.

$\frac{7}{6}$ is counted as three words
7s. 6d. " four words.
£10/19/5 " eight words.

38. The symbols $\%$, meaning per cent., are counted and charged for as three words. The same expression when written in words is counted as two words.

39. When sums of money are expressed partly in words and partly in figures, each figure is counted and charged for as a separate word.

Illustrations.

7 pence is counted as two words.
18 pence " three words.
10 pounds 17 shillings is counted as six words.

40. Press Messages not exceeding 200 words in length are accepted for transmission without previous notice at any Postal Telegraph Office in the United Kingdom during the hours for the time being officially appointed for the transaction of telegraph work at such office (which hours are hereinafter called ordinary business hours) but at least 24 hours' previous notice of the intention to tender a Press Message exceeding 200 words in length is to be given by letter or paid Telegram addressed to the Secretary of the Post Office, London, naming the office at which it is to be tendered and the address at which it is to be delivered, and stating with all practicable accuracy the probable length of the intended message and the time at which it will probably be tendered for transmission, and in the absence of such notice a Press Message, exceeding 200 words in length, cannot be accepted for transmission, unless it be considered probable by the postmaster, or other officer having charge of the office at which the message is tendered, that notwithstanding the want of notice it can be transmitted in due course without seriously delaying the transmission of ordinary Postal Telegrams.

41. Special arrangements may, if practicable, without undue expense, and without inconvenience to the public service, be made for keeping any Postal Telegraph Office or Offices open after the ordinary business hours at such office or offices for the acceptance, transmission, or delivery of a Press Message exceeding 500 words in length on receipt of sufficient notification of a request for such an arrangement by letter or paid Telegram addressed by or on behalf of any contractor or contractors, to the Secretary of the Post Office, London, naming the office at which the message is to be tendered and the address at which it is to be delivered, and stating with all practicable accuracy the probable length of the intended message and the time at which it will probably be tendered for transmission.

42. In cases not provided for by the last preceding regulation Postmasters are at liberty on the

request of any person entitled to send a Press Message, and whether notice has been given in pursuance of the 40th Regulation or not, to keep their offices open for the acceptance of Press Messages after the ordinary business hours at such offices respectively, and for the transmission of such messages to any Postal Telegraph Office which is open at the time, or the attention of which (if the office is closed) can be gained, and the Postmaster of each office so kept open is authorised to accept (in addition to the ordinary Press Message charge) and to retain for his own use and the use of his Clerks the following fees in manner and subject to the provisions hereinafter mentioned by way of remuneration for such special service, that is to say :—

- (1.) For each message not exceeding 500 words in length irrespective of the number of newspapers to which it may be addressed.
 - (a.) If the office is open for ordinary Postal business but not for Telegraph work one shilling for the Clerk and 6d. for a messenger if one be required to call the Clerk.
 - (b.) If the office is open for the receipt by wire of Press Messages, but not for other ordinary Telegraphic work, sixpence for the postmaster and 6d. for the Clerks.
 - (c.) If the office is not open for ordinary Telegraph Work one shilling for the Postmaster and one shilling for the Clerks.
- (2.) For each message exceeding 500 words the like fees for each 500 words, and also for any additional fraction of 500 words.
- (3.) For each continuous message, part of which was tendered for transmission during ordinary business hours, the like fees for so much of the message as is tendered for transmission after ordinary business hours.
- (4.) When several Press Messages are tendered by the same person and at one time, such messages are to be counted together and dealt with as a single message for all the purposes of this Regulation.
- (5.) Separate fees are payable under this Regulation by each person who tenders a Telegram for transmission out of ordinary business hours.
- (6.) If notice has been given requesting an office to be kept open for the acceptance of a Press Message at a specified time out of ordinary business hours, and the message is not in fact tendered for more than one hour after the specified time, a Postmaster is authorized to receive a second set of fees for such message under this Regulation.
- (7.) All fees payable under this Regulation shall be paid by the sender of the message to the Postmaster or other officer to whom it is tendered for transmission, and shall be retained or paid over by him as the case may be to the person or persons entitled to receive the same under this Regulation.

43. Notwithstanding the preceding Regulations no office is to be kept open as a continuous arrangement for the receipt by wire of Press Messages after the ordinary business hours without the special authority of one of the Secretaries or Assistant Secretaries of the Post Office.

44. The decision of the Postmaster-General is to be accepted as final on the question whether any Telegram tendered for transmission is entitled to be transmitted as a Press Message, and on any other question arising under these Regulations, save that the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may, if they think fit, on the application of any

person interested reverse or modify the decision and order accordingly.
