

Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter Drypool being:—

"All that portion of the parish or parochial chapelry of Drypool in the town and county of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull and in the diocese of York which is bounded on the south by the southern boundary of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Drypool in the middle of the River Humber on the south-west by the hereinafter described portion of extra-parochial territory called or known as Garrison Side in the town county and diocese aforesaid on the north-west by the new parish of Saint Mark Hull in the same town county and diocese and upon all other sides that is to say on the north-east and on the east by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark Hull from the parish or parochial chapelry of Drypool aforesaid at the point on the western side of Dansom-lane opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Wilton-street and extending thence south-eastward across the said lane and along the middle of Wilton-street aforesaid for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Holderness-road and with Williamson-street and continuing thence still south-eastward for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Hedon-road and continuing thence still south-eastward and in a direct line across the last-named road to the point where the line of the North-Eastern Railway is joined by the line of railway called or known as the Timber Pond Line which passes along the western side of the New Timber Pond belonging to the Hull Dock Company and along the eastern side of the Old Timber Pond belonging to the same Company and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-described line of railway for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts to the southern end of the same line of railway opposite to the south-eastern corner of the said Old Timber Pond and continuing thence still southward and in a direct line for a distance of forty-seven chains or thereabouts to the southern boundary of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Drypool in the middle of the River Humber aforesaid.

"And also all that contiguous portion of extra-parochial territory called or known as Garrison Side as aforesaid which is not comprised within the limits of the new parish of Saint Mark Hull aforesaid and which is bounded on the north by the last-named new parish on the north-east and on the east by the hereinbefore described portion of the parish or parochial chapelry of Drypool aforesaid on the south by the southern boundary of the said extra-parochial territory in the middle of the River Humber aforesaid and on the remaining side that is to say on the north-west by the Old Harbour or in other words partly by portions of the parish of the Holy Trinity Kingston-upon-Hull and partly by portions of the parish or parochial chapelry of Saint Mary Kingston-upon-Hull both in the said town and county of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull and in the diocese of York aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the

same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the district chapelry of Saint James, Bolton-le-Moors within the original limits of the parish of Bolton-le-Moors in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said district chapelry of Saint James Bolton-le-Moors which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner herein-after recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas by a certain deed bearing date on or about the sixth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine and made or expressed to be made under 'The New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856' or of some or one of them and being under the hand and seal of Thomas Greenhalgh of Thornydykes in Sharples in the said county of Lancaster Esquire, and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners (which deed is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said Thomas Greenhalgh did give grant and convey unto the minister or incumbent of the said proposed district so soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act and to his successors or (as the case may be) to the vicar or incumbent of the new parish (when the proposed district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the said secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act) and to his successors two several pieces or parcels of land or ground with the messuages or tenements thereon erected situate in the town of Bolton as
