Danube and the ports of the Black Sea or of the Bosphorus may be freed from all dues for river pilotage, provided that the ship's pilot is furnished with a licence as river pilot.

Rafts and floats of timber pay the pilotage due for their voyage to Sulina on the footing of 125 fr. from Galatz, 100 fr. from Reni, and 75 fr. from

The river pilotage dues are paid for the up, as well as for the down voyage, into the hands of the Director of the Cash Office at Sulina, at the moment when the vessel piloted clears the naviga-tion dues on departure. The Director of the said Cash Office can alone give a valid receipt for their amount, but it is allowed to the captain of the vessel piloted to pay directly to his pilot the half of the due as an advance.

When a vessel has not been conducted on the up voyage by the same river pilot as on the down voyage, the captain is bound to present to the Director of the Cash Office the receipt for the sum which he shall have paid as an advance to the pilot of the up voyage, and the Cash Office, in this case, only levies the balance owing to the up voyage pilot, at the same time giving a receipt for

the entire due.

When vessels employed as lighters restore to the vessels lightened by them the goods they took on board, without accompanying them as far as Sulina, the pilot of the lighter is entitled to receive the whole of the sum due to him as soon as the lightened goods have been reshipped.

The calculation of tonnage for the payment of the river pilotage dues is made according to the rules laid down by the Tariff of Navigation Dues

in force at Sulina.
