A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine: We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Preclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Friday, the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

Given at Our Court at Balmoral, this twenty-eighth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and in the forty-third year of Our reign.

GOD save the QUEEN.

A T the Court at Balmoral, the 28th day of October, 1879.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

It is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York be prorogued from the day to which the same now stand prorogued, to Saturday, the twentieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain is to cause Writs to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Convocations accordingly.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby revoke their Order, bearing date the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, defining a part of the Port of Glasgow, in the county of Lanark, as a foreign animals wharf: Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order before the date of this revocation, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order.

(PORT OF GLASGOW.)

A^T the Council Chamber, Balmorol, the 27th day of October, 1879.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following part of the Port of Glassow, in the county of Lanark, as a foreign animals wharf:

All that space in the port and burgh of Glasgow, being a part of the timber wharf and depôt of the Trustees of the Clyde Navigation, known as Yorkhill Wharf, situate on the south-east side of the road leading from Point-house to Partick, called

the Ferry Road, bounded by a line commencing at a point on the south-east side of the said Ferry Road where the same is intersected by the water edge of the said timber wharf, thence passing in a south-easterly direction for a distance of three hundred and thirty-seven feet six inches or thereabouts along the coping which forms the water edge of the said wharf, thence running northward from the water edge for a distance of one hundred and thirty-two feet six inches or thereabouts, thence north-east for a distance of sixty feet or thereabouts along the south-east side of a cause-wayed roadway through the depôt to a point where the said causewayed roadway joins the Pointhouse Road, thence north-west for a distance

of two hundred and seven feet four inches or thereabouts along the north-east face of the wooden fence forming the south-west boundary of the said road to the point where it meets the wooden fence forming the south-east boundary of Ferry Road, thence south-west along the north-west face of the said fence for a distance of one hundred and eighty-six feet ten inches or thereabouts to the point of departure first described, all which space is coloured pink on the plan of part of the port of Glasgow deposited for the purposes of this Order at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the burgh of Glasgow.
