And this Court is treating with the Duke of Hanner for 5000 root and 3000 Horte, which are to be here by the 10th of the fext Month; for that his Excelskincy will then have an Army of 28000 Men; and in the mean time, he will not be idle, having on the 10. Instant acquainted the Council of State, and the States of Beabase, that he was going into the Field. The Dutch or Brobane, that he was going into the Field. The Durch Army, commanded by Prince Woldreke, is daily reinforced. They decamped the oth Infant from Timeon, and advanced rowards Nevelle, which is about 6 Leagues from hence; and this morning they marched again towards the Sambie, in order to pais that River, their march towards Nivelle having been only to amufe the Enemy; it's thought their defign is upon Philippelle. Hague, August 12.
