The Prisoners said, That the Rebeis whole Force confitts but of 2500 Foot, and 80 Horfe; that many want Arms, and that they had no manner of Discipline amongst them.

That before his Departure from Derry they had received advice from Colonel Wolfely, who commands the Iniskilling Forces, That having matched to Slego with two Troops of Horse and 150 Foot, the Irish Troops that were posted there sled upon his Approach, leaving behind them 14 Pieces of Cannon and a Mortar Piece. That the Enemy had likewife abandoned Colerain, upon the News of Major General Kirk's being on his March thither, who found there great Store of Arms, Ammunicion, and Provitions.
