A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine: We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Friday, the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

Given at Our Court at *Balmoral*, this twenty-eighth day of *October*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and in the forty-third year of Our reign.

GOD save the QUEEN.

AT the Court at *Balmoral*, the 28th day of *October*, 1879.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York be prorogued from the day to which the same now stand prorogued, to Saturday, the twentieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain is to cause Writs to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Convocations accordingly.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby revoke their Order, bearing date the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, defining a part of the Port of Glasgow, in the county of Lanark, as a foreign animals wharf: Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order before the date of this revocation, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order.
