All which have made such deep and everlasting Impressions in the Hearts of us Your Subjects, that we esteem our Licus and Fortunes but a mean Sacrisse to be last out on the Scruce of Your Majesties, being the great Ristorers, Preservess and of Your Majesties, being the great Restorers, Preservers and Defenders, of our Ruligion, Laws and Liberties.

Vienna, July 31. You have already had an account, that we opened our Trenches on ready had an account, that we opened our a reneries of the and pair, and had formed two arracks; that on the left being carried on by the Imperatiffs and Lunenburgers, and the other on the right by the Bavarians and Saxons; and of the progrefs we had made therein on the 28th pa in That day the Sour Danus de Caurmaillon, a french Main, who had tormerie foreed in the Reveal on the Truste in Hangde. who had formerly ferved in the Breathan Proops in Hungalry, was ferred as he was endeavouring to get alone into the Town. The night following 4000 Lunenburgers relieved the Prenches, and advanced two Lines on the right and the lett, and faushed the Redoubrs, the Places of Arms, and other Works; 5 Soidiers were killed, and 7 Wounder, and Mypin-General die Noort was wounded in the hand. The 25th, 3000 Imperiants and 1000 Helliens mounted the Trenches, and must be Lines on the right and left, and began to raite a Redoubt to cover the great Battery, with the loss of 3 Men killed, and 4 wounded. Several Deferters come into the Camp, as well from the Duke de Dura's Army, as from Mont-Royal. The 30th, the Imperior rialits again relieved the Trenches, and advanced thenry very considerably. The Bavarians and Saxons capited on their Works at the other attack with the lattle very gar and fucces; and made that night two Allauts upon the French, who were poited in a Garden near the Town, but the Enemy maintained themselves there. The 31st at hight the Befieged made a Sally with 1500 Men, and falling upon the Hessiers, put them at first into some different but these being seconded from the next Guard, beat back the Enemy. The 1st Instant three persons entered our Camp on Horseback, and got before we were well aware of them to the Enemies Guard of Dragoons, which was a lirde advanced from the Town; we inderitood af-terwards, that they were the Sieur de Bretsche Governor of Hombourg, (who is to command in the Town, the Marquis a Uxeues being faid to be lick) the Marquis de Crequi, quis a Oxeues penny 1210 to be new) the prarquis ae Crequi, and another French Officer. The 2d, 3d, and 4th, we continued to advance our Trenches, and to work on our Batteries with all the Success that could be expected, thought the Enemy plyed us very hard, as they had done before, both with great and final Shot; we are now within 80 Paces of the Glack, and the Saxons have made themselves Masters of the Garden before-mentioned, and have very well intrenched themselves there. A German Engineer who was in the French Service, with another perion, is come out of the Town, and has given the Duke of Lor-raine an account of the Condition of the place, and particularly of their Mines. Our Barteries are almost ready, and they will begin to play on the 7th Instant all at a time. The great Master of the Tentonick Order, and the Prince of Savoy, are slightly wounded. Briffer, August 12. The 9th Instant our Governor-General took a review of the Dutch and Spanish Forces encamped at Lack near this City, being about 8000 Foot and 1500 Horse. Another Body of 3000 Men is drawing tog ther towards Ghant. And the Camp at Deynje, under the Command of the Prince de Vaudémont, is composed of 7000 Men. And this Court is treating with the Duke of Hanner for 5000 root and 3000 Horte, which are to be here by the 10th of the fext Month; for that his Excelskincy will then have an Army of 28000 Men; and in the mean time, he will not be idle, having on the 10. Instant acquainted the Council of State, and the States of Beabase, that he was going into the Field. The Dutch or Brobane, that he was going into the Field. The Durch Army, commanded by Prince Woldreke, is daily reinforced. They decamped the oth Infant from Timeon, and advanced rowards Nevelle, which is about 6 Leagues from hence; and this morning they marched again towards the Sambie, in order to pais that River, their march towards Nivelle having been only to amufe the Enemy; it's thought their defign is upon Philippelle. The Marchal a'thumueres is retired to gards Quevrain. We believe, our next Letters will tell us, that Bon is beneged.

Hague, August 12. On the 7th Instant, we had advice of the arrival on our Coast of 9 East-India Sups, three for the account of the Chamber at Amsterdam, one for Delf, one for Rotterdam, two for Zealand, one for Horne, and one for Engeluyjen, which are fince come into Port: They bring the news of the death of the King of Syam, and that the Natives there had fallen upon the French, and that of many of them. They write from Leige, That their Troops began their march the 8th Inftant, in order to joyn the Dutch Army.

Edinburgh, Aug ft 3.
